All testing materials associated with the Colorado Measures of Academic Success (CMAS) and Colorado Alternate (CoAlt) assessments are confidential and secure. To protect the validity of the assessments, secure materials must remain secure at all times and cannot be viewed by any individual or entity prior to or after testing. Secure assessment materials may not be provided to any persons except those participating in the assessment administration and those being tested. *Procedures Manuals, CMAS Test Administrator Manuals, CoAlt Test Administrator Manuals, training materials, and the PearsonAccess^{next} User Guide* are non-secure materials and should be reviewed prior to testing.

School staff must comply with the requirements and instructions contained in this manual. A standardized test administration elicits original, independent student work and is necessary for test results to be valid, reliable, and meaningful. School staff must familiarize themselves with sections of this manual, the *CMAS Test Administrator Manuals, CoAlt Test Administrator Manual, and the PearsonAccess^{next} User Guide* that apply to their role(s) in CMAS and CoAlt assessment administration. They must also review all relevant training materials before testing so they understand their respective responsibilities.

Spring 2025 Administration Window

All students in grades 3 through 8 take the CMAS or CoAlt Math and English Language Arts (ELA) assessments. All students in grades 5, 8, and 11 take the CMAS or CoAlt Science assessments. Students in grades 4 and 7 take CMAS or CoAlt Social Studies assessments at selected schools.

¹ Districts are encouraged to complete testing as efficiently as possible while meeting security and standardized test administration policies and procedures. **Many schools will not need the entire administration window to complete testing.** Districts that desire flexibility for testing start and/or end dates must contact CDE Assessment to discuss options upon completion of *CMAS Administration Training for DACs*.

² Districts must notify CDE of the intent to use an early testing option for grade 11 science. The early grade 11 science window opens March 31, 2025. Schools that participate in the early grade 11 science window must complete testing within three weeks, by April 18, 2025, and return materials to the vendor the following week.

³ CSLA is an accommodated language arts form for qualifying Multilingual Learners with a language proficiency designation of Non-English Proficient (NEP) or Limited English Proficient (LEP), who have received instruction in Spanish language arts within the school year and have been in the US for five years or less. This accommodated form of the language arts assessment is taken in place of the CMAS ELA assessment; however, students taking CSLA still take CMAS math and social studies assessment if their school is selected for social studies administration (forms are available in Spanish).

⁴ Districts with schools selected for participation in social studies are provided a list of selected schools in the fall. A representative sample, about one-third of schools across the state, administers social studies each year per state statute (Colorado Revised Statute §22-7-1006.3 (1)(a)(III)).

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1.0 Colorado Measures of Academic Success and Colorado Alternate Assessment

All public-school students enrolled in Colorado are required by state law to take a standards-based summative assessment each year in the specified content areas and grade levels. This means every student, regardless of language background or ability, must be provided the opportunity to demonstrate their content knowledge. *Colorado Revised Statutes §22-7-1006.3 (1)(a)(I-III)*

1.1 Program Overview

1.1.1 Background

The Colorado Measures of Academic Success (CMAS) is Colorado's standards-based assessment designed to measure the Colorado Academic Standards (CAS). A very small number of students with the most significant cognitive disabilities may take the Colorado Alternate (CoAlt) assessment based on the Extended Evidence Outcomes (EEOs) of the CAS.

The CMAS and CoAlt assessments are collaboratively developed by the Colorado Department of Education (CDE), the Colorado educator community, and Colorado's assessment contractor, Pearson. Use assessment results data to keep abreast of individual student, school, and district progress toward attaining higher student achievement levels.

1.1.2 About this Manual

This *Procedures Manual* provides instructions for coordination of the CMAS (science, social studies, mathematics, and English language arts, including Colorado Spanish Language Arts) and CoAlt (science and social studies) assessment administrations for the 2024-25 school year. Instructions include protocols all district and school staff must follow related to test security, test administration, accessibility features and accommodations, and data management. The manual includes procedural steps districts and schools must take before, during, and after test administration.

1.1.3 Additional Staff Materials

The *Procedures Manual* is not all inclusive. District and school staff also review and use supplementary documents. Additionally, CDE provides updates and clarifications to District Assessment Coordinators through email as more information is available.

Colorado Measures of Academic Success Test Administrator Manuals (CMAS TAMs) - Detailed instructions and general administration scripts to help the Test Administrator prepare for testing and administer the CMAS assessments in a standardized manner. There are two CMAS TAMs: one for use with computer-based testing and the other for use with paper-based testing. Printed copies of the CMAS TAMs are sent with other materials from the vendor for Test Administrator use during each testing session.

What's New for Spring 2025?

- Social studies assessments are scheduled for administration in grades 4 and 7 at selected schools. *C.R.S. §22-7-1006.3 (1)(a)(III)*
- CMAS social tests are comprised of a single unit instead of two to three units like other CMAS assessments. Each social studies test is 65 minutes.
- CMAS assistive technology forms are available for all content areas.
- Districts that desire flexibility for testing start and/or end dates must contact CDE Assessment to discuss options **upon completion of the Spring 2025 CMAS Administration Training for DACs.**

Colorado Alternate Assessment Test Administrator Manual (CoAlt TAM) - Detailed instructions to help the Test Administrator prepare for testing and administer the CoAlt assessments in a standardized manner. This manual is included in the CoAlt test kit received from the vendor.

[PearsonAccess^{next} User Guide](#) – Directions for using the PearsonAccess^{next} (PAnext) portal for assessment data management and administration, including ordering materials, submitting student data, setting up online and paper testing, and viewing student results. **Note:** Some information provided in the *PearsonAccess^{next} User Guide* does not apply to Colorado’s instance of PearsonAccess^{next}.

1.2 Roles and Responsibilities

This section outlines the district and school roles needed to ensure the CMAS and CoAlt assessments are administered successfully.

For information about role-based permissions in PAnext, the assessment data management and administration system used for testing, refer to the *PAnext User Roles and Permissions* table in *Appendix H*. The table includes PAnext permissions related to administrative management, organizations, student data, test management, and test setup included for each role. For complete PAnext User Roles and Permissions guidelines, refer to the [PAnext User Guide](#).

Some roles in PAnext provide access to personally identifiable information (PII). These roles include Sensitive Data Role, Student Test Update Role, and Published Reports. All official District Assessment Coordinators (DACs) registered with CDE are assigned these roles as superintendents have confirmed they may have access to PII. DACs must ensure any individual to whom they confer these roles is allowed to have access to PII.

1.2.1 Annual Training Requirements

All district and school personnel involved in the administration of Colorado’s state assessments must be familiar with test security protocols and with their individual responsibilities. Training is required on an annual basis for all district and school personnel involved in any aspect of Colorado’s state assessments (refer to the [2024-25 State Assessment Training Requirements](#)).

Thorough training is one of the best ways districts can ensure successful assessment administrations and prevent misadministrations from occurring. DACs must meet with School Assessment Coordinators (SACs) to ensure a plan is in place to train CMAS and CoAlt Test Administrators, Technology Coordinators, and any other district or school staff handling secure materials.

From all personnel who complete training, districts are required to collect signed documentation that demonstrates an understanding of the policies and procedures set forth by the State of Colorado and the district.

District must base any locally developed trainings on the live trainings, webinars, and slide decks provided by CDE and/or the assessment vendor. Districts should include additional information regarding district-specific policies in their trainings. CDE recommends training is provided in a format that allows participants to ask questions and receive immediate feedback.

1.2.2 Testing Coordinators

District Assessment Coordinator (DAC)

The DAC is the individual at the district level responsible for the overall coordination of test administration. The DAC is appointed by the superintendent. For purposes of the Colorado state-administered assessments, the DAC is:

- Responsible for ensuring all deadlines are met (refer to *Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt Critical Dates*).
- Responsible for attending all required trainings.
- The point person for all communications to and from CDE’s Assessment Division. **The DAC disseminates important assessment information to the district, schools, teachers, and parents.**
 - Read all communications from CDE (e.g., **DAC* Update emails*) and distribute as appropriate.

- Serve as the liaison between School SACs and Pearson/CDE. During testing, school personnel may communicate directly with Pearson for technical assistance as needed.
- The local expert on all CMAS and CoAlt procedures and requirements.
 - Ensure all SACs know how to contact the DAC on each day of testing should any questions or issues arise that need immediate attention.
- The district core assessment team leader who oversees training of SACs and Test Administrators to ensure administration of tests in a standardized, ethical manner, taking all precautions to prevent misadministrations.
- Responsible for collecting and reviewing documentation regarding Unique Accommodation Requests (UARs), as needed by individual students, and ensuring full completion of forms and appropriateness of accompanying data prior to submitting to CDE by the annual December 15 deadline.
- Responsible for authorizing individuals for involvement in technology setup for the district (District Technology Coordinator) and working with student data (Sensitive Data). Work collaboratively with:
 - Technology Coordinators to ensure computer-based testing environments function for testing.
 - Sensitive Data personnel to ensure student registration data is accurate for initial material orders and placing additional orders for student test materials as necessary.
- Responsible for overseeing the management of the district's test administration calendar to ensure the state's deadlines are met.
- Responsible for overseeing the data and reporting procedures and functions for the assessments including working with district data staff (e.g., PAnext users with Sensitive Data role and Data Pipeline Data Respondents) on PAnext demographic data and invalidation coding cleanup and Student Biographical Data (SBD) review.
- Responsible for creating and updating PAnext user accounts for district personnel.
- Responsible for ensuring all secure materials are returned to the vendor on time after testing and submitting the [Scratch Paper Verification](#) form and [documentation of missing materials](#) to CDE.
- Develop and implement a district security plan for test administration and follow all protocols in this manual related to security, including investigating and documenting testing irregularities (form and tracking spreadsheet on the [CMAS Training webpage](#)) as necessary. Security breaches and irregularities are reported to CDE.
- Responsible for ensuring appropriate student records are coded with correct invalidations through Not Tested or Void Test Score Reasons/Codes by content area assessment.

The DAC has access to PII in PAnext.

School Assessment Coordinator (SAC)

The SAC is the individual at the school level responsible for the overall coordination of test administration at their school. For purposes of the Colorado state-administered assessments, the SAC will:

- Ensure all deadlines related to this role are met (refer to *Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt Critical Dates*).
- Attend all district trainings for state assessments.
- Authorize individuals for involvement in test administration, including School Technology Coordinators and CMAS and CoAlt Test Administrators.
- Serve as the local expert on all CMAS and CoAlt procedures and requirements.
 - Read all communications from the DAC and distribute as appropriate.
- Serve as liaison between Test Administrators and the DAC.
 - During testing, school personnel may communicate directly with Pearson for technical assistance.
- Develop and implement a school security plan for test administration and follow all protocols in this manual related to security, including investigating and documenting testing irregularities (form on the [CMAS Training webpage](#)), reporting test security breaches to the DAC, and collecting a signed [CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement](#) from each individual authorized for involvement in test administration.
 - Review the school's security plan with the DAC.
 - Distribute a copy of the *Test Security and Administration Policies* from *Section 2.0* of this manual along with your security plan to all individuals authorized for involvement in test administration, including Technology Coordinators and Test Administrators.
- Train all individuals in test security and administration protocols, including Test Administrators and any individual authorized for involvement in test administration. Oversee these individuals during testing.

- Work collaboratively with District/School Technology Coordinators to ensure computer-based testing environments function as needed for testing.
- Assemble and maintain a master list of all students and their accommodations and form-dependent accessibility features (i.e., text-to-speech and color contrast) in preparation for January 24, 2025 initial registration/orders deadline. Coordinate test preparations accordingly.
 - Verify students are assigned the necessary accommodations and form-dependent accessibility features **prior** to testing.
 - In PANext, review PNP indications on **Manage Student Tests** screen, markers next to SASIDs on **Students in Sessions** screen, and/or **PNP Report** (Reports > Operational Reports > Students and Registrations).
- Assign tests (including accommodated form and accessibility feature assignments) in coordination with individuals with the DAC or Sensitive Data role in PANext.
 - Test assignments that utilize physical materials (e.g., English and Spanish paper tests, auditory/signed presentation scripts, large print, braille) that are indicated in PANext prior to January 24, 2025 are automatically included in initial material shipments.
- Receive, inventory, and distribute test materials through a chain of custody process—including alerting DACs to the need for additional student test materials, as necessary, so the DAC may place an additional order.
- Ensure all materials are secure at all times.
 - Store test materials in a secure, locked district/school location at all times when not in use for testing.
 - Do not store test materials in classrooms.
 - Do not remove secure materials from district/school buildings except during transport between district and school facilities.
- Develop and coordinate the school’s test administration schedule, including the administration of make-up testing (DACs may complete this task).
- Ensure standardized testing environments for all students and designate locations for the administration of tests for students who require certain accommodations.
- Set up and prepare test sessions in PANext before testing. Stop test sessions in PANext after testing.
- Mark tests complete in PANext for incomplete student tests that were previously started.
 - “Marked Complete Reasons” **do not** invalidate tests. To invalidate tests that are marked complete, apply the appropriate Void Test Score Reason/Code. Only users with the Student Test Update role can indicate Voids; contact the DAC if necessary.
- Invalidate tests with Void Test Score or Not Tested Reasons/Codes, as needed, post-test administration.
 - If tests are invalidated at the district level, SACs must communicate information to DACs regarding test invalidations for appropriate student test assignments by content area.

1.2.3 Technology Coordinators

District Technology Coordinator (DTC)

The DTC is the individual at the district who ensures technology readiness activities, designed to ensure testing environments are ready for testing, are completed well in advance of testing. In addition to the DTC, districts may choose to identify School Technology Coordinators to coordinate efforts at individual testing sites. If identified, School Technology Coordinators must coordinate with the DTC. DTCs will:

- Ensure all deadlines related to this role are met (refer to *Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt Critical Dates*).
- Set up student devices and testing environments for computer-based testing.
- Remove or disable any software that would interfere with computer-based testing or allow viewing secure test material on student devices on another device during testing.
- Proctor cache test content (if using and done at the district level).
- Provide technical support to DACs, SACs, and Test Administrators.

1.2.4 Data Support

Sensitive Data

The role of the individual in the district who handles student data including sending, viewing, adding, and editing student data in PANext is referred to as Sensitive Data. The individual ensures:

- All deadlines related to this role are met (refer to *Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt Critical Dates*).
- All students are registered in PANext with all test assignments for the enrolled grade level, including social studies at selected schools.
- Demographic information is correct.
- Accuracy of responsible organization data (responsible school and district codes) for all students.
- In coordination with the SAC/DAC:
 - Test format (e.g., online or paper), accommodations and accessibility features (e.g., Spanish, large print, braille, auditory/signed presentation scripts) are indicated for individual student test assignments by January 24, 2025 to automatically order student testing materials for inclusion in the initial shipment of materials.
 - Test sessions are set-up and accommodations and accessibility features are indicated for appropriate students to ensure proper form assignment in PANext.
 - Appropriate void or not tested coding is applied to student records by content area post-testing.

The Sensitive Data role has access to PII in PANext.

1.2.5 Who May Administer the Assessments

CMAS Test Administrator

The CMAS Test Administrator is an individual at the school ultimately responsible for administering CMAS assessments. Test Administrators must:

- Be employed by the school/district.
- Actively supervise the test administration at all times.

Test Administrators must ensure necessary accommodations and accessibility features, such as speech-to-text, text-to-speech, and color contrast, are available to the appropriate students.

Training on current administration procedures is required each year for all CMAS Test Administrators before administering or monitoring a physical testing group in a testing environment.

- Test Administrators must read the instructions in the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual* and familiarize themselves with test administration procedures prior to administering the test to students.
- Training on specific accommodations is required for Test Administrators who are administering assessments for which students require accommodations.
- School/district employees may administer the assessments at the grade levels of relatives, but must not administer the test to relatives, nor be in the same testing environment as relatives during testing.
 - This requirement includes children, stepchildren, nieces, nephews, and siblings of Test Administrators.
- Student teachers may not be Test Administrators but may serve as proctors in the test environment.

Student to Test Administrator Ratio

CMAS test sessions require a student-to-Test Administrator ratio of 30:1 or less. Schools may schedule a test session that includes more than 30 students; however, an additional Test Administrator is required for each additional 30, or fraction thereof, students.

Active proctoring is essential during the administration of the assessment. Test Administrators must remain attentive and in the room during the entire testing unit. They must circulate throughout the room during the test.

Note: Consider room configuration when determining the student-to-Test Administrator ratio. Test Administrators must actively monitor the space within the testing environment. Schools should make special considerations for large testing environments and for testing environments with complicated configurations.

Auditory/Signed Presentation with Scripts: Using the secure script material received from the vendor, a trained Test Administrator signs or reads math, science, and social studies tests to a student who is unable to decode text (refer to *6.0 Administrative Considerations, Accessibility Features, and Accommodations* for more information). It is strongly recommended that Test Administrators using presentation scripts are provided to students on an individual basis (i.e., 1:1 administration). It is inappropriate to provide auditory/signer scripts to groups of students that would not allow an individual student the option of asking a reader/signer to slow down or repeat text. Contact the CDE Assessment Division with questions.

Substitute Teachers

If a substitute teacher will administer CMAS assessments, a Colorado teacher or substitute teacher license is required. If a substitute teacher license is held, a three- or five-year license is recommended. Substitute teachers must know the students for whom they are administering tests. Like all individuals involved in CMAS administration, train substitute teachers serving as Test Administrators on the current year's administration policies and procedures. Any individual serving as a Test Administrator must sign a current [CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement](#).

CoAlt Test Administrator

The CoAlt Test Administrator is an individual at the school ultimately responsible for administering CoAlt science and social studies assessments. A CoAlt Test Administrator:

- Must have a valid teaching license.
 - **Note:** A substitute teaching license is not a sufficient license for administration of CoAlt.
- Is employed by the school/district.
- If not a classroom teacher, is a Speech Language Pathologist, Occupational or Physical Therapist, or School Psychologist who may not hold a teaching license, but holds a professional license.
- Is not a volunteer.
- Must actively administer the assessment.

CoAlt Test Administrators must know the student they are assessing as well as the student's primary mode of communication.

Training on current administration procedures is required each year for all Test Administrators before administration.

- Test Administrators must read the instructions in the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual* and familiarize themselves with test administration procedures prior to administering the test to students.
- Additional staff, including paraprofessionals, may assist in the administration of the assessment as needed, but may not administer the assessment or record student responses, unless they hold a valid teaching license.
 - **Note:** CoAlt administration training is required for anyone in the testing environment.
- Test Administrators **must NOT** administer the assessment to a relative nor be in the same testing environment (refer to the *CMAS Test Administrator* requirement).

1.3 Tested Populations

All students in grades 3 through 8 are required to take the math and ELA assessments. All students in grades 5, 8, and 11 are required to take the science assessments. All students in grades 4 and 7 at schools selected for social studies administration are required to take the social studies assessments.

1.3.1 Determining Whether CMAS or CoAlt Should be Administered

All students, including students with Individualized Education Programs (IEPs), participate in the state assessment system. The IEP team, which must include the parents, determines the best fit in terms of assessment program based on student need, taking into consideration the alignment between what the student is learning in the classroom and content assessed on the general CMAS assessments. According to federal requirements, evidence of alignment between

a student’s educational plan and the accommodations provided on any of the state assessments must exist, as well as any determinations for students to participate in the CoAlt assessment. Three participation options exist:

1. The student participates in the CMAS assessment program without an accommodation.
2. The student participates in the CMAS assessment program with accommodation(s).
3. The student participates in the CoAlt assessment program for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities.

Note: It is not appropriate or ethical to administer the CoAlt assessment to students who do not qualify to take the assessment.

DO NOT base decisions regarding participation in the alternate assessment on:

1.3.2 Determining Grade Level for Assessment Administration

Students are required to take the CMAS or CoAlt assessments for the grade level in which they are enrolled by the district, even if they took the same assessment the previous school year.

Note: Students who start the school year classified in one grade level but are reclassified to another grade level prior to the administration of the state assessments take the state assessment of the grade level to which they are reclassified. If an 11th grade student is reclassified as a 12th grade or GED student before the district’s assessment window opens, the student should not test.

If a student takes an assessment but does not meet the participation criteria (e.g., off grade-level testing), it is a misadministration and test invalidation is required. See 2.3.9 *Invalidating a Test* for more information on invalidations.

1.3.3 New Students

Whether new students who enroll **during** the state testing window are tested depends on the individual school’s testing status. Schools are encouraged to test all students who enroll in the school during the testing window within reason. As examples, if a student enrolls during the first week of the main window (April 7 through 11, 2025), the school should typically administer the assessments. If the student enrolls in the last week of the official window, the school is not

required to administer the assessments. In the case of the latter, do not add the new student into PAnext. However, give special consideration for newly enrolled students who started testing CMAS in their previous district of enrollment but did not finish.

- If the student started testing on paper in the previous district, securely transfer the test book between districts through DAC-to-DAC handoff or via secure shipment requiring signatures.
- If the student started testing online, transfer the started test to the new district through PAnext.

Example 1

A 5th grade student transfers from Colorado District A to Colorado District B on April 8, 2025. The school in District B started 5th grade ELA testing on April 7 but has not completed 5th grade ELA testing, will start 5th grade math testing on April 10, and 5th grade science testing on April 15. The student did not start any testing at the previous school.

Colorado District B must submit a transfer request to Colorado District A through PAnext. District A must review and approve the transfer request through PAnext in a timely manner.

The student must take the 5th grade ELA, math, and science assessments.

Example 2

A 3rd grade student transfers from Colorado District A to Colorado District B on April 10, 2025. The school in District B started 3rd grade ELA testing on April 7 and will start 3rd grade math testing on April 14. The new student started testing ELA in the previous school but did not complete all units.

Colorado District B must submit a transfer request to Colorado District A through PAnext. District A must review and approve the transfer request through PAnext in a timely manner.

The student should complete the started 3rd grade ELA test at the new school and must take the 3rd grade math test.

Example 3

A 6th grade student transfers from Colorado District A to Colorado District B on April 24, 2025. The school in District B completed 6th grade ELA testing on April 9 and 6th grade math testing on April 14.

Colorado District B should not submit a transfer request to Colorado District A through PAnext as the student need not test at the new school.

If the student did not complete the ELA and math tests prior to moving, District A should code the assigned ELA and math tests with the appropriate *Withdrew Before/During Testing* code (refer to *Appendix K: Data Section 3* for coding information). If the student completed the ELA and math tests in District A, no coding is needed.

2.0 Test Security and Administration Policies



CMAS and CoAlt administrations are secure testing events. Maintaining the security of test materials before, during, and after test administration is crucial to obtaining valid and reliable results.

2.1 Introduction to Test Security

All personnel involved in test administration, including technology coordinators, must receive yearly security protocol training. DACs are responsible for overseeing training for the district, including verifying the DTC and SACs are trained. SACs are responsible for ensuring that Test Administrators and all individuals involved in test administration and handling secure materials at the school level are trained and subsequently act in accordance with all security requirements.

A chain of custody plan for materials must be written and implemented as described in this section to ensure materials are securely distributed from DACs to SACs to Test Administrators and securely returned from Test Administrators to SACs and then to DACs. SACs must distribute materials to and collect materials from Test Administrators each day of testing, and securely store and deliver materials to DACs after testing is completed in accordance with the instructions in this manual.

Students may not have access to secure materials before or after a test unit.

2.1.1 Security Plan

SACs must develop a security plan for their schools. A successful security plan:

- Informs all individuals authorized for involvement in test administration to review security protocols, prohibited activities, testing irregularities, and security breaches.
- Ensures all individuals authorized for involvement in test administration sign the *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement* found in *Appendix B*.
- Ensures unauthorized individuals do not enter the testing environment.
- Establishes a documented chain of custody.
- Designates a central locked facility for secure storage of test materials.
- Documents that Technology Coordinators and Test Administrators receive necessary documentation and training for successful, secure administration of the CMAS and CoAlt assessments.
- Informs all individuals of test security procedures in case an unexpected event interrupts testing (e.g., a fire drill or safety concern).

Prohibited Activities

Any action that compromises test security is prohibited. The following lists include examples of activities that compromise test security or score validity. Note that these lists are not exhaustive.

Breaches of Test Security and Administration Procedures

2.1.2 Chain of Custody Requirements

CMAS

Failure to follow proper chain of custody requirements may result in test invalidations. Document chain of custody before, during, and after test administration to maintain security. Districts and schools may choose to create and use their own chain of custody documents or use the *District Receipt Form* (DAC to SAC) and *School Security Checklist* (SAC to Test Administrator) included in material shipments from the vendor (refer to samples in *Appendix I*).

Maintain chain of custody documentation for three years after the test administration to ensure there are no questions or concerns related to the security of the assessments or handling of materials. The DAC and each SAC must be able to assure the state, if any questions arise, that every step was taken to ensure security of the test materials.

The following chain of custody requirements apply to all CMAS assessments:

- Secure and non-secure materials are delivered to the district in an initial shipment (refer to *Receive, Document, and Store Materials* in *Section 3.8.2*).
- Distribute materials to schools no more than one week prior to the start of each school's testing window.
- As soon as materials are received at the school, distribute *Test Administrator Manuals* so Test Administrators have time to review as needed.
- Secure and account for all secure CMAS materials, including paper-based tests and auditory/signed presentation scripts, at all times. Student test materials must remain sealed until they are used during testing. Store secure materials in a secure and locked location before and after testing.
- The SAC is responsible for the distribution and collection of CMAS materials **to and from** Test Administrators each day of administration, preferably within 15 minutes of the start and end of each unit's test administration.
 - If administering a paper-based form, distribute student test materials just prior to administration. Test Administrators must not have extended access to materials before or after administration.
- Maintain security of all state assessment test books and other state materials while in the Test Administrator's possession. Do not store test materials in classrooms in advance of, or following, the administration.

- Test Administrators who are providing auditory/signed presentation using a script may have access to secure materials only on the day the content area is assessed with the following exceptions:
 - Under the supervision of the SAC or DAC, a translator (for languages other than English or Spanish including sign language) may review the script for translation four working days before administering the assessment to become familiar with the test. The translator must sign a confidentiality agreement with the district and may not provide information about the test to any individual. Translators are prohibited from sharing information about the assessment content with any individual. Translators must be fluent both in English and in the translation language. Additionally, the translator should have subject matter expertise in the content area of the assessment.
 - Under the supervision of the SAC or DAC, a Test Administrator providing auditory/signed presentation of the paper-based assessment in English or Spanish may have access to the script 24 hours prior to the assessment administration.
- Teachers of students with visual impairment (TVIs) who are administering the assessment in braille may access the braille notes prior to the assessment in order to gather additional materials needed to provide students access to the assessment. TVIs may access the braille teacher notes 24 hours prior to the assessment administration.
 - While the TVI may review the braille teacher notes, is not appropriate for TVIs to review the contents of the student test materials.
- Document movement of test materials on a chain of custody form and secure materials while in the Test Administrator’s possession. *School Security Checklists*, included in the shipment from the vendor, may be used for this purpose. Refer to sample shipping forms in *Appendix I*.
 - Test Administrators must document the return of all secure test materials (used and unused) on the school’s chain of custody form and must return all materials to the SAC immediately after testing.
 - SACs must verify all secure test materials are returned. SACs must retain the chain of custody documentation in their files for three years.
 - The SAC must oversee the secure collection of the following test materials immediately after each unit’s test administration (do not retain materials in the physical testing environment or prematurely re-distribute materials to Test Administrators if the test will continue later in the day or on a subsequent day). Document secure collection of these materials on the school’s chain of custody form. (Refer to *3.8.1 Secure and Non-Secure Test Materials* for a full list of materials that are distributed by SACs to Test Administrators.)

- After all test sessions are completed at a school, securely store used and unused materials, then return secure materials to the DAC by the district deadline for shipment to the vendor.
- Report any missing test materials or any test irregularities to the SAC/DAC and complete the appropriate documentation:
 - Missing materials: *Form to Report Contaminated, Damaged, or Missing Materials* (link in *Appendix E*)
 - CDE will require additional documentation.
 - Test irregularities: *Form to Report a Testing Irregularity or Security Breach* (*Appendix D*)

CoAlt

The following chain of custody requirements apply for CoAlt assessments:

- Train anyone who will access CoAlt materials on the protocols included in this manual and the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual* before providing access to materials. Training must include test security and ethics.
- Account for and store all secure materials in a secure, locked location before and after testing each day and during extended breaks.
- The SAC is responsible for the distribution and collection of CoAlt materials **to and from** Test Administrators immediately before and after testing each day and during extended breaks. CDE recommends distributing assessments no more than 15 minutes prior to the testing session and collecting within 15 minutes after the testing session.
 - Due to the unique nature of the CoAlt assessments, Test Administrators may need access to a student's materials prior to the test's administration to allow for preparation of any necessary accommodations and to organize the provided student materials and task manipulatives.
- Secure all CoAlt materials while in the Test Administrator's possession. Do not store test materials in classrooms in advance of, following, or between administration sessions.
- Students **may not** have access to any test content or test materials except while they are testing.
- After a student completes testing, Test Administrators must return test books, task manipulatives (science only), answer documents, and security forms to the SAC. Use an **unsealed** task manipulative envelope to keep task manipulatives and the security forms together. Return the test book and answer document with the task manipulative envelope; however, the test book does not fit in the envelope and the answer document must not be placed in the envelope. Ensure the student's name is written on the test materials, including the envelope. Ensure the test book form code is bubbled on the answer document. Note: Accommodated task manipulatives are returned to the SAC for secure destruction at the district level.
- Return all secure test materials (i.e., the materials in the task manipulative envelope, test book, and answer document), used and unused, to the DAC by the district deadline.
- Report missing test materials or any test irregularities to the SAC/DAC and complete appropriate documentation:
 - Missing materials: *Form to Report Contaminated, Damaged, or Missing Materials* (link in Appendix E)
 - CDE will require additional documentation.
 - Test irregularities: *Form to Report a Testing Irregularity or Security Breach* (Appendix D)

2.1.3 CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement, Verification of District Training, Post Test Compliance, and Scratch Paper Verification

Security Agreement

The *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement*, located in *Appendix B*, lists the security protocols detailed in this section. All individuals authorized for involvement in test administration must follow the security protocols and must sign the *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement* and return it to the SAC. The SAC accounts for all signed *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreements* at the school level. DACs must electronically sign the *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement* accessed through the virtual *CMAS Administration Training for DACs*.

The SAC collects the school's signed security agreements, training sign-in sheets, and schedules (including make-up training) and maintains copies for three years.

Verification of District Training

Each DAC must complete the *Verification of District Training Form* (link located in *Appendix C*), which includes training dates and indicates that all individuals involved in testing are trained in both security and administration policies and procedures. The district superintendent also signs the *Verification of District Training*.

Post Test compliance

At the end of each CMAS and CoAlt administration, the DAC must complete the *Post Test Compliance Report* (link located in *Appendix C*). The *Post Test Compliance Report* certifies the administration of the CMAS and CoAlt assessments

complied with all procedures and instructions as described in this manual, the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual*, and the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual*; that any **major** misadministrations were reported to CDE; and all materials were returned to the vendor. The district superintendent also signs the *Post Test Compliance Report*.

Scratch Paper Verification

The *Scratch Paper Verification*, located in *Appendix C*, confirms all used scratch paper from all schools was collected by the district and securely destroyed, recycled, or shipped to the vendor after testing. The DAC submits the completed *Scratch Paper Verification* to the **Assessment Forms** folder on **CDE Assessment Syncplicity** following the naming convention indicated on the form.

2.2 Testing Irregularities and Security Breaches

Examples:

Procedural Irregularities	Educators	Students

2.2.1 Testing Irregularities and Security Breaches

In the rare event there is an extenuating circumstance that halts testing in the middle of a unit, such as a building evacuation, lock-down, loss of electricity or internet, or severe weather event during a testing unit, follow the protocol outlined below:

- The safety and security of students and staff is of paramount concern.
 - Assume the threat is real and initiate the district building-evacuation/lock-down procedure.
 - Note the time of the disruption in order to calculate the remaining time for the test unit. When possible and feasible, record this information in writing.
- Time is of the essence in an emergency. Collect test materials only if time permits prior to leaving the testing environment. Leave all test materials in the assessment room.
- Secure the assessment room and building.
- If possible, keep tested and non-tested students separate.
- If possible, redirect student conversations regarding the test.
- As soon as possible, communicate the situation and circumstances to the DAC and determine how and when the assessment should resume.
 - Before students or other school personnel return to the testing environment, SACs (or the district designee) should collect and secure all test materials and exit students from TestNav if testing online.
- Upon resuming testing, Test Administrators must prepare students for the continuation of the test:
 - Ask students, “Are there any questions about the instructions for this unit?”
 - Before the students can continue with same unit, resume students’ tests in PANext. Refer to resume instructions in the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual*.
 - Identify how many minutes remain in the test unit for students.
 - Display the updated start and stop time of the resumed unit for students.
- Document the situation in writing, noting the date and time, and include specific details regarding the situation such as the following:
 - Event or occurrence that prompted the evacuation/lock-down
 - Action steps taken because of the security/safety threat

- Which assessment(s) and unit(s) were in progress?
- Who was testing and where were they at the time of the incident?
- Who was administering each assessment?
- Detailed timeline regarding scheduled test start time, time of the disruption, amount of time spent in evacuation/lock down, time the test unit was resumed, and time the test unit ended
- Any other pertinent details

2.2.2 Reporting Security Breaches and Testing Irregularities

Immediately report all instances of security breaches and testing irregularities to the DAC. It is the responsibility of the DAC, along with school personnel (e.g., the principal, superintendent), to determine if a security breach took place. The DAC must immediately notify Sara Loerzel (720-316-3065) in the CDE Assessment Division if there is a suspected or actual security breach as any exposure of test material could impact the entire assessment across the state.

If a major misadministration or security breach occurs in the district, the DAC must complete the *Form to Report a Testing Irregularity or Security Breach* (located in *Appendix D*) and *Test Incident Report* (TIR) spreadsheet (downloaded from the [CMAS Training webpage](#)) and send both to CDE through **CDE Assessment Syncplicity** in the **Assessment Forms** folder **by May 2, 2025**. Examples of incidences to report immediately:

- Misadministrations affecting an entire class or group of students
 - The wrong test is administered to a class
 - Timing procedures are not properly followed
- Systematic unethical behavior
 - A teacher, administrator, or other person gives students hints, prompts, or answers to questions
 - Students obtain or share secure test materials
- Breach of secure test materials
 - Discussing, reproducing, or transmitting, by any means, secure test materials or descriptions of secure test materials
 - Loss of secure test materials
 - If secure test materials are lost, complete the *Form to Report Contaminated, Damaged, or Missing Materials* (link in *Appendix E*) in addition to the *Form to Report a Testing Irregularity or Security Breach* (*Appendix D*) and any other documentation required by CDE.

2.3 Testing Environment

Prepare the testing environment prior to administration of CMAS and CoAlt assessments to ensure standard test-taking conditions for all students. It is important to establish procedures to maintain a quiet testing environment throughout each test unit. Some students may finish testing before others; predetermine and establish expectations for those students within the limits set in *2.4 Scheduling and Testing Time*.

2.3.1 Choice of Test Setting

Every assessment setting should have a comfortable room temperature, adequate lighting, and should be as free as possible from noise and other interruptions. Chairs should be comfortable, and tables should be at an appropriate height with sufficient room for materials.

- A testing environment should be a typical size classroom.
- Larger rooms may be used but must have adequate security (see *2.3.3 Test Environment Setup*).
- Students with accommodated materials, scratch paper, or students taking the paper-based test must have adequate writing space.

Before testing, school staff verify all necessary materials and equipment are available and in good, working condition. Provide sufficient space between students to prevent students from seeing each other's work.

2.3.2 Freedom from Distractions

- Only people involved in taking or administering the assessments should be in the testing environment.

- Take appropriate actions to reduce noise, such as turning off alarms or bells.
- Music (of any kind) is not allowed during testing.
- Post “TESTING: Do Not Disturb/Only Authorized Personnel Allowed” sign outside the testing room (*Appendix J*).
- Test Administrators requiring cell phones because a landline is not available must have the ringer turned off and only use the phone for the purpose of contacting the Help Desk, local technology support, or the SAC.
- No food or drink is permitted on desks or near test materials.

2.3.3 Test Environment Setup

CMAS

Situate students so they are unable to see each other’s work from a normal testing position. If the testing environment does not have enough space to prevent seeing other students’ work, use dividing screens as physical and visual barriers between workspaces. Schools may already have one or more of the following materials available to adapt for this purpose:

- Vertical cloth or paper “curtains” to isolate each tester’s device or materials
- Card stock (e.g., manila folders) taped to the sides of computer monitors
- Flattened cardboard boxes folded and taped to form a visual barrier between testers
- Tri-fold display boards (such as those used for science project exhibits) that stand freely between testers
- Cardboard carrels
- Privacy screens that narrow the viewing angle of a computer monitor so it is only visible to the student sitting directly in front of it. When viewed from the side at more than a 30-degree angle, the screen appears dark or blank. Schools that have privacy screens available should affix them to monitors prior to the beginning of testing and ensure students are seated so they cannot view the monitor of the student seated in front of them.

To maintain security in the testing environment, consider the following seating configurations with students seated:

- In every other seat (useful in a computer lab setup)
- Back-to-back
- With monitors arranged back-to-back
- In a semicircle (useful for schools using laptops)
- In widely spaced rows or in every other row (appropriate for a classroom setup)

Monitor laptops or other modular devices used for testing. Do not allow removal of devices from the test environment during test administration if a test is in progress on the device. This includes removal for technical purposes. If TestNav is not active on the device, removal from the testing environment is allowed.

2.3.4 Posted Materials Guidelines

Cover or remove anything posted in a classroom or other area used for CMAS and CoAlt administration that could direct students to the correct answer for any test question. This includes posted material that provides tested content, concept, or skill information.

CDE strongly recommends that the SAC or other designated personnel walk through all testing areas to ensure compliance with all posted materials guidelines. Ensure covered materials are properly secured. Insufficiently secured material covers may come undone during testing, which can result in a misadministration. While not a comprehensive list, cover or remove the following materials:

- All reference materials that a reasonable person might conclude offer students in that classroom or space an unfair advantage over other students in Colorado (e.g., posters, maps, charts, and displays that define, explain, or illustrate terms or concepts in the subject area being tested).
- All support materials that may be perceived as influencing student responses.
- Name plates in workspaces that include any of the materials listed above, or that provide a surface on which students may write notes.
- Number lines for math assessments.

Note: SACs should discuss the appropriateness of specific displays with Test Administrators. Creation of an exhaustive list of prohibited posted materials is not possible due to the limitless possibilities. Always refer to the general guideline when making decisions about materials posted during CMAS and CoAlt administrations.

2.3.5 Materials Required for Students

Students may have **only** the following materials at their workspace during testing:

Computer-based Materials	Paper-based Materials
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Student Testing Tickets • Headphones if using text-to-speech • Blank scratch paper - lined, graphed, colored, etc. (Availability determined by district.) <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Approved alternative scratch paper as indicated in a student’s IEP and/or 504 Plan (e.g., graph paper or specialized writing paper) • Inspect before use to verify it is free of any writing • External keyboards are recommended for students using iPads • Material specific to the assessment, as needed (e.g., handheld calculators for math and science, optional geometry tools for grade 8 math) • Materials required by a student’s IEP, 504, or ML plan 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Paper test materials and accommodated materials required by a student’s IEP, 504, or ML plan • No. 2 pencil(s) with eraser(s) • Blank scratch paper - lined, graphed, colored, etc. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Approved alternative scratch paper as indicated in a student’s IEP and/or 504 Plan (e.g., graph paper or specialized writing paper) • Inspect before use to verify it is free of any writing • Material specific to the assessment (e.g., calculators for math and science, optional geometry tools for grade 8 math)

2.3.6 Prohibited Materials

Prohibited materials can compromise test security and violate the construct measured by the assessment, thus producing invalid results. Cover or remove prohibited materials from the testing room. See *2.3.4 Posted Materials Guidelines* of this manual for additional requirements.

The table below lists materials that are not allowed at any time during testing, including after a student completes testing (i.e., submits answers for a unit or turns in test book). Ensure these, and any related materials, are not in the possession of students, Test Administrators, or any other authorized persons or places in the test area, including inside students’ desks or other locations in the test environment that are accessible to students.

Materials Prohibited During All Units
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cell phones, including camera phones and smartphones* • Other non-test-related personal electronic equipment (e.g., smart watches, smart glasses, electronic pens, eBooks, personal document scanners) • Any electronic equipment capable of performing computations or providing other assistance • Instructional aids related to the content being assessed • Reference books (Exception: word-to-word dictionary for Multilingual Learners)

*Test Administrators may only use cell phones to contact the SAC or technical support. Additionally, CMAS Test Administrators may use computers/tablet devices to administer the assessment session in PANext.

A student with a disability or who has been identified as a multilingual learner may be allowed, under certain circumstances, the use of certain tools and materials as test accommodations that are otherwise prohibited. However, under no circumstances may any student be allowed access to the Internet outside of the secure TestNav environment, a cell phone, or a visual recording device. Test accommodations must be listed in the student’s IEP, 504, or ML plan and documented on the student test assignment (through the Personal Needs Profile) in PANext, as appropriate, by the SAC or a school or district employee assigned the Sensitive Data role.

Prior to testing, Test Administrators instruct students to place prohibited materials in lockers, backpacks, or other designated areas. If a student is found to have any prohibited material in their possession upon arrival for testing, instruct the student to hand it to the Test Administrator.* If the prohibited material is an electronic device, instruct the student to first power off the device and then hand it to the Test Administrator.

If a student is observed with any of the prohibited materials **during** testing, collect the student’s test materials and dismiss the student from the exam room. Communicate the occurrence to the SAC/DAC who will invalidate the test due to misadministration.

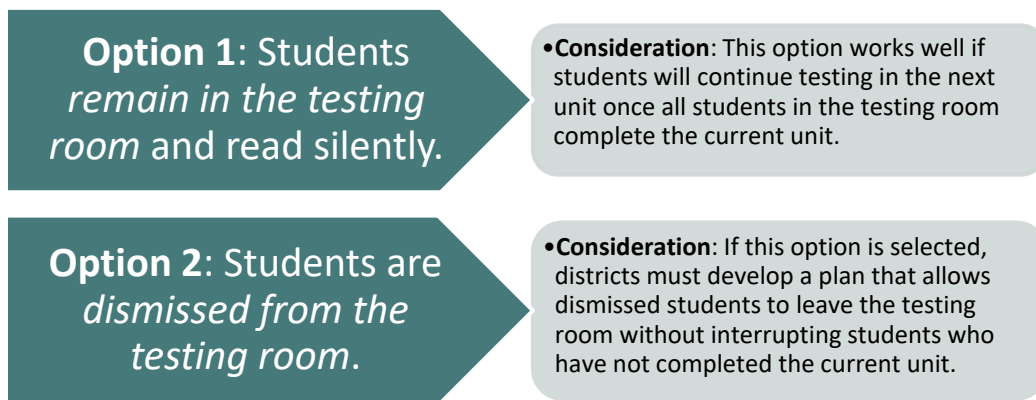
**If the school has a policy that prohibits the collection of cell phones, verify students have stored cell phones in lockers, backpacks, or other designated areas prior to starting the assessment.*

2.3.7 Medical Monitoring Devices

If a student uses a cell phone or other device to monitor a documented medical condition, the student may have the device in the testing environment. Place the device so the Test Administrator and the student can see the device.

2.3.8 District Decisions

Districts determine next steps for students who finish testing before the **maximum** unit testing time is reached:



Materials Allowed ONLY AFTER a Student Completes Testing

Districts that choose to have students remain in the testing room **after** completing the test unit should have students read silently while waiting for dismissal or for the next test unit to begin. **Only reading materials unrelated to the assessed content are allowed.** Students who read after the test must not read from electronic devices, including computers, Chromebooks, Nooks, Kindles, iPads, smartwatches, and phones.

If the student confirms they are finished before unit time expires, before reading material is accessed:

- Computer-based – The student must first submit their final answers to the current unit and the Test Administrator must remove any test materials from the work area.
- Paper-based – The Test Administrator must remove the test materials from the desk/work area.

2.3.9 Invalidating a Test

If misconduct or a security breach rises to the level of test invalidation, indicate an appropriate test invalidation code for the student test in PANext. For online CMAS tests, marking complete test units and entering a “Marked Complete Reason” DOES NOT invalidate the test. Indicate invalidations using the appropriate void or not tested reason/code on the Manage Student Tests screen in PANext (updated individually through the user interface or through a batch upload using a Student Test Update import file – the Student Test Update role is needed to enter voids and import files).

Invalidations are test specific and do not cross tests (e.g., 09 Parent Excuse indicated as a void or not tested reason/code on a student’s ELA test does not cross over to the student’s math or science test). Enter invalidations separately by test.

See *Appendix K: Data* for additional information and all test invalidation codes.

2.3.10 Unauthorized Visitors

Only students, Test Administrators, and authorized school, district, and state personnel or CDE-sanctioned test monitors are allowed in (or in a position to view) classrooms and testing areas when the assessments are given. Visitors—including, but not limited to, parents/guardians, school board members, researchers, reporters, non-testing students, and school personnel not authorized to participate in assessment administration—are prohibited from entering the testing environment.

This requirement for limited access is for pre-test administration organization, distribution of the test materials, test administration (including the reading of instructions and when students are testing), and post-administration activities.

The media are not allowed to have access to the tests or take pictures or video of the testing materials (including sample items, front or back covers of paper versions of the assessments, TestNav screens, and packaged/shipped boxes of testing materials) or of students testing during any part of the assessment process. Media presence in the school creates a non-standard assessment environment, is disruptive, and can lead to misadministrations.

The state works with interested media to provide access to appropriate materials that may help in understanding the assessment process without causing security breaches or misadministrations.

2.3.11 Administration Monitoring

The CMAS and CoAlt administration monitoring activity is completed to ensure standardized administration across districts and schools and to verify that the integrity of the assessments is maintained through adherence to administration and security policies, as required by Colorado statute and the US Department of Education. These requirements are met by deploying CDE-sanctioned test monitors to observe live testing sessions each spring.

State-sanctioned monitors are trained in monitoring and administration procedures. All monitors must pass a background check as a prerequisite for participation in this activity. Upon arrival at a school, the monitor will have identification and a letter from CDE stating their purpose at the school, as well as the materials needed to complete the monitoring activity.

Monitoring occurs in select districts across all eight Colorado regions each spring. In March, DACs are notified of selection for the required CMAS and/or CoAlt monitoring activity; however, CDE reserves the right to send monitors to districts without prior notice. While not a substitute for the state’s monitoring activity, districts may also require their own monitoring activity during administration, completed by district-authorized monitors.

Colorado Revised Statute §22-7-1006.3 (1)(e)(I)

The department shall review and update assessment administration and security policies as necessary to maintain the integrity of the assessments.

U.S. Department of Education Peer Review Requirement

The State adequately monitors the administration of its State assessments to ensure that standardized test administration procedures are implemented with fidelity across districts and schools.

2.4 Scheduling and Testing Time

The state testing window for the elementary, middle, and high school CMAS and CoAlt assessments is April to 25, 2025. Complete all test sessions (including make-ups and administrations with accommodations) during the testing window. Districts and schools should have a plan in place for make-up testing due to unforeseen schedule changes, such as cancellations caused by weather (e.g., build make-up days/times into the schedule before the close of the window). See *Spring 2025 Administration Window* for more information.

All students in grades 3 through 8 are required to take the math and ELA assessments. All students in grades 5, 8, and 11 are required to take the science assessments. All students in grades 4 and 7 at schools selected for social studies administration are required to take social studies assessments.

2.4.1 Testing Time and Test Structure

CMAS

ELA, math, and science assessments consist of three units for elementary and middle school. Grade 11 science assessments consist of two units. Social studies assessments consist of one unit. The assessments are composed of the following item types:

- Selected response
- Technology-enhanced
- Passage sets (ELA/CSLA)
- Constructed response
- Simulations (science)

Times shown in the following tables include the unit testing time that must be available to all students for each test unit by content area. Unless students have an extended time accommodation (e.g., time-and-a-half or double time) documented on an IEP, 504, or ML plan, providing more than the unit testing time is a misadministration.

If **all** students in a physical testing group complete the test unit before the maximum unit testing time is reached, the Test Administrator may end the test unit. Districts may determine whether students who finish testing should remain in the testing room and read quietly, be dismissed from the testing room, or continue testing in the next unit once all students in the test session complete the current unit (see 2.3.8 *District Decisions* for additional information).

While unit testing times may be the same in the following tables, some groups/grades are **not** able to test together due to differences in administration SAY directions and/or different student testing materials. A **separate** testing environment is needed for:

- Paper-based and computer-based (administration SAY directions and materials are different)
- Different content areas (unit testing times and administration SAY directions are different)
- Directions read aloud in a language other than English
- English tests and Spanish accommodated forms
- Grade 11 science and grades 5 and 8 science (different unit times)
- ELA grades 3 through 5 and ELA grades 6 through 8 (different unit times)
- Math grades 3 through 5 and math grades 6 through 8 (different administration SAY directions)
- Math grades 6 through 8 Unit 1 and grades 6 through 8 Units 2 and 3 (different administration SAY directions)

Refer to 2.4.2 *Guidelines for Scheduling: Testing Multiple Groups in the Same Testing Room* for additional information.

*Unit testing times do not include time for setup, reading SAY directions, or distributing/collecting student testing materials. If all students in a physical testing group complete the test unit before the unit testing time is reached, the Test Administrator may end the test unit.

CoAlt

The CoAlt assessment is untimed and individually administered. There are no restrictions on the number of sessions needed to complete the assessment. There are no requirements to complete the assessment within a given day. The CoAlt assessment may be stopped and restarted at any time; however, once an item is presented, complete the item before stopping; revisiting previously presented items is not allowed.

2.4.2 Scheduling Guidelines

Testing Multiple Groups in the Same Testing Room

Schools may schedule different groups of students to test together in the same room provided that the unit testing time and administration SAY directions are the same. Administer all units in order, including make-up sessions.

English Language Arts

- Computer-based testing
 - Grades 3 through 5 may test together for all units.
 - Grades 6 through 8 may test together for all units.
- Paper-based testing*
 - Grades 3 through 5 may test together for all units.
 - Students who qualify for the CSLA accommodated form in grades 3 and 4 may test together but may not test with students taking ELA due to differences in SAY directions.
 - Grades 6 through 8 may test together for all units.

Mathematics

- Computer-based testing
 - Grades 3 through 5 may test together for all units.
 - Grades 6 through 8
 - May test together for Unit 1.
 - May test together for Units 2 and 3.
- Paper-based testing*
 - Grades 3 through 5 may test together for all units.
 - Grades 6 through 8
 - May test together for Unit 1.
 - May test together for Units 2 and 3.

Science

- Computer-based testing
 - Grades 5 and 8 science may test together for all units.

- Paper-based testing*
 - Grades 5 and 8 science may test together for all units.

Social Studies

- Computer-based testing
 - Grades 4 and 7 social studies may test together.
- Paper-based testing
 - Grades 4 and 7 social studies may test together.

*For groupings that include students testing in different units, the Test Administrator must acknowledge the appropriate units when referenced in the SAY directions. Additionally, students testing Unit 1 must write their names on their materials; students testing Units 2 and 3 must confirm the receipt of the materials on which their names were previously written.

Scheduling CMAS Computer-based Administration

To the extent possible, assess all students taking the same test (i.e., same grade and content area, including accommodated online and paper forms) at the same time. Should that not prove possible, assess all students taking the same test within the shortest timeframe practicable (e.g., back-to-back physical testing groups, in the same day, across consecutive days). See *Appendix F: Sample School Schedules*.

If testing units back-to-back, students may not have access to cell phones during short breaks between units.

Absent Students

After **unlocking** the scheduled test unit in PAnext for the entire testing group, and as soon as a student is identified as absent, the Test Administrator must **lock** the current test unit for that student. To assist in tracking an absent student's missed test units, Test Administrators may write the missed test unit(s) on the student's Student Testing Ticket.

Scheduling CMAS Paper-based Administration

For general use of the paper-based assessment, all students taking the same test (i.e., same grade and content area, including accommodated online and paper forms) must complete the same unit at the same time. Should that not prove possible, assess all students taking the same test within the shortest timeframe practicable **within the same day**, minimizing interactions between the groups of students (e.g., during regularly scheduled science period, tested in back-to-back physical testing groups).

If testing units back-to-back, students may not have access to cell phones during short breaks between units.

Scheduling CoAlt

The DAC is responsible for establishing the administration schedule and ensuring every student taking CoAlt is assessed within the state CMAS and CoAlt assessment window. Districts may use the entire state testing window for administration of this assessment; however, it is expected that students taking CoAlt assessments will test during the same window as their peers taking CMAS assessments. Because CoAlt assessments are individually administered, there are no restrictions on completing the assessment within a given day. The CoAlt assessment may be stopped and restarted at any time; however, once an item is presented, complete the item before stopping; revisiting previously presented items is not allowed. Schedule assessment administration based on the individual needs of the student while meeting the following requirements:

- Administer test questions in the order in which they appear in the CoAlt test book.
- Complete make-ups within the state testing window.

Test Administrators must receive the CoAlt test books in time to review items and test administration procedures described in the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual* to allow for preparation of necessary accommodations and cut apart and organize task manipulatives (science only). Invalidation of any student tests given before or after the state assessment window is required due to misadministration (i.e., invalidation code 06).

2.4.3 Make-up Testing

Multiple options exist to ensure students who miss their originally scheduled test sessions are provided time to complete testing during make-up sessions. Provide students who miss test units with make-up time as soon as practicable to avoid test security breaches and misadministrations. Options discussed in this section provide a starting point for make-up testing. Each presented option includes technology, security, and logistical considerations to weigh against each other when make-up testing plans are made.

Administer make-up testing in the exact same manner as regularly scheduled testing including:

- Administration of all test units in sequential order for all content areas,
- Providing the same unit testing time, and
- Providing the same accommodations.

Schools may schedule different groups of students in the same room at the same time, provided the unit testing time, student materials, and administration script are the same. See 2.4.2 *Scheduling Guidelines* for additional information.

Computer-based Administration Make-up Testing

As long as the Test Administrator-read SAY directions and the unit testing times are the same, make-up testing sessions may include students from multiple grades with the following considerations:

- If students from multiple test sessions make-up units in the same physical testing environment, Test Administrators may use the “combined view” and filtering options in PAnext to manage students’ tests from multiple sessions at once.
 - Refer to the *PAnext User Guide* for additional information on combined view functionality.
- If students from multiple test sessions make-up units in the same physical testing environment and are moved into new PAnext test sessions:
 - New Student Testing Tickets are required as the password on the original Student Testing Ticket only works for the original PAnext test session.
 - Only students taking the same assessment can be placed into new PAnext test sessions together.
 - See “Moving Students to Another Session” in the *PAnext User Guide* for instructions.
- Guidance on combining groups is provided in 2.4.2 *Scheduling Guidelines*.

If a make-up student takes a different unit of the assessment than the rest of the class, the Test Administrator must ensure through PAnext that the appropriate units are locked and only the make-up unit is unlocked for that individual student. **Administer all units for each student in sequential order, including for make-up testing.**

Option 1 (**Recommended**): Student Completes Missed Test Unit during Make-Up Test Session in Advance of Re-Joining Original Physical Testing Group

After completion of the missed test unit, students re-join their original physical testing group and are on track to complete testing as initially scheduled.

Sample Make-Up Testing Schedule for Option 1 **Recommended**

PAnext Considerations for Option 1

Test Administrators unlock the missed test unit for each student in the make-up test session. By utilizing the “combined view” for session management, Test Administrators filter Student Test Status to quickly identify which students have units to make-up. Only one test unit can be unlocked for a student at any time.

Security Considerations for Option 1

This make-up testing option has a low security risk as students complete make-up testing in the shortest practicable time frame so few test units are exposed.

Logistical Considerations for Option 1

Make-up testing is completed in advance of regularly scheduled physical testing group times. The SAC provides the Test Administrator the proper Student Testing Ticket for each student in the physical testing group. Test Administrators must read the appropriate SAY directions from the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual* for the assessed unit(s).

Option 2: Student Tests with Original Physical Testing Group

Students continue to test with their original physical testing group.

Sample Make-Up Testing Schedule for Option 2

PAnext Considerations for Option 2

After unlocking Unit 2 of the test for the entire class on Day 2, the Test Administrator locks Unit 2 for the absent student and then unlocks Unit 1 for that student only. Only one test unit can be unlocked for a student at any time. This process is repeated for the remaining test units.

Security Considerations for Option 2

This make-up testing option has high security risks as every test unit has the potential for premature exposure to the previously absent student.

Logistical Considerations for Option 2

While potentially the least challenging from a scheduling perspective, a plan is required for administration of the last unit of the test for the student. Additionally, the Test Administrator must read the appropriate SAY directions from the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual* for the assessed unit(s).

Option 3: Student Completes Missed Test Unit in Any Available Physical Testing Group in Advance of Re-Joining Original Physical Testing Group

In this scenario, the student joins any group of testing students where a device is available in the testing environment (refer to 2.4.2 *Scheduling Guidelines* for allowable groupings). After completion of the missed test unit, the student re-joins their original physical testing group and is on track to complete testing as initially scheduled.

Sample Make-up Testing Schedule for Option 3

PAnext Considerations for Option 3

This option is potentially the most challenging for Test Administrators. After unlocking Unit 2 of the test for the entire morning group on Day 2, the Test Administrator utilizes the "combined view" to pull up the afternoon group and locate the absent student. The Test Administrator unlocks Unit 1 of the absent student's test (only one test unit can be unlocked for a student at any time).

Security Considerations for Option 3

This make-up testing option has a moderate security risk as students complete make-up testing in the shortest practicable time frame but there is the potential for premature exposure to an upcoming test unit.

Logistical Considerations for Option 3

Ensure the availability of devices in the alternative physical testing group in advance of the regularly scheduled physical testing group time. Tracking students could become difficult and problematic. SACs must provide Test Administrators the proper Student Testing Ticket for each student in the physical testing group. Test Administrators must read the appropriate SAY directions from the *Test Administrator Manual* for the assessed unit(s).

The following table includes a summary of the technology, security, and logistical considerations for each make-up testing option.

Paper-based Administration Make-up Testing

Conduct make-up testing for paper-based administrations similarly to computer-based make-up testing. Students taking the paper-based assessment complete testing in a testing environment that is separate from computer-based administration. **Administer all units in sequential order for all content areas for each student, including for make-up testing.** Students are not allowed to return to any unit of the test that was previously completed in its entirety.

Students Who Become Ill during Testing

Make-up test sessions are used to finish started tests for students who become ill during testing. Test Administrators must note the exact place in the test where the student stopped (item number and remaining testing time). For computer-based testing, note this information on the Student Testing Ticket. Test Administrators must closely monitor make-up testing to ensure students do not return to previously answered questions. The student is to receive the remaining time from the original unit to finish.

Computer-based testing - If a student becomes ill and needs to leave *during* the test unit, Test Administrators must close the student's test unit by exiting the student from TestNav. To continue testing once the student returns, the Test Administrator must resume the student's test in PAnext. For instructions, see "Resume a Test" in the *PAnext User Guide*. When the student logs back into TestNav, they are taken to the item last visited; if this does not occur, the student may navigate to the last visited item using the Review drop-down menu.

Paper-based testing - If a student becomes ill before completing a unit, Test Administrators must collect the student's test materials. The student must pick up exactly where they left off upon their return.

2.4.4 Extended Time

See *6.0 Administrative Considerations, Accessibility Features, and Accommodations* for additional information.

CMAS Math, ELA, Science, and Social Studies

Students with disabilities with appropriate documentation on IEP and 504 plans, and Multilingual Learners (NEP/LEP) taking assessments in English, may qualify for timing accommodations. Unless students have an extended time accommodation documented on an IEP, 504, or ML plan (e.g., time-and-a-half or double time), providing more than the unit testing time is a misadministration.

CoAlt Science and Social Studies

The CoAlt assessments are untimed. CoAlt testing may extend over multiple days for an individual student.

2.4.5 Testing Breaks

Short Breaks between Units

If testing units back-to-back, a short break is allowed between tested units. During these breaks, students may not have access to cell phones.

Temporary Stops for Individual Students

If a student needs to temporarily stop testing for a short time, the testing clock does not stop. For computer-based testing, apply visual blocks to the student's device (e.g., turn off monitor or cover screen) instead of having the student use TestNav functions to exit and resume the test. For paper-based testing, close or cover the student's test book.

CoAlt Testing Breaks

The CoAlt assessments are untimed and individually administered. Testing may extend over multiple days for an individual student. A break in administration may occur after any presented question is completed. The Test Administrator begins with the following question once testing resumes; revisiting previously presented questions is not allowed.

2.5 Assessment in Special Circumstances

Nonpublic Home-based Educational Program

A parent or legal guardian of a child in a home-based educational program may request that the child take the CMAS assessments. Students must meet participant criteria for the requested assessment(s). The parent or guardian of the child must pay all costs associated with administration and providing assessment results, as determined by the district. Refer to Colorado Revised Statute §22-7-1006.3(9)(b).

Students in a home-based educational program must be assessed in a location (excluding private residences) mutually agreed upon by the parent/guardian and the testing district. **Each test administration must be held under standardized conditions. Personnel responsible for handling assessment materials and administering the CMAS assessments to home-schooled students must meet the requirements to be a Test Administrator, participate in CMAS assessment training, and sign a security agreement form.**

CMAS results are returned to the district in which the student tests. It is the district's responsibility to distribute results to the student's parent/guardian. Scores are not included in school or district summaries if the district's home school organization in PearsonAccess^{next} is selected as the Responsible School Organization. Refer to *Appendix K: Data – Home School Students* for details about registering these students for testing.

Because the Colorado Department of Education can be required to disclose information, it is possible that the results for students in a home-based educational program will be requested. However, these results will not be available at a level below a state aggregate.

Important: Colorado Revised Statute §22-7-1006.3(3)(b) states the following:

A child who is enrolled in a nonpublic school or participating in a nonpublic home-based educational program pursuant to Section 22-33-104.5 is not required to take a state assessment administered pursuant to this section, even though the child may also be attending a public school for a portion of the school day and therefore included in the enrollment of a local education provider.

Therefore, students in a home-based educational program enrolled in courses at a public school **are not required to take the ELA, math, science, and social studies assessments**. For students in a home-based educational program electing to take the exams, their results are not used in calculation of school, district, or state CMAS results (provided the district properly identifies them as home-schooled students).

Notes:

- CoAlt assessments may **not** be administered to home schooled students as CoAlt assessments are a different type of assessment with strict eligibility requirements. For students to qualify for this assessment, they must have an IEP and the assessment must be administered by a licensed educational professional who knows the student best.
- The requirement that children in home-based education be evaluated in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 (22-33-104.5(3)(f), C.R.S.) is different from the state's obligation to administer assessments to public school students under 22-7-1006.3 (e.g., CMAS). As a result, any decisions made related to the administration of state assessments such as CMAS would not apply to the homeschool evaluation requirements. For more information, refer to [Home School in Colorado](#).

Private Schools

For the school year, there is a cost per student for private schools to administer the CMAS assessments. A private school may elect to administer as many CMAS assessments as they desire.

- Private school personnel responsible for handling assessment material must participate in assessment training.
- Private schools must administer CMAS assessments during the assessment window specified by the Colorado Department of Education, according to standard procedure.
- The nonpublic school must pay all costs associated with administering and providing results for the assessments.

Private schools interested in administering CMAS assessments should contact the District Assessment Coordinator for the local public school district.

Retained Students

Students take the CMAS assessment at the grade level in which they are enrolled. For example, a student retained in 5th grade takes the 5th grade CMAS science, math, and ELA assessments again the following year.

Dropout Students

For the purposes of state assessment administration, a dropout student is a student who is at least 18 years of age and for whom there is clear evidence of permanent departure from the school system.

Expelled Students

To indicate that a student is expelled from a school, code the "Expelled" field as "Expelled" in PAnext through the user interface or as "1" when uploaded through the Student Registration/Personal Needs Profile (SR/PNP) import. Include expelled students' demographic information in PAnext, even if they do not test.

It is the district's responsibility to ensure every effort is made to test expelled students receiving educational services. Assessment results for these students are included in district results; they are not included in aggregated school results.

If expelled during the time of testing and the student is not receiving educational services because the student is enrolled in a private school or is homeschooled, the student need not test, but the student's record remains in PAnext.

Code these students with a Not Tested or Void Reason/Code of 03 Withdrew Before/During Testing. The student's results are not included in school or district results if coded correctly.

Suspended Students

Because students who are suspended are enrolled in public schools, it is the district's responsibility to ensure instruction and assessment are offered to these students. Include suspended students' demographic information in PAnext, even if they are not tested. The results for suspended students are included in the school's report as well as the district's report.

Chronically Absent Students

If students are enrolled in a school, regardless of whether they attend school, the district is responsible for testing and accounting for the students.

It is the district's responsibility to ensure all students are accounted for, including chronically absent students.

Open Enrollment Students

"Open enrollment students" refers to students who enrolled in a school other than their neighborhood school through an open enrollment policy. Open enrollment students must test and are coded to their school of attendance.

Foreign Exchange Students

All students enrolled in Colorado schools, including foreign exchange students, are required to take state assessments.

Part-time Students

Students who are enrolled part-time must test; however, this does not apply to students who are also home-schooled or students who are dually enrolled in a private school.

Online Students

Students participating in an online program are enrolled in a Colorado public school under state law [C.R.S. 22-30.7-105 (2) (a,b,c)], and must take the assessments pursuant to Section 22-7-1006.3. Assessments are coordinated through the DAC for the district that runs the online school or has approved the charter for the online school. The assessments must be given at a school or standardized testing site. Secure materials may not be taken from the testing site. The school district in which the student is enrolled is responsible for CMAS testing. Arrangements to administer assessments can be made with a different district, but only when approved by the DAC for the other district.

IMPORTANT NOTE FOR SCHEDULING TESTING OF ONLINE STUDENTS: Test security requires all students take the tests in a standardized manner according to the procedures outlined in this manual.

Dually Enrolled Students

In instances where a student is dually enrolled in both an online school and a "brick and mortar" school, both schools must work together to ensure the student is appropriately assessed and that the student's scores are attributed to the appropriate school.

Unforeseeable Circumstances

At times, students suffer from unforeseeable circumstances less than three months prior to the start of testing, such as a broken arm or a car accident. If, because of these unforeseeable circumstances, a student requires an accommodation for CMAS (e.g., a scribe or an assistive technology device is needed for a student who breaks their writing arm), provide the necessary accommodation or accommodations to the student. An IEP or 504 plan is not required.

Once a student starts testing, the student may not change testing modes. For example, a student who receives a concussion after completing Unit 1 of a computer-based test may not switch to a paper-based test. Since each situation is different based on the circumstance, the District Assessment Coordinator should contact the CDE Assessment Division to determine the most appropriate course of action for the student.

Note: This exception pertains only to unforeseeable circumstances and not to those that could have been reasonably predicted by school or district personnel. As with all accommodations, the primary accommodation must be documented. Populate the “Emergency Accommodation” field with the appropriate information in PAnext through the user interface or upload through the Student Registration/Personal Needs Profile (SR/PNP) file export/import process.

Medical Exemption

Students who are unable to complete or participate in the statewide assessments due to a documented, significant, and fully incapacitating medical condition or emergency (e.g., student is in the hospital after a car crash) that extends across the entire (or remaining) test window should be identified as “Medical Exemption” in the appropriate Student Test invalidation field in PAnext. In order to qualify for special consideration, the incident or condition must be so severe that it prevents the student from participating in instruction offered either at school or at a state or district-run facility.

Note: Do not use this code for students who are absent during testing due to typical illnesses.

Students Placed Out-of-District by a Public Agency

This information pertains to students who are placed by a public agency in Residential Child Care Facilities, Residential Treatment Centers, Day Treatment Programs, or Hospitals with on-ground schools approved by the Colorado State Board of Education. These facilities are also known as “Eligible Facilities”, “Alternative Facilities”, or “Approved Facility Schools”. The list of facilities that currently fall under these categories is found on the webpage for [Office of Facility Schools](#).

Students who are placed in these state-operated programs participate in CMAS and CoAlt assessments as appropriate. CDE’s Office of Facility Schools acts as the school district for the purpose of distributing materials. A state aggregate report for students in out-of-district placement is produced—scores are not included in the local school district or the student’s home district reports.

The facility must account for every student in out-of-district placement with the appropriate information completed, whether the student completes all test units. After scoring, individual student scores are sent to the facility in which the student tested. If the student is no longer in placement at the facility it is the facility’s responsibility to forward the information to the student’s district of residence.

Direct questions about facilities to CDE’s [Office of Facility Schools](#).

Students Attending Facilities Where the District of Location Provides the Educational Services

Students who attend facilities where the district of location provides the educational services take CMAS and CoAlt assessments at the facility. The district of location administers the tests. Attribute resident student scores to a school in the district. Attribute non-resident student scores to a school in the district of residence. For non-resident students, the DAC for the district of location works with the DAC for the district of residence to ensure students are accounted for under a school in the district of residence. There are four institutions that fall under this guideline:

Detained Students

Students who are detained in a regional detention facility are required to take the state assessments, including CMAS and CoAlt, as appropriate. The district responsible for providing educational services at the detention facility is also considered the district of enrollment for state assessment administration purposes. Results for detained students remain with the youth service center where these students received educational services and took the assessment.

First Year in U.S. Multilingual Learners

All First Year in U.S. students must take mathematics, science, and social studies assessments as appropriate by grade and social studies sample selection.

The below information only applies to the ELA assessment.

Use the following guidance to determine if students who are Multilingual Learners, who enrolled in a United States (U.S.) school for the first time on or after April 8, 2024 (first year in the U.S.), will participate in ELA or CSLA, or if they are exempt from language arts testing this year.

- First Year in U.S. students who are Non-English Proficient (NEP), based on WIDA Screener and a local body of evidence, may be exempt from the **English** language arts assessment.
 - Students with a primary or home language other than Spanish are exempt from ELA testing. Use Not Tested Reason 02 for ELA.
 - **Students with a primary or home language of Spanish:**
 - In grades 5 through 8 are exempt from ELA testing. Use Not Tested Reason 02 for ELA.
 - **In grades 3 and 4 who are:**
 - **Receiving Spanish language arts instruction are required to take CSLA.**
 - Not receiving Spanish language arts instruction this year are exempt from ELA including CSLA testing. Use Not Tested Reason 02 for ELA.
 - A parent/guardian of a student who meets exemption guidelines may choose to have their child participate in ELA testing. The student's ELA tests are excluded from Achievement calculations for the current year (2024-25) and the next year (2025-26) but are included in Growth calculations after the second administration (student's 2024-25 ELA score to 2025-26 ELA score).
- First Year in U.S. students who are Limited English Proficient (LEP), based on WIDA Screener and a local body of evidence, take the state language arts assessment that best matches their instruction: CMAS ELA, CSLA (if eligible), or CoAlt ELA (if eligible).
 - **Students in grades 3 and 4 with a primary or home language of Spanish who are receiving Spanish language arts instruction this school year are required to take CSLA.**
 - Students who are not eligible to take CSLA* are encouraged to take ELA.
 - If the student does not test their first year in U.S., they are excluded from Accountability calculations during the current year (2024-25) but are included for Achievement for the next year (2025-26). Use Not Tested Reason 02 for ELA.
 - If the student does test their first year in U.S., they are excluded from Achievement calculations for the current year (2024-25) and the next year (2025-26) but are included in Growth calculations after the second administration (student's 2024-25 ELA score to 2025-26 ELA score).

When registering students in PAnext, districts indicate ELA testing exemption for eligible students by completing the field *Date First Enrolled in U.S. School* (the first date on which the student enrolled in a U.S. public school) and code the ELA assessment as *Not Tested Reason 02*, if applicable.

*Students in grades 3 through 8 with a primary or home language other than Spanish, students in grades 5 through 8 with a primary or home language of Spanish, or students in grades 3 and 4 with a primary or home language of Spanish who are not receiving Spanish language arts instruction.

3.2.4 Verify Test Form Assignment – Computer-based Testing Only

SACs are to assemble and maintain a master list of all students, their accommodations, and form-dependent accessibility features (e.g., text-to-speech). Coordinate preparations and form assignments with the DAC and Sensitive Data users.

- **Prior to testing**, SACs must verify students are assigned the necessary accommodations and form-dependent accessibility features. Verify assignments before students log into the test.
- In PAnext, review PNP settings on the **Manage Student Tests** screen, markers next to SASIDs on **Students in Sessions** screen, Student Roster (Students in Sessions > select session > Resources), and/or **PNP Report** (Reports > Operational Reports > Students and Registrations > PNP Report - Accessibility Features and Accommodations for Student Tests).
 - The following indicators are present for correctly assigned form-dependent accommodations or accessibility features:

SPA	Spanish (DOES NOT include Text-to-Speech)
TTS	English Text-to-Speech
SPA TTS	Spanish Text-to-Speech
AT	Assistive Technology

- If Test Administrators do not see an accessibility feature or accommodation indicator for a student who should have one, they must not let the student log in; Test Administrators must immediately contact the SAC or DAC to address.
- If a student was not assigned a special form type but one is needed:
 - **Prior to preparing and starting the session**, the DAC or the SAC needs to update the student test assignment and then prepare the session. The Test Administrator can then start the session and unlock Unit 1. The student can begin testing.
 - **If the session is already prepared or started**, the DAC or the SAC needs to remove the student’s test from the session, assign the correct special form, and add the student back into the session. The Test Administrator can then unlock Unit 1 and the student can begin testing.

Note: An indicator is not displayed for students requiring computer-based testing auditory/signed presentation scripts. These students must be placed in a session with the Form Group Type set to “Auditory/Signed Presentation” to ensure the assigned form matches the script used by the Test Administrator.

3.3 Test Administration Plan

- Review school testing schedules, including accommodated and make-up groups.
 - Administer units in sequential order for all content areas.
 - Coordinate testing schedules across schools as needed.
 - Refer to *2.4 Scheduling and Testing Time* for guidance on scheduling test sessions.
 - Sample school schedules are available in *Appendix F*.
 - Verify schools have a plan in place to ensure all students have an opportunity to use student practice resources prior to testing ([Practice Resources](#)).

3.3.1 Training Plan

All district and school personnel involved in the administration of the CMAS and CoAlt assessments must be familiar with their individual responsibilities and the CMAS and CoAlt Security Plan. DACs must meet with SACs to ensure they have a training plan in place for Test Administrators and Technology Coordinators. District Technology Coordinators are responsible for training School Technology Coordinators.

Training for all school personnel involved with any aspect of the CMAS and CoAlt administration is required on an annual basis. Thorough training is one of the best ways districts can prevent misadministrations from occurring. Districts are required to collect documentation from all personnel who complete training, demonstrating an understanding of the policies and procedures set forth by the State of Colorado and the district. All personnel involved in assessment administration and the handling of secure materials must sign the *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement (Appendix B)*.

Districts must base their trainings on the live trainings, webinars, and PowerPoint slides provided by CDE and the assessment vendor to train district personnel. Include additional information regarding district-specific policy information. Training materials include this manual, *CMAS Test Administrator Manuals*, the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual*, and the *PAnext User Guide*. Additional training materials, including modules and slide presentations, are available online on the [CMAS Training](#) page and the [Colorado Assessments Portal](#) on the *Manuals and Training* tab. The [PAnext Training Site](#) provides a sandbox environment available for training prior to testing.

CMAS and CoAlt Test Administrators should familiarize themselves with the format of the test, testing procedures, and required materials.

- Instruct all Test Administrators to review the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual* and/or the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual*, as appropriate, prior to administering any tests.

- Test Administrators must also ensure the availability of any needed accessibility features and accommodations prior to the administration of the first test unit.
- If CoAlt Test Administrators need access to student materials in an electronic format, contact the DAC. Electronic materials are secure; distribute in a manner that does not violate test security, including distribution via email.

3.3.2 Security Plan

Prior to testing, DACs must determine and employ a district level security plan. The plan must ensure the following:

District Security Plan
All test materials are secured at all times.
Test materials are kept in a secure, locked district/school location when not in use for testing.
Test materials are not stored in classrooms.
Secure materials are not taken out of district/school buildings except during transport between district and school facilities.

CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement

All personnel involved in assessment administration and the handling of assessment materials must sign the *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement (Appendix B)*. After completing CMAS administration training for DACs, DACs submit their online *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreements* through the link provided by CDE. DACs maintain signed *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreements* from SACs and other district-level personnel (e.g., Sensitive Data, Technology Coordinators); SACs maintain signed *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreements* from Test Administrators and other school-level personnel. Locally maintain documentation of training for three years (i.e., physical or electronic copies).

3.3.3 Prepare the Testing Environment

See 2.3 *Testing Environment* for detailed information regarding test environment requirements and preparation.

3.4.1 TestNav

TestNav is the online assessment delivery system used for computer-based CMAS assessments. TestNav is accessed by students through installable apps.

Installable TestNav is available for laptop, desktop, iPad, and Chromebook devices with the following operating systems:

- Chrome
- iOS
- Linux Ubuntu
- OS X/macOS
- Windows

Features of the installable app:

- Does not depend on other software, such as a browser or Java.
- Downloadable app link varies by operating system.
- Tests are accessed by starting the TestNav app and choosing the appropriate client (i.e., Colorado).

Districts and schools utilizing online assessments must determine how students will access TestNav prior to testing.

3.5 Establish a Testing Schedule

See *2.4 Scheduling and Testing Time* and *Appendix F: Sample School Schedules*.

Test students using accommodated forms at the same time as their peers taking either computer-based or other paper-based tests.

CMAS Computer-based Administration

To the extent possible, assess all students in a grade in the same content area at the same time. Should that not prove possible, assess all students in the same content area within the shortest timeframe practicable (e.g., back-to-back physical testing groups, in the same day, across consecutive days), minimizing interactions between groups of students.

CMAS Paper-based Administration

For general use of the paper-based assessment, all students in a grade must complete the same unit of the same content area assessment at the same time. Should that not prove possible, assess all students within the shortest timeframe practicable **within the same day**, minimizing interactions between groups of students (e.g., during regularly scheduled science period, tested in back-to-back physical testing groups).

CoAlt Administration

The DAC is responsible for establishing the administration schedule and ensuring that every student taking a CoAlt assessment is assessed within the state CMAS and CoAlt assessment window. Districts may use the entire state testing window for administration of this assessment; however, it is expected that students taking the CoAlt assessments will test during the same testing window as their peers taking the CMAS assessments. The CoAlt assessments are untimed and individually administered. Testing may extend over multiple days for an individual student. It is important that scheduling of the assessment is based on the individual needs of the student.

Note: Testing students before or after the state assessment window is a misadministration. Invalidation is required.

3.6 Student Resources

Several resources are available to help familiarize students, educators, and the public with the assessment formats, item types that appear on the assessments, and examples of questions. DACs and SACs should verify schools have a plan in place to ensure all students have an opportunity to use these resources prior to testing.

CMAS Student Practice Resources

Colorado Practice Resources (CPRs) are available to provide students an opportunity to become familiar with the format and functionality of questions that appear on the CMAS computer-based and paper-based assessments. While the use of CPRs is not required, it is encouraged to help ensure students are familiar with the online testing environment and appropriate ways to indicate responses on paper while taking the tests. For online testing, exposure to CPRs in advance of testing is especially important for students planning to use text-to-speech to provide auditory presentation of the assessment content. All resources are available on the [Practice Resources](#) page.

Computer-based

Tutorials

Tutorials guide students through using TestNav, the platform used to take online CMAS assessments. The tutorials familiarize students with how to navigate in TestNav, use online tools and supports, and work with different types of online test questions that may appear on the assessments.

CPRs

The computer-based student practice resources include technology-enhanced items (TEIs) which allow students to indicate their responses to assessment questions in a format other than multiple-choice. The CPRs are not intended to cover all content or TEI types included on operational assessments nor are they intended to be representative of a complete unit or test. CPRs also provide students the opportunity to use TestNav tools and embedded supports.

Paper-based

Paper practice items are comprised of sample CMAS items that provide students an opportunity to become familiar with the format of test items in the paper-based test books. The following types of items are included in the CPRs which students may encounter while taking the paper-based test, including:

Selected Response Items

- **Math:** Selected response items are multiple choice questions. To respond, the student indicates their response in an answer grid or by filling in the circle(s) next to their answer choice.
- **ELA/CSLA, Science, and Social Studies:** Selected response items are multiple choice questions. To respond, the student indicates their response by filling in the circle(s) next to their answer choice.

Correct Mark:



Incorrect Marks:



Constructed response items are questions or prompts that require an independent, written response. To respond, the student writes their answer in the response box in the test book.

Technology-enhanced items (TEIs) converted to the paper testing format may ask students to:

- Circle the correct answer
- Complete a table with checkmarks, Xs, or letters from a list of answer choices
- Fill in the blank
- Draw lines from boxes to correct answers
- Complete a bar graph or histogram
- **Math only:**
 - Interact with a number line
 - Graph points and lines on a coordinate grid
 - Divide and shade shapes to indicate fractions

Scoring Guides and Rubrics

Refer to the CPR scoring guides at [Colorado Assessments Portal Practice Resources](#) for scoring information, including answer keys, sample student responses, score annotations, and scoring rubrics. Computer-based and paper-based CPRs include the same questions so the same scoring guide applies to both formats.

CoAlt Science and Social Studies Practice Resources

The CoAlt science and social studies assessments are paper-based assessments. Use practice resources to help familiarize Test Administrators and students with the assessment format and item types prior to testing.

Selected Response – Students are presented sets of questions with an initial stimulus. Each item has three to four answer choices, one of which is correct. The stimulus provides background information, and the art is repeated on the student facing page with each item. Students are asked to select the correct answer for each item. Selected-response items are designed to assess the highest level of content knowledge and cognitive complexity that can be appropriately measured through this type of item and is appropriate for the associated Extended Evidence Outcome.

Supported Performance Tasks (science only) – Students manipulate option cards to respond to three related prompts for each item. Students use the option cards to complete a chart or graphic. Supported Performance Tasks are designed to assess the highest level of content knowledge and cognitive complexity that can be appropriately measured through this type of item and is appropriate for the associated Extended Evidence Outcome. The items allow for responses that can be provided in approximately five to ten minutes or less.

CoAlt practices resources are available at [Colorado Assessments Portal Practice Resources](#).

3.7 Meet with Test Administrators and Proctors

In preparation for assessment administration, DACs and SACs meet with Test Administrators and proctors. Verify all Test Administrators and proctors are trained for the 2025 administration and sign *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreements* (Appendix B).

At these meetings, provide *CMAS Test Administrator Manuals* to CMAS Test Administrators and provide *CoAlt Test Administrator Manuals* to CoAlt Test Administrators (arrival dates listed in *Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt Critical Dates*).

These manuals provide information regarding Test Administrator responsibilities, test materials, test security (including chain of custody requirements and ethics), procedures, and “SAY” directions for the assessments. Test Administrators must confirm the manuals they use are clearly labeled “2025” before administering assessments.

3.8 Test Materials

For CMAS and CoAlt assessments, test materials from the vendor, Pearson, are packaged by school and shipped to each district. The following table indicates the materials for each assessment.

3.8.1 Secure and Nonsecure Test Materials

CMAS

The SAC must distribute test materials to and from Test Administrators on each testing day. Do not store test materials in classrooms prior to or following each administration session. Test materials that are distributed by SACs to Test Administrators for test administration include, but are not limited to:

CoAlt

The SAC must distribute test materials to and from the Test Administrator on each testing day. Do not store test materials in classrooms prior to or following each administration session. Test materials distributed by SACs to Test Administrators for CoAlt administration include, but are not limited to:

CoAlt Paper-based Materials	Description
CoAlt Test Administrator Manual	The CoAlt Test Administrator manual provides information necessary for the administration of the CoAlt science and social studies assessments.
Test Books	The Test Administrator uses the CoAlt Test Book to read administration script from the Test Administrator page while student response pages face the student.
Task Manipulatives – Science only	Students use task manipulatives to respond to Supported Performance Tasks. Prior to testing, Test Administrators must cut apart the task manipulatives.
Answer Document	Test Administrators use the answer document to record student responses during testing. For science, Test Administrators must indicate the Form on the answer document (A or B). After testing, return answer documents to Pearson for scoring.
Task Manipulative Envelope – Science only	Transport materials between the test environment and the central storage area in an unsealed task manipulative envelope. After testing, return task manipulatives and the Secure Return Form to Pearson in this envelope. Note: Test books do not fit in envelopes.

Upon request, DACs may distribute PDF versions of the CoAlt task manipulatives. DACs should contact the CDE Assessment Division for access to secure PDFs of task manipulatives. Save files on a memory stick for ease in distribution to Test Administrators; do not send task manipulatives via email. DACs are responsible for ensuring all electronic CoAlt

task manipulatives are removed from electronic devices, and that memory sticks used for distribution are erased or securely destroyed. (See *Secure Data Removal Form* in *Appendix G*.)

3.8.2 Receive, Document, and Store Test Materials

Secure and non-secure materials are sent to the district in one shipment, boxed by school (see *Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt Critical Dates*). The shipment contains Assessment Coordinator kits, *CBT* and/or *PBT Test Administrator Manuals*, and student testing materials.

DACs receive and sign for test materials from UPS. DACs immediately inventory testing materials. It is important that every testing site has the correct test materials for each student who will test. If the initial shipment of test materials does not include everything students will need at testing time, DACs must first make sure the appropriate information is indicated on students' PAnext PNPs, then order additional materials during PAnext additional orders windows.

After inventorying the shipment, DACs distribute materials to schools no more than **one week** prior to the start of each school's testing window. SACs distribute the *Test Administrator Manuals* as soon as possible so Test Administrators can review as needed.

When materials are received from the DAC, the SAC uses the *School Packing List* to review the materials included in the school's shipment. Next, use the *School Security Checklist* to plan and eventually track distribution of appropriate test materials to each Test Administrator. Open sealed packages of secure materials up to **four days** prior to administration.

The SAC counts the received materials to verify that there is an adequate number of *CBT* and/or *PBT Test Administrator Manuals*. If additional materials are needed, notify the DAC immediately.

- One *CMAS Test Administrator Manual* (test format specific) is provided for every 20 students registered in PAnext as of January 24, 2025.
- Paper test books are received in singles (one test book for each student registered for paper-based testing).

Be sure any case of missing or damaged test books or other test materials is immediately reported to the DAC. If necessary, the DAC will place an additional order for an equal quantity of replacement materials after completing the *Form to Report Contaminated, Damaged, or Missing Materials* (link in *Appendix E*).

Report the following occurrences immediately to Pearson:

- Non-receipt of student test materials listed on the School Packing List.
- Discovery of unusable student test materials.
- Discovery of missing or duplicate barcode/sequence numbers on any student test materials.

During testing, SACs distribute test materials to and from Test Administrators on each testing day. Track all movement of secure materials on the school's chain of custody form (see *2.1.2 Chain of Custody Requirements*). Do not store test materials in classrooms prior to or following the day of administration.

Save the Pearson boxes in which materials are received. These are used to return test materials after testing.

Apply pre-ID/student labels

Pre-ID/student labels are produced for students with paper-based CMAS or CoAlt test assignments in PANext as of January 24, 2025. **Schools apply the ID labels to Box C** on student test books (CMAS) and answer documents (CoAlt) before or after testing. Box C specifically indicates to **Place the Student ID Label Here** (see below image). If ID labels are applied before testing, ensure Test Administrators know to check the labels and distribute test books to the appropriate students. If ID labels are applied after testing, ensure student names are written on the test materials and that the label applied post-testing matches the name on the test materials. See *Apply Student ID Labels* in *5.1.2 Organize Materials (SAC)* for more information. **Note:** Do not cover the pre-printed material barcode in the bottom right corner when applying the ID label. Box A *and* the material barcode box specifically indicate **Do NOT Affix Student ID Label Here**.



Material Shipments

The following table indicates the materials included in the initial shipment from the vendor. All coordinator kits and CMAS Test Administrator Manuals arrive in this shipment. **Student materials included in the shipment are based on student registrations in PANext as of the initial orders deadline: Friday, January 24, 2025.**

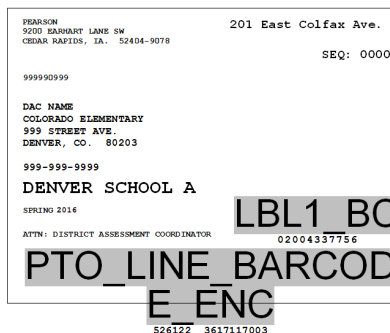

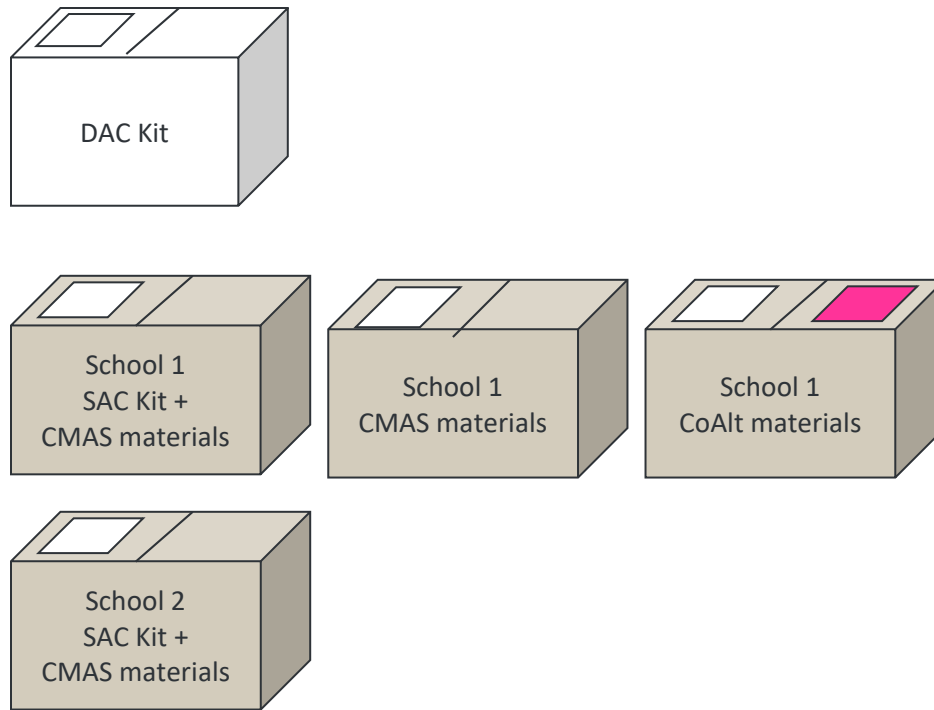
Each box is addressed to the attention of the DAC, and the label indicates the district and school.

The white box contains the District Coordinator Kit which includes materials for the DAC (refer to the table on the previous page for a list of materials included in the District Coordinator Kit). The next box in the shipment includes the School Coordinator Kit and test materials for the first school in the district. Subsequent boxes may contain additional materials for the first school, depending on the school’s selected testing format and accommodated material needs.

The boxes are marked with labels. All boxes have a white UPS label that identifies the school for which the materials are intended. Boxes containing CoAlt materials are identified with a neon pink label.



After removing the DAC Kit from Box 1 and inventorying all materials in all boxes, the DAC distributes boxes containing School Coordinator Kits and test materials to schools as identified on the box labels. The following diagram illustrates a shipment for a hypothetical district with two schools.



- The white box contains the District Coordinator Kit.
- The first brown box contains the School Coordinator Kit for School 1, and some CMAS materials for School 1. Boxes 2 and 3 are also for School 1, which is receiving materials for CMAS and CoAlt.
- Box 4 is for School 2, which is only receiving CMAS materials. It is labeled as the last box in the shipment (e.g., “Box 4 of 4”). Because the school is receiving only one box, it contains the SAC Kit and all materials.

Box 1 of the shipment contains several forms that DACs must use to inventory the received test materials.

- Use the **Pallet Detail** to identify the boxes that must go to each school. Use the same form to verify the correct test materials were sent for all participating schools.
- Use the **District Packing List** to review the materials that were shipped.
- Use the **District Receipt Form** to sign out materials to each SAC, verifying they received the quantities listed on this form. Specific instructions appear on the form.

Deliver boxes containing CoAlt test materials to schools in time for Test Administrators to review test administration procedures detailed in the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual*. Upon request, DACs may distribute PDF versions of the CoAlt task manipulatives. See 3.9.1 *CoAlt* for additional information.

3.8.3 Account for Damaged Test Materials

If CMAS test books or CoAlt answer documents are damaged during testing (e.g., ripped, contaminated), contact the DAC and complete the *Form to Report Contaminated, Damaged, or Missing Materials* (link in *Appendix E*). If materials containing printing errors are discovered, contact Customer Service at 1-888-687-4759 for assistance.

3.8.4 Additional Orders

Only the official DAC registered with CDE can place orders for additional materials. Additional orders for paper tests and accommodated materials (e.g., auditory/signed presentation scripts, large print test books) are not approved unless they are matched to existing student registrations. If the need for material is newly identified, update the corresponding student PNPs before placing the additional order. If an order is submitted and needs to be updated, edit the previously submitted additional order (do not create a new order). DACs can also order more shipping return labels, CMAS Test Administrator Manuals, and CMAS secure return envelopes through the additional orders process.

See *Quick Reference Guide to Additional Orders* in *Appendix H: PAnext* for step-by-step guidance.

3.9 Finalize Preparations

Work with the SAC and Technology Coordinator to ensure proper space and devices are available for testing. Refer to [2.3 Testing Environment](#) and [3.3.3 Prepare the Testing Environment](#) for additional information on testing environments.

3.9.1 Online Testing

Proctor Cache Test Content – Optional

Cache (download) test content prior to the opening of the state's testing window (see *Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt Critical Dates* for proctor caching date). If sites are using proctor caching, **complete this activity at least one day before** the school's testing begins. Work with the Technology Coordinator to verify the proctor caching device is identified, and content is cached for sites.

Prepare Test Sessions

DACs and SACs can prepare test sessions before the state's testing window opens, but only after confirming all student PNP attributes are correct. The time it takes to prepare sessions depends on the number of sessions prepared at once and the number of student tests assigned to each session. **Prepare test sessions at least one day before** the school's testing begins. Do not prepare test sessions that schools will not start (e.g., parent excusal sessions).

3.9.2 CoAlt

Review school test schedules to ensure sessions are scheduled. To the extent possible, assess students taking alternate assessments in content areas for which they participate in general education classes at the same time as their general education peers to avoid missed instruction. Schools may also ensure students taking alternate assessments do not miss instruction from their general education class(es) through other means.

Distribute electronic CoAlt task manipulatives, as needed for preparation of accommodated materials, following approval from CDE. For instructions, see CoAlt information in [3.8.1 Secure and Nonsecure Test Materials](#).

3.10 Meet with Students

Prior to administration, meet with students to prepare them for the applicable content area assessments.

4.1 During Testing

4.1.2 Managing Test Sessions in PAnext

Ensure all students present during the school testing window test.

- Supervise make-up sessions as needed. Refer to *2.4.3 Make-up Testing* for more information.
- Track test unit and session completion in PAnext through the **Students in Sessions** screen or view all session statuses on the **Session** screen by selecting “Show all results” from the **Search** drop-down menu.
- Districts must account for all students in PAnext, including those who are not present during the testing window.

4.1.3 Technology Tasks During Testing

Technology Coordinators are available during testing to provide technical support to schools. For instructions on resolving error codes and messages received on student devices during testing, refer to [TestNav Troubleshooting](#).

4.1.4 Monitor Test Activity and Maintain Test Security

DACs are actively involved in test administration through monitoring of the administration and test security procedures described in this manual. DACs ensure schools understand and follow active test proctoring procedures for CMAS and CoAlt and that all secure materials are collected after testing and CBT units are locked at the end of each testing day.

4.1.5 Procedures for Contaminated, Torn, or Damaged Materials

If CMAS test books or CoAlt answer documents are damaged during testing (e.g., ripped, contaminated), contact the DAC and complete the *Form to Report Contaminated, Damaged, or Missing Materials* (link in *Appendix E*). If materials containing printing errors are discovered, contact Customer Service for assistance (1-888-687-4759).

If a test book is contaminated with bodily fluids (e.g., blood, vomit), follow school or district biohazard protocol.

4.1.6 End of Unit Tasks

After completion of a test unit, DACs and SACs must ensure the following tasks are completed. Train Test Administrators on the steps required to complete these tasks.

Collect Materials

At the end of each unit, the Test Administrator must collect any used and unused secure test materials and deliver them to the SAC. Document the return of all secure test materials (used and unused) on the school's chain of custody form.

Collect the following materials:

Online

- Student Testing Tickets
- Used scratch paper
- School-printed math reference sheets and grade 11 science periodic tables
- Auditory/signed presentation script materials

Paper

- Test books (including ancillary materials such as grade 11 science periodic tables, math reference sheets and rulers, and CoAlt TAM, CoAlt answer documents (ensure the Form is indicated – A or B), and science task manipulatives)
- Used scratch paper
- Auditory/signed presentation script materials

Ensure TestNav Logout and Lock Units

At the end of an online unit, Test Administrators or SACs must ensure the unit status on the **Students in Session** screen in PANext changed to **Completed** for each tested student. If the unit status does not display **Completed**, the student did not properly submit the unit. Instruct students with incomplete statuses to sign back into TestNav on the same device they used to test, then go through the proper steps to submit their answers before leaving the test environment (if the unit status is **Exited**, the Test Administrator must **resume** the test in PANext before the student can sign in again). Step-by-step directions for submitting final unit answers are included in the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual*. **Note:** Student test units only go into **Completed** status if *the student* selects the green **Submit Final Answers** button on the **End of Unit** screen in TestNav.

If a unit status is not **Completed** but the assessment window closed, the Test Administrator alerts the SAC who **marks complete** the unit for the appropriate student. Additionally, lock units at the end of a test unit. This is especially important for students who were absent during testing. Lock the unit for all students to ensure the Test Administrator can unlock the next unit without error.

Administer Make-Up Testing

If a student is absent from testing, or if an interruption requires a student to leave the testing environment during testing, Test Administrators must notify the SAC to coordinate make-up testing. For additional details regarding make-up testing, refer to *2.4.3 Make-up Testing*. Administer all make-up units sequentially for all content areas.

Online Testing Tip: To track absent students, Test Administrators write the missed unit on the student's testing ticket.

4.1.7 Managing Testing for Students Who Move/Transfer

Refer to [Transfer Guidance Documentation](#) for step-by-step directions for managing testing for students who move or transfer.

District-to-District Movement (Cross-District Movement)

If a new student was previously registered for testing in another district and an error is received when trying to register the student in the new district, DACs or PAnext users with the Sensitive Data role submit an **Enrollment Transfer Request** through the **Work Requests** feature in PAnext (UI or file export/import process). The previous district of enrollment must review and approve or reject the request in a timely manner.

- If a request is rejected, a reason for the rejection is required (e.g., completed testing before leaving the district).
- If the request is approved, the new district of enrollment must confirm the accuracy of the student’s demographics on the **Register Students** screen in PAnext or through the file export/import process.

If a transfer request is submitted and timely action is not taken by the previous district, refer to the [DAC Directory](#) to contact that district’s DAC as each district determines who processes transfer requests. Do not email Personally Identifiable Information (PII) including student names, SASIDs, etc.

Online

If a student registration is transferred and the student was assigned to a test in the previous district, PAnext places the student in a transfer test session in the new school named “Transferred [Subject] [Grade]”. Move the student’s test into another test session in the new school to start or continue testing. Transfer test sessions cannot be prepared or started.

Paper

For students who started testing elsewhere, paper-based forms (including ancillary materials such as grade 11 science periodic tables; math reference sheets; and CoAlt test books, answer documents, and science task manipulatives) are securely transferred between districts through DAC-to-DAC handoff or via secure shipment requiring signatures.

School-to-School Movement (In-District Movement)

DACs can update student registrations from one school to another within the district. A Student Transfer Request *is not needed* for in-district movement.

4.2 Procedures for Testing Irregularities

Refer to *2.2 Testing Irregularities and Security Breaches* for detailed information about testing irregularities. SACs report testing irregularities to DACs; DACs report testing irregularities to CDE.

DACs ensure SACs follow proper procedures for reporting testing irregularities as soon as practicable. DACs investigate and report testing irregularities and security breaches in a timely manner to ensure appropriate steps are taken to mitigate the situation. Testing irregularities may require invalidation of tests.

If necessary, the DAC completes a *Form to Report a Testing Irregularity or Security Breach (Appendix D)* and the *Test Incident Report* spreadsheet (downloaded from the [CMAS Training](#) page) and sends completed documents to CDE through the **Assessment Forms** folder on **CDE Assessment Syncplicity** by **May 2, 2025**.

4.2.1 Dismissing Students for Misconduct

Remove disruptive students from the testing environment. Disciplinary action is the decision of the school/district. Test students who exhibit disruptive behavior in a separate environment as indicated in their IEPs.

4.2.2 Item Irregularities During Testing

Test Administrators report persistent or reoccurring item irregularities to the SAC, who reports to the DAC and Customer Service.

Online

Computer-based item irregularities include, but are not limited to, device malfunctions and error messages the Test Administrator could not resolve. Technology Coordinators and Test Administrators must NOT take photos of error screens but can note error code numbers (the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual* appendix includes common error codes and resolution actions).

- **Single student.** If a single student experiences a technology disruption, Test Administrators:
 1. Note the time of the interruption and calculate the remaining unit testing time.
 2. Contact local Technology Coordinators and/or Pearson Customer Support, according to the school's procedures, to provide troubleshooting guidance.
 3. Provide the student with the remaining unit testing time once their test is resumed.
- **Multiple students.** If multiple students experience technology disruption, Test Administrators:
 1. Pause testing until the problem is resolved.
 2. Note the time of the interruption and calculate the remaining unit testing time.
 3. Contact local Technology Coordinators and/or Pearson Customer Support, according to the school's procedures, to provide troubleshooting guidance.
 4. Once the issues are resolved, resume students' tests in PearsonAccess^{next} before instructing students to sign back into TestNav. Students continue testing on the devices they were previously using.
 5. Provide students with the remaining unit testing time to complete testing.

Paper

If test books containing printing errors are discovered, contact the DAC who will contact Pearson Customer Service.

4.2.3 Procedures for Safety Threats and Severe Weather

In the rare event that there is a safety threat or severe weather occurs during a testing unit, follow the protocol outlined in *2.2.1 Testing Irregularities and Security Breaches*.

5.0 After Testing Tasks

DAC, SAC, and Technology Coordinator Responsibilities

5.1.2 Collect and Organize Materials (SAC)

Materials are collected, inventoried, and organized at the school by the SAC before they are returned to the DAC. Once returned to the DAC, materials are inventoried an additional time for return shipment to the vendor.

Collect Materials

The SAC is responsible for collecting CMAS and CoAlt materials from Test Administrators each day of administration, preferably within 15 minutes of the end of each test session. Refer to *2.1.2 Chain of Custody Requirements* for details.

Immediately after the final unit for each test, ensure all Student Testing Tickets, *Test Administrator Manuals*, used scratch paper, accommodated materials, test books, ancillary materials like CoAlt answer documents and science task manipulatives, and all other student materials are collected from Test Administrators and are secured. Use the School Security Checklist to ensure all secure CMAS and CoAlt materials are collected.

Remove electronic material from any assistive technology device used for a student accommodation immediately after testing. Send verification of this removal to the DAC. See *Secure Data Removal Form* in *Appendix G: Accommodation Forms*. Return any media used to distribute CoAlt accommodated electronic materials to the DAC for secure destruction.

Report Contaminated and Damaged Test Materials

If a CMAS test book or CoAlt answer document was contaminated with bodily fluids (e.g., blood), follow your school or district biohazard protocol and complete the *Form to Report Contaminated, Damaged, or Missing Materials* accessed through the link in *Appendix E*.

Report Missing Test Materials

Schools must investigate any report of missing test materials. If, after a thorough investigation, a secure test material is not found, the SAC must contact the DAC, who contacts CDE. Complete the *Form to Report Contaminated, Damaged, or Missing Materials* accessed through the link in *Appendix E*. If there is reason to believe a secure document or test content was stolen, photographed, or photocopied, the SAC or DAC must immediately contact CDE to determine a plan of action. This action may include the involvement of local law-enforcement personnel.

Transcription of Student Test Responses

Verify student responses on the paper-based forms are transcribed when necessary. Additional information regarding the following accommodations and appropriate administration procedures are found in *6.0 Administrative Considerations, Accessibility Features, and Accommodations*. Into a scannable test book, transcribe:

- Responses written in large print or braille tests (use scannable test book included in the kit).
- Responses written in a language other than English or Spanish (this is not allowed on ELA and CSLA).
- Responses on assistive technology devices (including devices used for Speech-to-Text and word prediction).

Identify “Do Not Score” Test Materials

In the following situations, mark the covers of large print, braille, or standard print test books as “Do Not Score” and return with nonscorable materials:

- Tests that were started but do not require scoring (e.g., misadministrations).
- Test materials that require transcription (see above details). After transcribing, return the test materials containing the students’ original written responses with nonscorable materials.

Organize Materials

Once collected and inventoried at the school, the SAC organizes materials before they are returned to the DAC. Use the *Scorable Materials Return Checklist (Appendix I)* to ensure scorable boxes only contain scorable materials. Return all test materials, including accommodated materials (e.g., auditory/signed presentation scripts and visual description documents) and the original Pearson shipping boxes, to the DAC for return to Pearson. Once returned to the DAC, materials are inventoried once again before return shipment to the vendor.

Online

CMAS test materials used together with computer-based testing are nonscorable; however, collection and return to the DAC are required after testing. These materials may include any of the following items.

In nonscorable boxes, do not include:

- CoAlt **accommodated** materials to be securely destroyed by the DAC (**does not** include CoAlt task manipulatives)
- Scorable materials (this may result in failure to score CMAS tests and CoAlt answer documents for reporting)

After materials are sorted, apply student ID labels (if not previously completed) and hand grid all demographic fields for students without ID labels (as necessary). Refer to the following information for details.

Apply Student ID Labels

Pre-ID student labels are for students who take the paper-based form of the test and are applied to scannable CMAS test books and CoAlt answer documents. Information verified/provided by DACs and individuals with the Sensitive Data role during student registration is used to print ID labels. These labels are linked to students' SASIDs and information in PANext even though not all information appears on the printed label. Pre-printed ID labels arrive with student test materials only if students are properly assigned to paper-based testing prior to January 24, 2025. ID labels are applied before scorable materials are returned to the vendor for scanning and scoring.

Before applying ID labels, verify the name on the label matches the student's name written on the CMAS test book or CoAlt answer document and the SASID on the label is correct. Affix the pre-coded label in the specified space. **Note:** Do not cover the pre-printed test *material* barcode (lower right corner) with the ID label.

If the ID label is applied to an incorrect CMAS test book or CoAlt answer document or the SASID is incorrect, cover the ID label with a blank label and complete fields on the data grid to match the information in PANext.

The sample demographic page shows where to affix the label. Note the following protocols:

- Only the Assessment Coordinators or a designee may affix labels.
- Store all secure materials in locked storage until returned to DAC or Pearson.
- Place the label only where directed and completely inside the marked area.

Hand Grid Demographic Pages

If no pre-coded label is available for a student taking a paper-based test, complete all fields on the CMAS test book or CoAlt answer document demographic page (back cover) to exactly match the information in PANext. Fields that require bubbling include:

- B. **Last Name** – The full legal last name borne in common by members of a family.
First Name – The full legal first name given to a person at birth, baptism, or through legal change.
Middle Initial (optional) – The first letter of the legal middle name given to a person at birth, baptism, or through legal change.
- D. **Gender** – An individual's sex.
- E. **Date of Birth** – The year, month, and day on which a person was born.
- F. **State Student Identifier (SASID)** – The unique ten-digit code assigned to a student by CDE.
- G. **District Code** – The four-digit CDE code for the district responsible for administering the test to a student.
School Code – The four-digit CDE code for the school responsible for administering the test to a student.

Notes: Fields A (written Student Name, School Name, District Name) and C (location to affix student ID label) do not require bubbling. If a demographic page includes both an ID label and bubbled-in fields, the label overrides any of the gridded information.

Organize CMAS and CoAlt Scorable Test Materials

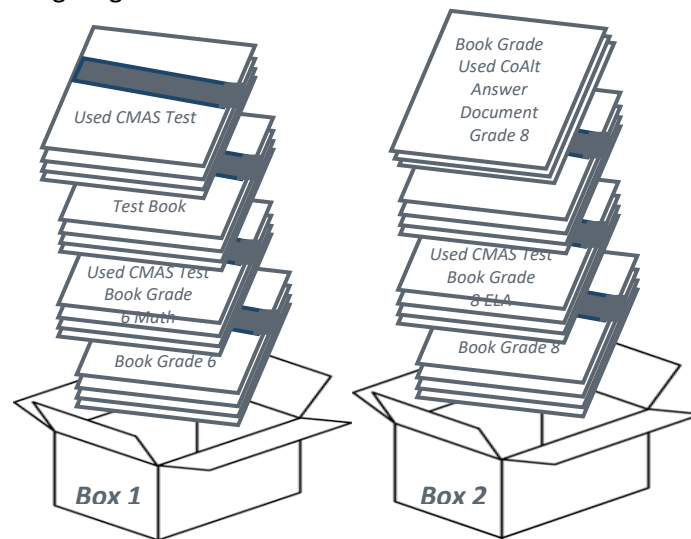
Organize scorable CMAS test books and CoAlt answer documents into stacks by program (i.e., CMAS or CoAlt), grade, content area, and language (i.e., English or Spanish) so the demographic page is facing down.

- Scorable CMAS tests books do not require alphabetization or sorting in any way other than by grade, content area, and language (e.g., Grade 5 Science – English and Grade 5 Science – Spanish in separate stacks).
- Scorable CoAlt answer documents do not require alphabetization or sorting in any way other than by grade (e.g., Grade 5 Science, Grade 8 Science, Grade 11 Science).

Secure the scorable CMAS test book stacks with a paper band provided with the shipment of test materials.

- Use tape to ensure papers band fit around stacks, if necessary (bands are sized for stacks of 10 test books).
- If a stack is too large for a single band, break it down into stacks of 10 and use multiple bands.
 - Mark bands to indicate how many stacks of tests are included for the same assessment in the box. For instance, label bands “1 of 2” and “2 of 2” for 20 Grade 5 Math - English tests split into two stacks.

Place the CMAS and CoAlt stacks in the Pearson boxes in which they were sent, with the lowest grade level going in first (bottom) and the highest grade going in last (top). Place CMAS stacks in the bottom of the box, followed by CoAlt stacks at the top of the box. Example: Box 1 – CMAS Grade 6 ELA (bottom), CMAS Grade 6 Math, CMAS Grade 7 ELA, CMAS Grade 7 Math (top); Box 2 – CMAS Grade 8 Science (bottom), CMAS Grade 8 ELA, CMAS Grade 8 Math, CoAlt Grade 8 Science (top). Refer to the following diagram.



Keep scorable CMAS test books and CoAlt answer documents separate from nonscorable material for return to the DAC.

Return Materials to DAC in Original Boxes

- Use the original Pearson shipping boxes in which test materials were delivered for return shipping. Ensure the original shipping labels and other markings are removed or covered. If more boxes are needed, contact the DAC.
- Prior to placing test materials in a box, securely tape the bottom of each box to prevent breakage. Reinforce all seams (top, bottom, and sides), following an “H” pattern.
- Use separate boxes for scorable and nonscorable materials.
 - Sort all scorable materials are in scorable shipping boxes. Use the *Scorable Materials Return Checklist (Appendix I)*.
 - Place all nonscorable materials in nonscorable shipping boxes. Multiple types of nonscorable materials can go into a single nonscorable box as long as the materials are sorted and grouped together.
- Do NOT seal boxes. Return unsealed boxes to the DAC to check the contents before returning to the vendor.

Reminder: Sort and/or package materials as directed by the DAC. If there is a conflict between the DAC’s district-specific instructions and the instructions in this manual, follow the DAC’s instructions.

5.1.3 Package Materials for Return Shipping (DAC)

DACs collect all materials from SACs. Use the *District Receipt Form* to verify all materials are signed in from SACs, including accommodated materials. As materials are received from SACs, ensure the following:

- All materials are stored in a secure, locked location until they are returned to the vendor.
- Securely destroy/recycle used scratch paper from each school if it is not shipped to the vendor. Complete the *Scratch Paper Verification* form in *Appendix C*.
- Electronic material is removed from any assistive technology device used as part of a student accommodation. Collect verification of this removal from SACs if this type of accommodation was used during testing. Refer to *Secure Data Removal* form in *Appendix G*.

Inventory Test Materials for Return Shipping

All test materials are collected by the SAC and delivered to the DAC after testing. Materials may include scorable and nonscorable materials. All scorable CMAS test books and CoAlt answer documents are returned to the vendor as soon as paper testing is complete. Verify used and unused test materials are sorted and grouped as described in *Section 5.1.2*.

If multiple boxes are received from a single school and are not filled to capacity, **consolidate boxes from that school only** so fewer boxes are shipped back to the vendor. Proper consolidation requires grouping secure materials together by type into scorable or nonscorable boxes – use the *Scorable Materials Return Checklist (Appendix I)*. Multiple types of nonscorable materials can go into a single box as long as the materials are sorted and grouped together.

Group sorted items together as follows, by assessment (sort CMAS scorable test books and CoAlt answer documents first in order to be returned to the vendor for processing immediately after paper-based testing is completed):

Prepare Boxes for Shipping

Reuse the original Pearson shipping boxes to return test materials to the vendor. Ensure the original shipping labels and other markings are removed or covered. **If more boxes are needed, place an additional order via PAnext or contact Pearson Customer Support at 1-888-687-4759.**

Prior to packing test materials, ensure the bottom of each box is securely taped and that all seams (top, bottom, and sides) are reinforced following an “H” pattern to prevent breakage. If any box is not completely filled, add only crumpled paper to avoid damage caused by shifting during shipment. Add enough crumpled paper to hold the documents in place during transit. Do not use foam “popcorn” or “peanuts”.

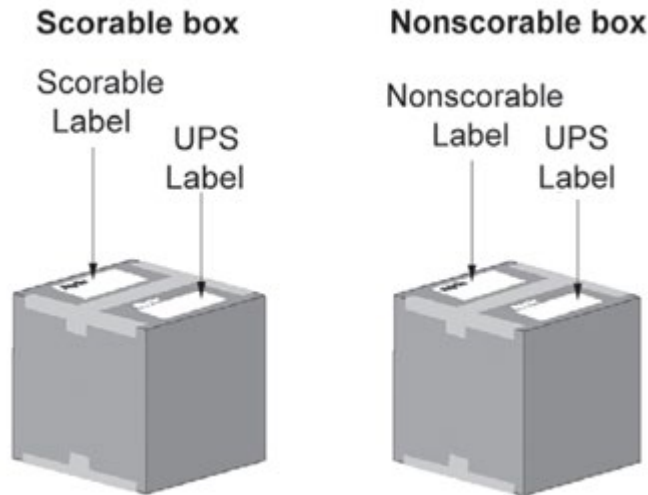
Note about freight shipments: For districts that received their initial materials via freight shipment, use the following directions to return materials non-freight, or follow the freight return directions received from Pearson.

Apply return labels

Multiple types of return labels are provided in the Coordinator Kit:

- White UPS shipping labels
 - Boxes do not ship without a UPS shipping label.
 - If the weight of the box exceeds the weight printed on the UPS label, UPS will update the label upon pickup.
 - Some white UPS labels have the same address as the scorable return labels; some have the same address as the nonscorable return labels.
 - The address on each UPS label must match the address on the return label, which depends on the material type. Ensure the UPS label and return label match when applying labels to boxes.
- CMAS/CoAlt scorable material labels = orange
 - Used standard print CMAS test books
 - Used CoAlt answer documents
- CMAS/CoAlt nonscorable material labels = blue
 - Refer to the table on the previous page for nonscorable materials.

Affix the proper return label and UPS shipping label to each box, ensuring labels are clearly visible. Refer to the following diagram for suggested label placement.



Mark the boxes

Number the district’s shipping labels sequentially to show both the number of the box and the number of total boxes for the district shipment. Mark each box with a unique number such as “1 of 3”, “2 of 3”, and “3 of 3” on the labels affixed to the boxes. If separate return shipments are scheduled, follow this same unique box sequence each time.

Store and ship test materials

Secure all materials at all times. Hold the boxes for pickup by UPS. See *Contact UPS to Schedule Pickup* for instructions. UPS must pick up **scorable** materials no later than **Wednesday, April 30, 2025**; UPS must pick up **nonscorable** materials no later than **Friday, May 2, 2025**.

Contact UPS to Schedule Pickup

Each SAC must return all test materials to the DAC in time to inventory and prepare materials for UPS pickup. DACs may set district deadlines for schools that are earlier than the deadlines listed below. DACs must schedule pickup arrangements 24–48 hours in advance of the pickup.

¹ UPS must pick up scorable materials no later than Wednesday, April 30, 2025, otherwise *there is no guarantee* records for these PBT students **will be included in SBD or scored**. CDE encourages early returns of paper test books to expedite scoring and results processes and timelines.

² Districts participating in the early grade 11 science window return grade 11 science materials the week of April 21.

Call UPS at **1-800-823-7459** to schedule pickups for Ground shipping. Tell the UPS representative you are calling in a pickup request for Pearson and will use their “Return Service”. Provide the following information to UPS:

- The physical location for package pickup.
- The estimated number of packages for pickup.

Certain locations may have time/date constraints for pick up. The UPS representative will let you know if the pickup cannot be made as requested. Once the pickup is confirmed, the district receives a confirmation number from UPS. Reference the number in the future if questions or changes arise.

Before boxes are picked up by UPS, make a note of the tracking numbers on the UPS shipping labels. Keep a record of the tracking numbers for future reference.

5.1.4 PAnext Cleanup Activities

Verify all students enrolled in the school are accounted for in PAnext

According to state law, all students in grades 3 through 8 are required to take the math and ELA assessments. All students in grades 5, 8, and 11 are to take the science assessments. All students in grades 4 and 7 at schools selected for social studies administration are required to take the social studies assessments.

Enroll all students (as applicable by grade), including students taking paper-based tests, in PAnext and assign the appropriate tests (e.g., 5th grade ELA, math, and science; 3rd grade ELA/CSLA and math). If there are students who did not test or did not complete testing (single or multiple content areas), indicate the appropriate invalidation for each unused or incomplete test assignment through a Not Tested or Void Test Score Reason/Code. Refer to *Appendix K: Data* for additional information.

Stop all started online CMAS test sessions

Online test sessions cannot be stopped if any units for any students in the session are in a status other than “Completed” or “Marked Complete”.

- If the student never started testing (i.e., all units in “Ready” status), remove the student’s test from the test session. Indicate a Not Tested Reason/Code for the student test record on the Student Test Details screen in PAnext (see *Appendix K: Data* for guidance).
- If the student started testing but did not finish (i.e., units in a combination of statuses such as “Completed”, “Exited”, “Ready”) “Mark Complete” the units that are not “Completed”. If appropriate, indicate a Void Test Score Reason/Code for the student test record on the Student Test Details screen in PAnext (see *Appendix K: Data* for guidance).
 - If unable to enter a Void Test Score Reason/Code due to user account permissions in PAnext, contact the DAC to have the test(s) coded appropriately.

Not Tested and Void Tests

For students who did not take a particular test or did not complete a started test, apply an invalidation code to the test record(s). There are two categories of invalidations, Not Tested Codes/Reasons and Void Test Score Codes/Reasons. The district or school applies Not Tested Codes/Reasons and Void Test Score Codes/Reasons to individual test assignments in PAnext for both online and paper-based tests, as appropriate. For example, if a Parent Excuse was received for a student for math and ELA, apply the appropriate Parent Excuse (09) invalidation to the student’s ELA record and separately apply to the student’s math record.

Enter Not Tested and Void Test Score Codes/Reasons through the PAnext UI or through a Student Test Update (STU) file. The ability to enter this information through either method is determined by user permissions as assigned through PAnext. Refer to *Appendix K: Data* for information regarding code definitions, step-by-step directions, and timeframes.

Note: Not Tested Reasons/Codes **do not** invalidate scanned scorable paper tests or online tests that appear as **Completed** or **Marked Complete** in PAnext.

Not Tested Codes/Reasons are only used in the following situations:

- For paper-based testing if the test (whether not started, started, or completed) was returned to the vendor in a nonscorable box.
- For computer-based testing if the student did not begin testing and:
 - Is in a started online test session but did not start a test. Remove the student from the started test session before the session is “stopped”. Indicate a not tested code/reason for the student test.
 - Is in an online test session that was not started. Indicate a not tested code/reason for the student test.
 - Is assigned to an online test but not assigned to an online test session. Indicate a not tested code/reason for the student test.

Users with the **DAC, SAC, or Sensitive Data** role can indicate Not Tested Codes/Reasons. The option to indicate a Not Tested Code/Reason appears on student tests under **Setup > Students > Manage Student Tests** in PAnext if the test is not in a “prepared” or “started” online test session.

Void Test Score Codes/Reasons are only used in the following situations:

- For paper-based testing if the test (whether not started, started, or completed) was returned to the vendor in a scorable box **and** scoring should not take place.
- For computer-based testing if the student:
 - Began and may have finished testing and submitted the test but should not receive a score. Indicate a void test score code/reason for the test.
 - Began but may not have finished testing, school personnel applied “mark complete” to the test record, and the student should not receive a score. Indicate a void test score code/reason for the test.
 - Never started testing, but school personnel applied “mark complete” to all units of the online test record and the student should not receive a score. Indicate a void test score code/reason for the test.

Only users with the **Student Test Update** role can indicate Void Test Score Codes/Reasons. The option to indicate a void code appears on student tests under **Setup > Students > Manage Student Tests** in PAnext once the system recognizes the test is in a **completed** status.

- For paper-based testing, the void option is not available for tests returned to the vendor in scorable boxes until the tests are scanned into PAnext.
 - If a void test score code/reason is applied to a student test record, the record **does not** receive an overall score.*
- For computer-based testing, voids are only allowed for tests with all test units in a **completed** status.
 - Student tests that were completed or marked complete appear as “attempt” in the online test status field, which triggers the production of a score. If a void test score code/reason is applied to a student test record, the record **does not** receive an overall score.*

*A Void Test Score Code/Reason 09 Parent Excuse is valid for students who start testing but do not respond in the last unit of the test. This code is not valid and will not be processed if the student responded in all units, and a score is produced. See *Data Section 3: Void Test Score and Not Tested Codes and Descriptions - 09 Parent Excuse* for the exception to this information.

Note: Indicating a “Marked Complete Reason” **does not** invalidate a test; apply a Void Test Score Code/Reason separately (as appropriate for each test assigned to the student) through the steps included in *Appendix K: Data*.

“Marked Complete Reasons” are for district or school use only. They do not follow the student test record into scoring and therefore do not stop a test from going through scoring nor do they exclude scores from district and school reports and accountability. While a marked complete reason is required if a student test is marked complete, the district or school must still apply a Void Test Score Code/Reason to the student test (e.g., “Withdrawn” is entered for a marked complete reason so in addition to this step, indicate Void 03 on the student test record).

Verify/update student demographics

If assigned the Sensitive Data role, check student demographic information in PAnext to verify all information is correct for all students (computer-based and paper-based), including CoAlt and CSLA. For instructions, see “Create and Edit Student Records” in the *PAnext User Guide*. Provide any needed updates, including accommodations that were provided for students during testing, through the PAnext User Interface before the **May 7, 2025** deadline. If unable to verify and update student demographics due to PAnext user role permissions, provide the DAC with the appropriate information for any known updates.

Rejected Student Tests

When test materials are scanned by the vendor, any hand gridded demographic data is matched to student registrations in PAnext. If the data in PAnext and the gridded data are not exact matches, the record is rejected. Rejected records are not scored. To fix these records, use PAnext to change either the scanned information gridded on the test material or change the registration data stored in PAnext so the two records match. For step-by-step directions, see “Fix Rejected Student Test Details” in the *PAnext User Guide*.

5.1.5 Complete Post-testing Forms

The link to the *Post Test Compliance*, completed by the DAC, is found in *Appendix C: Colorado Forms*. The *Post Test Compliance Report* certifies the administration of the CMAS and CoAlt assessments complied with all procedures and instructions as described in this manual, the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual*, and the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual*; that any **major** misadministrations were reported to CDE; and all materials were returned to the vendor. The district superintendent also signs the *Post Test Compliance Report*.

The *Scratch Paper Verification* form is found in *Appendix C: Colorado Forms* and confirms all used scratch paper from all schools was securely destroyed/recycled or shipped to the vendor after testing. CDE requires districts return this form in the CDE Assessment folder on Syncplicity by **Friday, May 2, 2025**. Notify Sara Loerzel (loerzel_s@cde.state.co.us) once the completed form is posted.

As part of post-testing compliance, DACs **declare, investigate, and report testing irregularities (e.g., misadministrations and security breaches)**. DACs complete remaining investigations and report resulting determinations of testing irregularities and security breaches to CDE by **Friday, May 2, 2025**. The *Testing Irregularity Report (Appendix D)* and corresponding spreadsheet (available for download from the [CMAS Training](#) page) are used to request suppressions (entered by CDE).

5.1.6 Keep Records

Locally store the following documentation for three years (electronic or physical copies):

- Completed *Verification of District Training* form
- Completed *Scratch Paper Verification* form
- Signed copies of *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement* forms for all individuals involved with assessment administration or handling secure assessment materials
- Completed *Post Test Compliance* form
- Completed *Testing Irregularity Reports* and corresponding spreadsheet
- School Security Checklist
- Chain of custody documentation to ensure there are no questions or concerns related to the security of the assessments or handling of materials after the fact. The DAC and each SAC must be able to assure the state, if any questions arise, that every step was taken to ensure security of the test materials.

6.0 Administrative Considerations, Accessibility Features, and Accommodations

6.1 Introduction

Administrative considerations, accessibility features, and accommodations are changes to assessment administration that provide individual students access to test. Administrative considerations and accessibility features are available to any student, as appropriate, while accommodations are only available to students with disabilities and students learning English who have a documented need on their IEP, 504, or Multilingual Learner (ML) plans.

Districts must have a plan in place to ensure and monitor the appropriate use of administrative considerations, accessibility features, and accommodations. Any *modification* of the assessment fundamentally changes the assessment's intended measure and, therefore, is a misadministration resulting in an invalid score.

6.1.1 Administrative Considerations

Administrative considerations are available to any student who may benefit from a change in the *testing conditions*. Districts and schools have the authority to make administrative determinations for any student as long as test security is not compromised, and testing environment requirements are met. Generally, most students are tested with their peers; however, under certain circumstances, a student may benefit from a change in the testing conditions. The following considerations are available to all students for both computer-based and paper-based testing:

- Adaptive and specialized equipment or furniture (e.g., slant board, yoga ball)
- Frequent breaks that do not stop the testing clock
- Noise buffers/headphones
- Separate or alternate location
- Small group testing
- Specified seating
- Time of day

Note: Administrative considerations are not recorded in PANext.

Adaptive and Specialized Equipment or Furniture

Some students may require specialized equipment or furniture such as special seating, weighted vests, fidget tools, or adaptive keyboards and should have access to it during testing. If the other students in the testing environment are familiar with the furniture/equipment (so it is determined not to be a disruption to others), students using the furniture/equipment do not need to test in a separate environment.

Frequent Breaks that DO NOT Stop the Testing Clock

Students must complete each test unit within the specified unit testing time (by content area). Breaks do not stop the testing clock. During breaks, cover or close student testing device screens or paper-based materials. Students are not allowed to have anything that is prohibited during testing during their breaks.

Students are to remain in the testing environment for breaks during each testing unit. Students may stand up, walk around, or engage in similar activities. The exception for students remaining in the testing environment is for the restroom. In these cases, plan for an escort to minimize the student's interactions with other students on a different testing schedule.

Assess students in an individual testing environment or in a group testing environment for students with similar break needs. Maintain the secure standardized testing environment, and break activity must not distract other students in the testing environment. Students may not interact with one another; only interactions with adults are allowed. Students may not discuss any questions or their answers on the assessment during breaks. Reading, accessing the internet, or making and/or receiving phone calls is not allowed during a break.

Noise Buffers

Noise cancelling headphones, earplugs, or other noise buffers **not connected to any audio device** are allowed.

Note: Check noise buffer compatibility with auditory presentation modes (e.g., text-to-speech) prior to testing.

Separate or Alternate Location

Students may test in a separate or alternate location from peers as long as standardized test procedures are followed.

Small Group Testing

Students may test in a 1:1 or small group testing environment. Assessment policy does not prescribe the minimum or maximum group size for any student; however, for students with IEP, 504, or ML plans, schools must follow group guidelines as documented on the plans (e.g., “less than ten students” or “no more than eight students”). If the plan does not specify the maximum number of students in the small group, follow common practice used for that student during instruction and classroom/district assessment.

Specified Seating

Seating students in specified locations in the testing environment during assessment is allowed, as determined at the local level. For example, a student may benefit from being seated away from the door or windows to minimize distractions or away from a heating/cooling vent.

While seating is an administrative consideration, position students in a suitable manner for testing (i.e., lying on the floor during testing **is not** appropriate). Additionally, it is not appropriate to seat a student in a location that is not visible to the Test Administrator, such as behind a bookshelf separating the student from the rest of the room.

Time of Day

Assessment policy does not prescribe the time of day for testing; however, for students with IEP, 504 or ML plans, schools must follow guidelines as documented on the plans. Students requiring a specific time of day for assessment typically have medical needs that impact performance during some portion of the day.

Students testing at a specific time of day should follow the same testing order as close to the general test schedule as possible. Students may not discuss questions or their answers outside of the test session.

If testing on a different timeline from the general student testing schedule is necessary, consult the DAC when developing the student’s unique testing schedule to ensure all requirements for test security are met and minimize disruption to the student’s instruction.

6.1.2 Accessibility Features

Accessibility features are available to all students to *increase the accessibility* of the assessments. Embedded and Test Administrator-provided accessibility features are available to all students on CMAS assessments. Students determine when and how to utilize these tools throughout the testing experience. Pre-selection of auditory presentation, including text-to-speech and PBT oral scripts; enlarged pointer; and color contrast accessibility features is required during the form assignment or initial ordering process. For more information on form assignment and ordering PBT oral scripts, see the *Quick Reference Guide to Special Forms and Ordering* located in *Appendix B* of this manual.

While accessibility features like auditory presentation can be made available to all students, they may not be appropriate for all students. Students eligible for CBT text-to-speech or PBT oral script should use similar access strategies during instruction and classroom assessments.

Note: Contact CDE Assessment regarding ELA/CSLA. Any modification of the assessment is a misadministration and will result in an invalid score.

The following tools are available to all students and meet the access needs of most students.

Accessibility Features Pre-assigned through SR/PNP

The following computer-based testing (CBT) accessibility features are available to students through TestNav only if they are assigned in PAnext prior to testing:

- Color Contrast
- Enlarged Pointer
- Zoom
- Auditory Presentation: Text-to-Speech for Math, Science, and Social Studies

Color Contrast

Color contrast is available for students who use similar tools to access content during instruction and classroom assessment. For online testing, color contrast settings allow the student to select alternate colors for text and background. There are six contrast setting options from which a student may select a combination that best meets their needs. When the color contrast setting is pre-assigned in PAnext through the SR/PNP, the background and text are automatically adjusted. Some graphics (e.g., charts, graphs, tables, maps and drag-and-drop boxes) are presented in full color on a white background.

For paper-based testing, students may use **external color overlays** if they use similar tools to access content during instruction and classroom-based assessment to adjust print to page contrast. These overlays are full or partial pages of colored plastic. External overlays are provided by the school.

Note: For online testing, students may use external overlays combined with color contrast settings. Many items include color graphics that overlays may impact. It is expected that students using overlays will need to adjust their use depending on what is on the screen, similar to how they address the issue during typical computer work.

Students should have the opportunity to practice with the color contrast functionalities and/or overlays on the student practice resources prior to testing. Functionality is dependent upon specific item type and device configurations. The student can adjust color contrast settings through the User Menu in TestNav.

Special Accessibility Feature Assignment Required:

- Field = Test Format
 - Expected Value = O = Online OR P = Paper
- Field = Color Contrast
 - Expected Value = refer to information below*

*Indicate color overlay (expected value = 07) for students requiring color contrast for PBT or for students who use a color overlay *instead* of a contrast setting for CBT. Enlarged Pointer

An enlarged pointer is available for students who use similar tools to access content during instruction and classroom assessment. For online testing, this feature presets the student's test form to use an enlarged pointer within TestNav. There are six options from which a student can be assigned a pointer that best meets their needs (see below).

Students should have the opportunity to practice with the enlarged pointer prior to testing. This is done through adjusting the SR/PNP settings of a secure online student practice resource through the PearsonAccess^{next} Training Site.

Zoom

A zoomed-in (magnified view) screen is available for students who use similar tools to access content during instruction and classroom assessment. For online testing, zoom settings allow the student to select the magnification level of the on-screen content. There are five preset zoom setting options from which a student may select magnification that best meets their needs. When the zoom setting is pre-assigned in PANext through the SR/PNP, the on-screen content is automatically adjusted.

Students should have the opportunity to practice with the zoom feature on the app-based student practice resources prior to testing. The student can adjust zoom settings through the User Menu in TestNav.

Auditory Presentation: Text-to-speech (TTS) for Math, Science, and Social Studies

The following information applies to math, science, and social studies assessments. Text-to-speech is the computer-based auditory presentation feature available to students who are unable to decode printed or tactile code. These students receive auditory presentation of text during instruction and classroom assessment. Through TTS, on-screen text is read aloud to the student by means of embedded text-to-speech software. **Note:** Contact CDE Assessment regarding ELA. Any modification of the assessment is a misadministration and will result in an invalid score.

Word-for-word highlighting accompanies the device's reading of the on-screen text. Just before a section of text is read, it is highlighted in yellow; each word in that section is highlighted in blue as it is read by the device. When words that appear in an image or graphic are read, the entire graphic panel is highlighted by a blue box. **Note:** Highlight colors may change if different color contrast settings are selected.

Students assigned to the TTS form determine how and when they interact with the feature. The student may utilize the TTS tool in two ways.

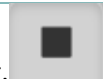
1. Select the "Play" button to read all text from the beginning of the item to the end, including sources.



2. The "Toggle Click-to-Hear" button allows the student to select the starting point for activating TTS.



Students use the "Stop" button to stop the reading.



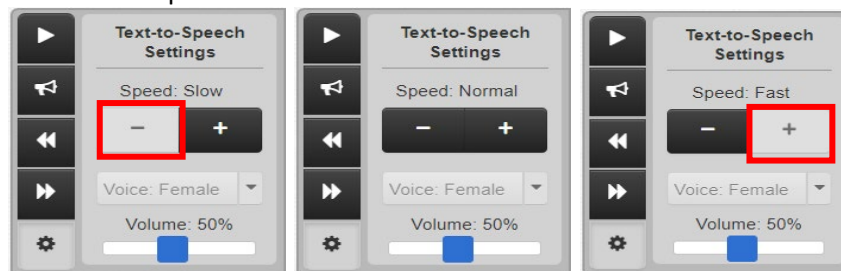
Students use the "Jump Back" button to move the reading to the beginning of the section.



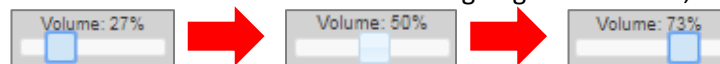
Students use the "Skip Ahead" button to move the reading to the beginning of next section.



Students can adjust TTS reading speed during testing by selecting the Settings button. Select the plus or minus buttons to increase or decrease the speed of the audio.



Students may adjust TTS volume during testing by moving the Volume slider left or right to decrease or increase the volume; however, if the device volume is not "turned on" before signing into TestNav, audio is not accessible.



If tested in a group, students assigned to the TTS form must wear headphones. Students must set the volume at such a level that there is no sound leakage to surrounding students. Students must verify the volume is "turned on" before signing into TestNav by using the "Test Audio" function on the TestNav Sign In screen. These students may take the assessment with other students who are using TTS, as well as students who are not using TTS. Students who are unable to use headphones may use speakers; however, this accessibility feature and consideration requires testing in a one-on-one environment.

During testing, TTS is only available to students who were pre-assigned the TTS form through the SR/PNP in PANext during form assignment.

Students should have the opportunity to practice with TTS functionalities on the student practice resources prior to testing. Functionality is dependent upon specific item type. Students may only use TTS through TestNav. Device operating system accessibility features are not allowed during testing.

Special CBT Form Assignment Required:

- Field = Test Format
 - Expected Value = 0 = Online
- Field = Text-to-Speech
 - Expected Value = 02 = English Text-to-Speech
 - Expected Value = 03 = Spanish Text-to-Speech

While the TTS accessibility feature is available to all students, it may not be appropriate for all students. Students eligible for TTS should be using similar access strategies during instruction and classroom assessment.

Accessibility Features Pre-assigned and Pre-ordered through SR/PNP

Assignment of the paper-based testing (PBT) accessibility feature, Auditory Presentation: PBT Script for Math, Science, and Social Studies, is required in PAnext prior to the end of the initial materials order window on January 24, 2025.

Auditory Presentation: PBT Script for Math, Science, and Social Studies

The following information applies to math, science, and social studies assessments. PBT script is the paper-based auditory presentation available to a student who is unable to decode printed or tactile code and receives auditory presentation of text during instruction and classroom assessment. Through an auditory presentation script, assessment text is read aloud to the student by a Test Administrator. **Note:** Contact CDE Assessment regarding ELA/CSLA. Any modification of the assessment is a misadministration and will result in an invalid score.

A trained Test Administrator uses the auditory presentation script to read the entire test orally to a student who is unable to decode printed or tactile code. Administration on a 1:1 basis is recommended (i.e., one Test Administrator to one student). A student should have the option of asking a reader to slow down or repeat text. Test Administrators must read word-for-word from the physical auditory script and may not read from the test book. Auditory presentation scripts are secure; return auditory presentation scripts to the vendor after testing.

Test Administrators must be able to read and pronounce all text correctly. Refer to the *1.2.5 Who May Administer the Assessments* in this manual for additional qualifications of Test Administrators.

Test Administrators may have supervised access to the auditory presentation script for the paper-based form 24 hours prior to administration. This time is to ensure that Test Administrators are familiar with the content terminology and the appropriate practices associated with this accommodation.

Note: While it is anticipated that most students requiring auditory presentation scripts are able to complete the testing session within the standard testing time, due to the nature of auditory presentation and the need to repeat questions and answer options as requested, an auditory presentation script testing session may take additional time.

Special PBT Form Assignment Required:

- Field = Test Format
 - Expected Value = P = Paper
- Field = Auditory/Signed Presentation: Script (Reader/Signer)
 - Expected Value = 02 = Auditory/Signer Script

If the paper-based form and *Auditory/Signed Presentation: Script* are indicated in PAnext before January 24, 2025, the test book and auditory presentation script are received with the district's automatic initial shipment. If the paper-based form and *Auditory/Signed Presentation: Script* are not indicated in PAnext before January 24, an additional order is required.

If an additional order is required due to missed deadline:

- Indicate information under "Special PBT Form Assignment Required" on PNP for student's test
- Place Additional Order through PAnext for correct grade level, content area, and language:
 - Test Book/Kit

- PBT Auditory/Signed Presentation Script

Note: PBT and CBT auditory/signer scripts are not interchangeable. The PBT auditory/signer script does not match a computer-based test and the CBT auditory/signer script does not match a paper-based test.

While the PBT auditory presentation accessibility feature is available to all students, it may not be appropriate for all students. Students eligible for PBT auditory presentation should be using similar access strategies during instruction and classroom assessment.

Accessibility Features that do not Require Pre-assignment

Test Administrator-provided accessibility features are available to all students on CMAS assessments. These accessibility features may require testing students in a separate environment.

- General Administration (SAY) Directions Clarified and Repeated as Needed (by Test Administrator)
- Read Aloud to Self

General Administration (SAY) Directions Clarified and Repeated as Needed (by Test Administrator)

Upon request from a student, the Test Administrator clarifies general administration directions (SAY directions) only after reading the directions word-for-word from the *Test Administrator Manual*. A student may also raise their hand and request repetition of the SAY directions. Clarifying or reading passages or test questions for students is not allowed.

Read Aloud to Self

A student may read the assessment aloud to him/herself. Devices, such as “whisper phones” are allowed.

This accessibility feature requires the student to test in a 1:1 environment separate from other students.

6.1.3 Accommodations

Assessment accommodations are changes made to assessment procedures that provide a student with access to comprehensible information and an improved opportunity to demonstrate knowledge and skills without affecting the reliability or validity of the assessment. Accommodations provided to a student are based on individual need documented in the student’s approved IEP or 504 plan. Students may only utilize accommodations for testing that are specifically listed in the IEP or 504 plan. In addition to accommodations for students with disabilities, Multilingual Learner (ML) accommodations are available to students with a language proficiency designation of NEP or LEP.

Accommodations may not be provided based on a category of disability, level of instruction, environment, or another group characteristic. No accommodations may be provided to a student merely because they are a member of an instructional group. Accommodations should not provide an unfair advantage to any student. Providing accommodations for the sole purpose of increasing test scores is not ethical.

Responsibility for confirming the need and appropriateness of an accommodation rests with the school-based staff involved with each student’s instructional program. **The SAC and/or DAC must maintain a master list of all students and their accommodations to ensure appropriate CBT forms are assigned and PBT forms are ordered for students prior to testing.**

Accommodations are available for students with disabilities and/or MLs for both online and paper-based forms of the assessments. The following sections provide information regarding specific accommodations:

- Presentation Accommodations
- Response Accommodations
- Timing Accommodations
- Multilingual Learner Accommodations

In these sections, information is provided on the overall use of the accommodation; additional information is provided if directions vary between paper-based and computer-based accommodation delivery. Some accommodations require special form assignment and ordering physical materials.

With sufficient time to properly plan test administration, DACs and SACs shall collect information regarding students who require testing accommodations. It is imperative test administration reflects needs documented in a student’s formal educational plan, and that the student is only provided accommodations comparable to those used regularly during instruction and on classroom and district assessments (unless a student is accustomed to a particular accommodation, introducing that accommodation on CMAS may impede the student’s performance). Once accommodations are verified, the DAC and SAC use this list to identify available resources (e.g., sign language

interpreters, translators, and assistive technology equipment) and space needed for small group testing or individual administrations.

Test Administrators who manage “accommodated testing groups” must receive training on the appropriate way to administer that specific assessment accommodation. Training on all applicable accommodations is required for Test Administrators who administer the assessment to students with multiple accommodations.

Important: Colorado Revised Statute §22-7-1006.3 (1) states:

(d) If all or any portion of a state assessment requires a student to use a computer to take the assessment, at the request of a local education provider, the department of education must administer the portions of the state assessment that require a computer in a format that a student may complete using pencil and paper. Each local education provider shall report to the department the number of students it enrolls who will take the state assessment in a pencil-and-paper format.

(e) The department shall review and update assessment administration and security policies as necessary to maintain the integrity of the assessments.

Note: For CBT assessments, while an accommodation may not be identical to the accommodation used during instruction, it should be comparable (e.g., instructional auditory presentation through books on tape is comparable to auditory presentation through text-to-speech).

Presentation Accommodations

Presentation accommodations are changes to the way the assessment is presented to a student with a need for the accommodation, as documented on an IEP or 504 plan. These accommodations do not change the construct of the assessment. Presentation accommodations are available for both computer-based and paper-based assessments. **Note:** To assign a presentation accommodation, the “Accommodation Type” field in the student’s PearsonAccess^{next} registration must be set to “IEP504” or “Both” (indicating the student has both an IEP/504 and ML plan).

If an additional order is required due to a missed deadline:

- Indicate information under “Special PBT Form Assignment Required” on PNP for student’s test
- Place Additional Order through PAnext for correct grade level and content area:
 - Test Book/Kit

Assistive Technology (AT)

The assistive technology form, as defined for the CMAS assessment, is available for students who use assistive technology to access instruction in the classroom on a day-to-day basis, for assessments, and have appropriate documentation on their formal IEP or 504 plans to use the technology for state assessments.

Assistive technology includes but is not limited to software, computers, and adaptive computer input/output devices.

Do not assign this Assistive Technology form in the following cases:

- Some students may require software that is not compatible with TestNav. These students may use a second device to provide access to that software. The second device may not have Internet access. Indicate use of assistive technology through the Response Accommodation fields, as appropriate (e.g., speech-to-text, word prediction). Ensure Bluetooth and internet connectivity on secondary devices are disabled during testing.
- Speech-to-text (STT), augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) devices, hearing aids, FM systems, or glasses are not considered assistive technology for the purposes of state assessments.

CBT For assistive technology that is compatible with TestNav, special form assignment is required. The AT form is intended to interact with specific types of AT software, such as screen readers or adaptive keyboards. The AT form reads the code embedded within the item. Some selected response and in-line choice items are presented in a format that allows the technology to interact with the assessment. Not all constructed response editing tools are available for student use because of AT software interactions. Ensure any student assigned the AT form uses software specifically intended for computer access.

Note: Contact CDE Assessment for use of a screen reader on ELA. Use of a screen reader on ELA modifies the assessment. Any modification of the assessment is a misadministration and will result in an invalid score.

Special CBT Form Assignment Required for Math and ELA:

- Field = Test Format
 - Expected Value = O = Online
- Field = Assistive Technology
 - Expected Value = Y = Yes

PBT No additional information.

Auditory Presentation Math, Science, and Social Studies

The following information applies to math, science, and social studies. Auditory presentation is available to a student who is unable to decode printed or tactile code and receives auditory presentation of text during instruction and classroom assessment.

CBT Refer to *6.1.2 Accessibility Features – Auditory Presentation: Text-to-Speech (TTS) for Math, Science, and Social Studies*.

PBT Refer to *6.1.2 Accessibility Features – Auditory Presentation: PBT Script for Math, Science, and Social Studies*.

Braille

Available only to students with an IEP or 504 plan with a documented diagnosis of blindness/visual impairment. Determine appropriateness for use of this accommodation with a teacher certified in the area of visual impairments.

Only a teacher of the visually impaired (TVI) proficient in reading the braille code used by the student may administer this assessment. This accommodation is typically administered in an individual assessment environment.

Note: While it is anticipated that most students are able to complete testing session within the standard testing time, due to the nature of the test administration and the need to for the student to respond in the manner the student uses instructionally, the testing session may take additional time.

CBT A student who is blind or has a visual impairment takes the assessment using their preferred assistive technology device/screen reader software (e.g., refreshable braille display, JAWS), pending a trial using the AT practice forms (securely delivered through the PAnext Training Site) with the student’s assistive technology device/software.

This online accommodated form reads information on the screen using screen reader software. If the student is not using headphones, the student must test in a separate one-on-one setting.

Notes:

- Contact CDE Assessment for use of a screen reader on ELA as this is a modification to the assessment. Any modification of the assessment is a misadministration and will result in an invalid score.
- A student who uses screen reader may also need tactile graphics. Refer to the *Tactile Graphics* information later in this section.

Special CBT Form Assignment Required for Math and ELA:

- Field = Test Format
 - Expected Value = O = Online
- Field = Assistive Technology
 - Expected Value = Y = Yes

PBT The braille test books include content presented in the identified braille code (UEB or UEB Math/Science) and embedded tactile graphics. As needed, visual descriptions are also embedded in the braille test books if a visual description is more accessible than a tactile graphic (as determined by a committee of braille readers). The Teacher Notes received in the braille test kits indicate differences between the braille test book and the standard print test book included for transcription (including added visual descriptions).

The following contents may be included in braille kits (varies by grade level and content area):

- Student
 - UEB or UEB Math/Science Braille Test Books
 - Math only:
 - Braille Protractor (grades 4-7 only; rulers are embedded in the braille test books for all grades)
 - UEB (w/Nemeth) or UEB Math/Science Braille Math Reference Sheets (grades 5-8 only)
 - Science only:
 - UEB (w/Nemeth) or UEB Math/Science Braille Periodic Table (grade 11 only)

- Teacher
 - Teacher Notes for Braille
 - Auditory Presentation Script for Braille (for use as documented on student IEP/504 plans)
 - Transcription Instructions
 - Standard Print Test Book for Transcription

Test Administrators/TVIs may have access to the *Teacher Notes* (included in the braille kit) 24 hours prior to the administration of the assessment to ensure all needed materials are procured. Early access to other assessment materials is not allowed other than to verify the correct grade and content area materials were received by reviewing the test book cover only.

Test Administrators transcribe student work demonstrated using tactile tools, such as an abacus or alternate graphing, into the standard print test book included in the braille kit. Test Administrators may assist in placement of a straight edge, or other tools needed, as requested by the student.

The student may record their answers directly on the adapted format book, on blank braille paper, or use a braille or braille note-taker. The student’s responses are **transcribed** by a TVI into the standard print test book (included in the braille kit) to submit for scoring. Student work and/or answers not transcribed are not scored. See *6.1.6 Transcription Instructions*.

Special PBT Form Assignment Required:

- Field = Test Format
 - Expected Value = P = Paper
- Field = Visual Accommodations
 - Expected Value = 01 = UEB (with Nemeth for Math and Science)
 - Expected Value = 02 = UEB Math/Science

If the braille form is indicated in PAnext before January 24, 2025, it is received in the district’s initial shipment. If the braille form is not indicated in PAnext before January 24, an additional order is required.

If an additional order is required due to a missed deadline:

- Indicate information under “Special PBT Form Assignment Required” on PNP for student’s test
- Place Additional Order through PAnext for correct grade level, content area, and braille code:
 - Braille Kit

Large Print (18-point font)

 - Magnifier Sheet – Included to increase font size as not all text on the science materials meets the 18-point font minimum.
- Teacher
 - Transcription Instructions
 - Standard Print Test Book for Transcription

Test Administrators transcribe student answers into the standard print test book provided in the large print kit and return to the vendor for scoring. Student work and/or answers that are not transcribed are not scored. See *6.1.6 Transcription Instructions*.

Note: Students should be familiar with the use of large print and large paper-based test books as part of their regular instruction and classroom testing environment.

Special PBT Form Assignment Required:

- Place Additional Order through PAnext for correct grade level, content area, and language:
 - Large Print Kit

Low-Vision Devices

CBT Refer to *6.1.2 Accessibility Features – Zoom*

Students enlarge the on-screen text and images using “ctrl +” on the keyboard for PCs and Chromebooks, and “command +” on the keyboard for Macs. Students return to standard size by using “ctrl –” keys for PCs and Chromebooks, and “command –” on Macs. Additionally, the zoom tool is available through the TestNav User Menu. On touch screen devices, students enlarge and reduce using pinch-to-zoom.

Students may need to scroll left-right or up-down to view all content when the content is enlarged. Larger monitors allow for increased text and image size with less scrolling.

Students should have the opportunity to practice with the zoom functionalities on the CPRs prior to testing.

PBT Students use their low vision device with a standard print or large print paper-based form. Student answers in test book. Transcription is only required if the student uses a large print test book.

Note: Students should be familiar with the use of the low vision device on paper-based test books as part of their regular instruction and classroom testing environment

Signed Presentation for Math, Science, and Social Studies – Sign System/Language

The following information applies to math, science, and social studies assessments. Signed presentation is available to a student who is unable to decode printed or tactile code and receives signed presentation of text during instruction and classroom assessment. Signed presentation is available to students with an IEP or 504 plan only, with a documented diagnosis of hearing impairment and whose primary mode of communication is a sign system/language.

A trained Test Administrator signs the entire test to a student who is unable to decode text. Administration on a 1:1 basis is recommended (i.e., one Test Administrator to one student). A student should have the option of asking a signer to slow down or repeat text. Test Administrators must follow the script and may not read from a test book or device.

Interpreters interpret the *Auditory/Signer Script for Translation* in the sign language/system typically used with the student (ASL, PSE, or SEE) during instruction. The *Auditory/Signer Script for Translation* and any notes made to facilitate sign language system/interpretation are secure testing materials; return scripts to the vendor after testing.

Interpreters may have supervised access to the script four working days prior to administration to ensure they are familiar with the content terminology and with the appropriate practices associated with this accommodation. Interpreters must use interpretation techniques and tools that do not compromise the security of the assessments or provide an unfair advantage over any other student (e.g., signs used do not provide information that would cue the student to the correct answer; interpreters must not clarify, elaborate, or provide assistance with the meaning of words). Instructions for early access are found in *3.3.1 Training Plan* under *Accessibility Features and Accommodations Training*.

Notes:

- Contact CDE Assessment regarding ELA/CSLA. Any modification of the assessment is a misadministration and will result in an invalid score.
- While it is anticipated that most students are able to complete testing session within the standard testing time even with this accommodation, due to the nature of auditory and signed presentation and the need to repeat questions and answers as requested, an auditory/signer script testing session may take additional time.
- PBT and CBT auditory/signer scripts are not interchangeable. The PBT auditory/signer script does not match a computer-based test and the CBT auditory/signer script does not match a paper-based test.
- Students should be familiar with the use of signed presentation part of their regular instruction and classroom testing environment

CBT An acceptable practice for this accommodation is for the interpreter to sit next to the computer facing the student to allow for the interpreter to point to content words not translated as indicated in the script. This allows the student to maintain contact with the interpreter and the print simultaneously.

Response Accommodations

Response accommodations are changes to the way the student responds to the assessment. These must be documented in an IEP or 504 plan. These accommodations do not change the construct of the assessment. Response accommodations are available for both computer-based and paper-based assessments. **Note:** To assign a response accommodation, the “Accommodation Type” field in the student’s PearsonAccess^{next} registration must be set to “IEP504” or “Both” (indicating the student has both an IEP/504 and ML plan).

Assistive Technology (AT)

The assistive technology accommodation is available to students, as documented on their IEP or 504 plans, who use AT to respond in the classroom on a day-to-day basis and for assessments. These students must use technology in lieu of a scribe for state assessments. AT includes but is not limited to computers, keyboards, communication devices (i.e., AAC devices, switch), and adaptive computer input/output devices.

Additional considerations for test security apply when students use AT, including speech-to-text and word prediction.

- Students must not retrieve or access work from another student.
- Students must not access additional programs/applications, devices, or the Internet while testing.
- Student must not access any previously saved data while in the testing environment.
- AT devices storing student answers are secure test materials. Students may not have access to AT devices until all secure materials are removed from the device. Secure devices that contain secure materials with other secure testing materials.

Verbatim transcription must occur in the presence of a second trained staff member who verifies the transcription. Student work and/or answers are not scored if they are not transcribed. See *6.1.6 Transcription Instructions*. For students who use AT and/or augmentative communication devices that:

- **Do not** produce a printed product, perform transcription of responses directly from the device.
- **Do** produce a printed product, print student work and transcribe responses into TestNav or the student’s test book prior to the student beginning the next test unit.

Only authorized personnel may have access to the test, test materials and student answers. Schools must have procedures in place for secure retrieval of printed materials. Remove all student responses from the AT device immediately following the transcription or printing for transcription purposes. It is the DAC’s responsibility to ensure this is done in a secure manner. The DAC may adapt the *Secure Data Removal* form, found in *Appendix G*, to verify completion of this activity. Make documentation available upon request by CDE.

Printed pages containing the student’s answers are secure materials. Return printed pages to the SAC along with any used scratch paper from the test unit.

Notes:

- Ensure all Bluetooth and internet connectivity of secondary devices are disabled during testing.
- Extra time is not provided for “lost” work.

Braille/Braille Note-Taker

The braille/braille note-taker accommodation is available only to students with an IEP or 504 plan with a documented diagnosis of blindness/visual impairment. Determine appropriateness for use of this accommodation with a teacher certified in the area of visual impairments (TVI). Only a TVI proficient in reading the braille code used by the student can provide this accommodation.

Administration must take place in an individual testing environment with adequate space for all materials, including the braille test book and braille/braille note-taker.

Only authorized personnel may have access to the test, test materials, and student answers. Any pages (braille paper, braille produced, or printed from a braille note-taker) containing the student’s answers are secure materials and must be returned to the SAC along with any used scratch paper from the test unit.

PNP Indicators: Not applicable

CBT	Not applicable.
PBT	The student may record their answers directly on the adapted format book, on blank braille paper, or use a braille or braille note-taker. The TVI completes verbatim transcription of the student’s responses into the standard print test book (included in the braille kit) in the presence of a second school adult (refer to <i>6.1.6 Transcription Instructions</i>). Student work and/or answers that are not transcribed are not scored.

Scribe for Math, Science, and Social Studies

The following information applies to math, science, and social studies assessments. For ELA, including CSLA, refer to *6.1.4 Unique Accommodations* as the scribe accommodation requires an approved UAR for ELA/CSLA.

The scribe accommodation is available for students as documented in their IEP or 504 plans. In making decisions on whether to provide this accommodation, teams are instructed to consider whether the student has either:

- A physical disability that severely limits or prevents the student’s motor process of writing through keyboarding or paper/pencil; **or**
- A disability that severely limits or prevents the student from expressing their thoughts in writing, even after varied and repeated attempts to teach the student to do so.

Before listing the accommodation in the student’s IEP or 504 plan, teams should also consider whether the student meets all the following requirements:

- The student receives ongoing, intensive instruction, and/or research-based interventions to learn written expression, as deemed appropriate by the IEP, 504 plan team; **and**

- The student has access to written expression during routine instruction through the use of a scribe, except when the student is receiving direct writing instruction; **and**
- The student’s inability to express in written form is documented in an IEP or 504 plan.

Students who use assistive technology to respond in the classroom on a day-to-day basis, for assessments, and who have appropriate documentation on their IEP or 504 plans must use technology in lieu of a scribe for state tests.

The student must be assessed in a separate, one-on-one testing environment.

The scribe must record student responses verbatim into the answer field on the test. The scribe may not prompt or question the student or correct a student’s responses. The scribe may ask the student to restate words, as needed. The scribe may use proper mechanics and spelling. Scribes must be familiar with content vocabulary. For math, the scribe may not set up problems for the student; the student must indicate all steps and work for any given item. The scribe may take notes on scratch paper as dictated by the student. All scratch paper and notes will be turned into the SAC.

The scribe must allow the student to review the scribed response to make edits. If requested by the student, the scribe may read the scribed response back to the student. Re-read the response in an even tone, being careful not to cue the student to errors. The student may dictate changes or edits to the scribe, and the scribe must make those changes exactly as dictated by the student, even if a change is incorrect. Changes are only allowed during the testing session.

The scribe may ask, “Are you finished?” or, “Is there anything you want to add or remove?” A scribe must take care not to imply in any way that an answer is incomplete or incorrect through these questions.

The scribe may respond to procedural questions asked by the student such as, “Do I have to use the entire space to answer the question?” The scribe may indicate, “No.”

Given the interaction with test materials and involvement in recording responses, it is recommended that two adults are present in the testing environment. Scribes must read and write proficiently in the student’s spoken or communicative language (English, Spanish, or AAC device).

Speech-to-Text (STT)

The speech-to-text (STT) accommodation is available to students with a documented need identified on their IEP or 504 plans. Because this accommodation requires the student to provide answers orally, this accommodation must be provided in an individual 1:1 testing environment. District use of speech-to-text software on CMAS must be approved by CDE before testing. The *Speech-to-Text and Word Prediction Security Agreement Supplement* is found on the [State Assessment Accommodations Training](#) page.

Additional considerations for test security must be applied when students use STT software.

- Students must not retrieve or access work from another student.
- Students must not be able to access additional programs/applications or the Internet while testing.
- Students must not be able to access any previously saved data while in the testing environment.

Second devices used for STT with student answers on them are secure test materials and must be secured as such. For students using second devices that:

- **Do not** produce a printed product, perform transcription of responses directly from the device.
- **Do** produce a printed product, print student work and transcribe responses into TestNav or the student's test book prior to the student beginning the next test unit.

Verbatim transcription should occur in the presence of a second school adult and follow the transcription guidelines (refer to *6.1.6 Transcription Instructions*). Student work and/or answers that are not transcribed are not scored.

Note: Extra time may not be given for "lost" work.

STT programs that have a kiosk/guided access mode that lock out all other applications/programs while testing should be used. STT programs that can still access the internet while in kiosk/guided access mode are not approved for use by individual students during testing. The text-to-speech and/or auditory component of the STT software must be disabled for use on the ELA assessment. Contact the DAC for the list of district-approved STT programs that ensure student privacy and restrict internet access while in kiosk/guided access mode. The DAC should contact CDE for guidance on how to set up testing for these students.

Only authorized personnel may have access to the test, test materials, and student answers. Schools must have procedures in place for secure retrieval of printed materials. Remove all student responses from the assistive technology device immediately following the transcription or printing for transcription purposes. Students may not have access to assistive technology devices that contain secure materials until all secure materials are removed from those devices. Secure devices that contain secure materials with other secure testing materials. It is the DAC's responsibility to ensure this is done in a secure manner. It is the DAC's responsibility to ensure that the *Speech-to-Text and Word Prediction Security Agreement Supplement*, District Use of Speech-to-Text and Word Prediction forms, and District level Privacy Policies are submitted to and approved by CDE. The DAC may adapt the *Secure Data Removal* form (*Appendix G*) to verify that this was completed. Make documentation available upon request by CDE.

Printed pages containing the student's answers are secure materials. Return printed pages to the SAC along with any used scratch paper from the test unit.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Response Accommodation
 - Expected Value = 01 = Speech-to-Text

CBT Since the student is speaking, individual, 1:1 administration is required. STT software is not compatible with TestNav 8. Students use a second device in the testing environment to provide access to STT software. The second device may **not** have Internet access.

The STT accommodation **is not** appropriate based solely on:

- A student's preference to speak rather than write/type.

Talking Calculator/Abacus/Tactile Math Manipulatives

The talking calculator/abacus/tactile math manipulatives accommodation is available only to students with an IEP or 504 plan with a documented diagnosis of blindness/visual impairment. Assess students who use a talking calculator in a separate testing environment. The student uses the calculator or abacus used during daily instruction on all units of the science assessment and the calculator sections/units of the math assessment.

PNP Indicators: Not applicable

CBT	Talking calculator or abacus is used in place of the embedded calculator in TestNav.

Word Prediction

The word prediction accommodation is available to students as documented on their IEP or 504 plans. Students may use commercially published word prediction software on assistive technology and/or second devices. All constraints indicated with assistive technology apply. The software must work independent of the Internet. Word prediction software is used to answer constructed response items. District use of word prediction software on CMAS must be approved by CDE before testing. The *Speech-to-Text and Word Prediction Security Agreement Supplement* is found on the [State Assessment Accommodations Training](#) page.

Additional considerations for test security must be applied when students use word prediction software.

- Students must not retrieve or access work from another student.
- Students must not be able to access additional programs/applications or the Internet while testing.
- Students must not be able to access any previously saved data while in the testing environment.

Students must manipulate the software program and their work independently. Test Administrators may not assist students or provide instructions for use of the program during testing.

Second devices used for STT with student answers on them are secure test materials and must be secured as such. For students using second devices that:

- **Do not** produce a printed product, perform transcription of responses directly from the device.

- **Do** produce a printed product, print student work and transcribe responses into TestNav or the student’s test book prior to the student beginning the next test unit.

Verbatim transcription should occur in the presence of a second school adult and follow the transcription guidelines (refer to *6.16 Transcription Instructions*). Student work and/or answers that are not transcribed are not scored.

Note: Extra time may not be given for “lost” work.

Word prediction programs that have a kiosk/guided access mode that lock out all other applications/programs while testing should be used. Word prediction programs that can still access the internet while in kiosk/guided access mode are not approved for use by individual students during testing. The text-to-speech and/or auditory component of the word prediction software must be disabled for use on the ELA assessment. If students are using an auditory component to the word prediction software on the math, science, and social studies assessment, they must use headphones that prevent other students from hearing the sounds, or test in a separate, one-on-one environment. Contact the DAC for the list of district-approved word prediction programs that ensure student privacy and restrict internet access while in kiosk/guided access mode. The DAC should contact CDE for guidance on how to set up testing for these students.

Only authorized personnel may have access to the test, test materials and student answers. Schools must have procedures in place for secure retrieval of printed materials. Remove all student responses from the assistive technology device immediately following transcription or printing for transcription purposes. It is the DAC’s responsibility to ensure this is done in a secure manner. It is the DAC’s responsibility to ensure that the *Speech-to-Text and Word Prediction Security Agreement Supplement*, District Use of Speech-to-Text and Word Prediction forms, and District level Privacy Policies are submitted to and approved by CDE. The DAC may adapt the *Secure Data Removal* form (*Appendix G*) to verify this was completed. Make documentation available upon request by CDE.

Printed pages containing the student’s answers are secure materials. Return printed pages to the SAC along with used scratch paper. Students may not have access to assistive technology devices that contain secure materials until they are removed from the device. Secure devices that contain secure materials with other secure testing materials.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Word Prediction
 - Expected Value = Y = Yes

CBT	<p>Word prediction software is not compatible with TestNav. Students will use a second device in the testing environment to provide access to word prediction software. The second device may not have Internet access.</p> <p>Students may use word prediction software as a tool to inform the responses they input directly into the test engine itself. Adjustments to the unit testing time may be made for students with a documented need for the accommodation in their IEP or 504 plans. **Note:** To assign a timing accommodation, the “Accommodation Type” field in the student’s PearsonAccess^{next} registration must be set to “IEP504” or “Both” (indicating the student has both an IEP/504 and ML plan).

Time and a Half

The time and a half accommodation is available to students as documented on their IEP or 504 plan. Scheduling of time and a half extended time sessions should follow the same testing order and be as similar to the general test schedule as possible. Students must be assessed in individual or group testing environments with students with similar extended time needs.

Students with extended time accommodations must be given a unit in a continuous block of time and may not be brought back to work on or complete that unit at a later time (each unit must be completed within the school day in which it was started). Any breaks while the student is testing a unit must be supervised and students may not have access to any materials restricted during testing. Breaks do not stop testing time and may not be extended breaks (i.e., 15 minutes or more). While on break, students may not interact with other students.

Districts may choose to implement policies that allow students to exit the physical testing environment after they completed the assessments. However, it is critical that students leaving the environment are not disruptive to students who are still testing. Students should not feel compelled to complete the test quickly due to peer pressure, or due to being the last student working on the assessment. It is recommended that students with similar skills and abilities be assessed together.

If the standard unit testing time for that session has passed and all students have completed testing (for PBT all test materials must first be turned in), the testing unit may end.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Extended Time
 - Expected Value = IEP504 or Both

Double Time

The double time accommodation is available to students as documented on their IEP or 504 plan. Scheduling of extended time sessions should follow the same testing order and be as similar to the general test schedule as possible. Students must be assessed in individual or group testing environments with students with similar extended time needs.

Students with extended time accommodations must be given a unit in a continuous block of time and may not be brought back to work on or complete that unit at a later time (each unit must be completed within the school day in which it was started). Any breaks while the student is testing a unit must be supervised and students may not have access to any restricted materials during testing. Breaks do not stop testing time and may not be extended breaks (i.e., 15 minutes or more). While on break, students may not interact with other students.

Districts may choose to implement policies that allow students to exit the physical testing environment after they have completed the assessments. However, it is critical that students leaving the environment are not disruptive to students who are still testing. Students should not feel compelled to complete the test quickly due to peer pressure, or

due to being the last student working on the assessment. It is recommended that students with similar skills and abilities be assessed together.

If the standard unit testing time for that session has passed and all students have completed testing (for PBT all test materials must first be turned in), the testing unit may end.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Extended Time
 - Expected Value = IEP504 or Both

Stop-the-Clock Breaks

Available to students as documented on their IEP or 504 plan. Students requiring stop-the-clock breaks typically experience extreme fatigue or have other medical needs that must be addressed while testing (e.g., check blood sugar, visit nurse).

Medical Notes:

- Students may leave the testing environment to take care of medical needs. Efforts must be made to minimize interaction with other students during this time.
- For unforeseeable medical concerns such as seizure activity, follow “ill during testing” procedures.
- For other medical concerns such as testing blood sugar levels, or visual fatigue (students with a documented vision impairment only), breaks are untimed and should not be counted towards “testing time”.

Outside of stop-the-clock breaks, students must complete each unit within the unit testing time. Test Administrators must track start and end time of breaks to ensure that students are given the appropriate unit testing time.

Breaks are not overnight. Once a unit has begun, it must be completed during the same academic day. Students are to remain in the testing environment for breaks during each unit. The student may stand up, walk around, or engage in similar activities. The exception for students remaining in the testing environment would be for the restroom or if a student needs to access special equipment, such as sensory equipment for calming. In these cases, arrangements must be made for the student to be escorted to minimize interactions with other students on a different testing schedule.

Students must be assessed in individual or group testing environments with students with similar break needs. The secure standardized testing environment must be maintained, and the break activity must not be a distraction to other students. Students should not interact with one another. Students may not discuss any questions or their answers on the assessment during breaks.

Secure assessment material may not be removed from the test environment during breaks. Reading, accessing the internet, or making and/or receiving phone calls is not allowed during a break.

PNP Indicators: Not applicable

CBT	During breaks, cover or turn off student computer screens.
PBT	During breaks, cover or close student test materials.

Multilingual Learner (ML) Accommodations

Multilingual Learners with a language proficiency designation of NEP or LEP are eligible for ML accommodations. Accommodations for students learning English change the way the assessment is presented to a student, how the student responds to assessment questions, or timing of the assessment. Accommodations are based on documented needs as indicated in ML plans. MLs with a language proficiency designation of FEP, FELL, or PHLOTE are not eligible for ML accommodations on state assessments. ML accommodations do not change the construct of the assessment. ML accommodations are available for both computer-based and paper-based assessments. **Note:** To assign an ML accommodation, the “Accommodation Type” field in the student’s PearsonAccess^{next} registration must be set to “ML” or “Both” (indicating the student has both an IEP/504 and ML plan).

Additional Notes:

- ML plan designs vary by district and school. ML plans may be at the district, school, or student level.
- The requirement for participation in an English language development program for five years or less does not include pre-school or kindergarten.
- **Auditory Presentation – English** for math, science, and social studies is available to all students as an accessibility feature through text-to-speech for computer-based testing and oral scripts for paper-based testing (refer to *6.1.2 Accessibility Features*).
- **Auditory Presentation – Spanish** for math, science, and social studies is available as an accessibility feature to ML students using Spanish forms of the assessments. This accessibility feature is provided through text-to-speech for computer-based testing and auditory presentation scripts for paper-based testing (refer to *6.1.2 Accessibility Features*).
- **Large Print – Spanish** is an accommodation available to ML students using Spanish forms of the assessments who also have disabilities as documented on an IEP or 504 plan (refer to *6.1.3 Accommodations – Presentation Accommodations*).
- **Scribe – Spanish** for math, science, and social studies is an accommodation available to ML students using Spanish forms of the assessments who also have disabilities as documented on an IEP or 504 plan (refer to *6.1.3 Accommodations – Response Accommodations*). Scribe for CSLA constructed response is available for some ML students who also have a disability as documented on an IEP or 504 plan and requires a CDE-approved UAR (refer to *6.1.4 Unique Accommodations*).
- **Speech-to-text – Spanish** is an accommodation available to some students using Spanish forms of the assessment who also have disabilities as documented on an IEP or 504 plan (refer to *6.1.3 Accommodations – Response Accommodations*).

**Given the complexity of translating and transcribing student responses into the online form of the assessment, the paper-based form is recommended.

Auditory Presentation for Math, Science, and Social Studies – Translated

The following information applies to math, science, and social studies assessments. This accommodation is available to students with a primary or home language other than English or Spanish in an English language development program for five years or less. Students should have received content-based instruction (math or science) in their native language within the school year.

The Test Administrator (TA) uses the locally translated script to read the entire test to a student who is unable to **decode** text. TAs should be provided on an individual, 1:1 basis so each student has the option to ask the reader to slow down or repeat text. TAs must read word-for-word from the oral script and may not read from the test book. TAs must be able to read and pronounce the student’s native language correctly. Translators may have supervised access to the auditory presentation script four days prior to administration to ensure familiarity with content terminology and this accommodation’s appropriate practices. Translators must use translation techniques and tools that do not compromise assessment security. Instructions for early access are found in *3.3.1 Training Plan. The Auditory/Signer Script for Translation* and translated scripts are secure and must be returned to the vendor after testing.

Note: While it is anticipated that most students requiring oral scripts will be able to complete the testing session within the standard testing time, due to the nature of auditory presentation and the need to repeat questions and answer options as requested, an oral script testing session may take additional time.

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Spanish Form

Math, science, and social studies assessments are available in Spanish. The Colorado Spanish Language Arts (CSLA)* is a paper-based accommodated version of the ELA assessment available to qualifying students in grades 3 and 4 (eligible students must have received Spanish language arts instruction within the school year).

Districts must determine if the Spanish math, science, or CSLA form is the best choice for the student or if an English CMAS form with ML accommodations or translated CoAlt assessment will better help the student access assessment content. District assessment leadership should collaborate with ML staff to evaluate appropriateness and eligibility of students to take the Spanish version of an assessment.

Available to students in an English language development program for five years or less. Refer to the [Decision Making Flowchart](#).

*Because CSLA is an accommodation itself, other ML accommodations are not allowed. Students taking CSLA should not have an ELA registration in PAnext but must have a math assignment (ML accommodations are available for math).

Translated General Administration (SAY) Directions

The Test Administrator-read general administration directions that are read aloud to all students in a testing environment (SAY directions) may be translated into the student's native language. No passages or test questions may be clarified. This accommodation does not provide a translation of the test content into the student's native language (refer to *Auditory Presentation – Translated*).

Spanish SAY directions are available at <http://coassessments.com> > Manuals and Training > Manuals. Translations into languages other than English or Spanish must be completed locally.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Administration Directions Read Aloud/Clarified in Student's Native Language
 - Expected Value = SPA = Spanish
 - Expected Value = HT = Human Translator

Word-to-Word Dictionary (also considered a response accommodation)

A word-to-word dictionary (English and the student's native language) is provided by the school. This must be a paper-based linguistic dictionary. The word-to-word dictionary may not contain definitions.

Test Administrators may not assist students with dictionary use.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Word-to-Word Dictionary
 - Expected Value = Y = Yes

Response in Language other than English or Spanish (Requires Translation and Transcription) for Math, Science, and Social Studies

The following information applies to math, science, and social studies assessments. This accommodation is available to students with a home language other than English or Spanish. Students should have received content-based instruction in their native language within the school year.

Student written response – The translator/transcriber must be proficient in reading and writing in the student's native language and English. The translator should be familiar with the content area in both English and the student's native language. The translator must write legibly.

Student spoken response (scribe) – In addition to the aforementioned criteria, qualifying students must also have an IEP or 504 plan. This scribe accommodation must be administered individually in a separate testing environment. The scribe must be familiar with the tested content area and proficient in reading and writing in the student's native language and English. The scribe must write legibly.

This scribe accommodation **is not** appropriate based solely on:

- A student's poor handwriting.
- A student's preference to speak rather than write/type.
- A student's poor attention span.
- A student's behavioral response to writing.

Student responses are recorded in the student's language. In a one-on-one environment, the student tells the scribe exactly what to write on a separate piece of paper, and if needed, indicates answers to select on items.

For constructed response items:

The scribe must record student responses verbatim. The scribe may not prompt or question the student or correct a student's responses. The scribe may ask the student to restate words or parts, as needed, and use proper mechanics and spelling. Scribes must be familiar with content vocabulary.

The scribe must allow the student to review the scribed response in order to make edits. If requested by the student, the scribe may read the scribed response back to the student. The response must be read in an even tone, being careful not to cue the student to errors. The student may dictate changes or edits to the scribe, and the scribe must make those changes exactly as dictated by the student, even if a change is incorrect. All changes must be made during the testing session.

The scribe may ask, “Are you finished?” or, “Is there anything you want to add or remove?” A scribe must take care not to imply in any way that an answer is incomplete or incorrect through these questions. The scribe may respond to procedural questions asked by the student such as, “Do I have to use the entire space to answer the question?” The scribe may indicate, “No.”

Given the interaction with test materials and recording responses, it is recommended that two adults are in the test environment during translation and transcription. Pages containing the student’s original or translated answers are secure materials and must be returned to the SAC along with used scratch paper provided during the test unit.

Refer to *6.1.6 Transcription Instructions*.

Responses in languages other than English on ELA and Spanish on CSLA cannot be translated.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Non-English Response
 - Expected Value = 03 = Language other than English/Spanish – Written
 - Expected Value = 04 = Language other than English/Spanish – Oral (Scribe and Transcription)

CBT Given the complexity of translating and transcribing student responses into the online form of the assessment, districts may want to consider providing students with the paper-based form.

The recommended steps for administering this accommodation are:

1. The student (or scribe) writes responses to the constructed response questions on a separate piece of paper in the student’s language, indicating each response by item number. The student completes the selected response and technology-enhanced items on the device. The Test Administrator collects the student’s responses at the end of the unit.
2. The student exits the test unit following the directions in the Transcription Instructions.
3. Translate the student’s responses into English on a separate piece of paper*, and
4. Transcribe the student’s responses into the student’s online test form.

*If the person providing the translation is also the person who will complete the entry into the student’s online form, steps 3 and 4 may be combined. The translator/transcriber translates the student’s responses into English without embellishment.

PBT The steps for administering this accommodation are:

1. The student (or scribe) writes responses to the constructed response questions on a separate piece of paper in the student’s language, indicating each response by item number. This paper is kept with the student test book. The Test Administrator collects the student’s responses at the end of the unit.
2. Translate and transcribe the student’s responses into English in the student’s test book after the student completes testing.

The translator/transcriber translates the student’s responses into English without embellishment directly into the student’s test book.

Scribe – English Spoken for Math, Science, and Social Studies

As English is not the native language, the scribe accommodation may be appropriate based on ML plan documentation.

Assess the student in a separate, one-on-one testing environment.

The scribe must record student responses verbatim into the answer field on the test. The scribe may not prompt or question the student or correct a student's responses. The scribe may ask the student to restate words, as needed, and use proper mechanics and spelling. Scribes must be familiar with content vocabulary. For math, the scribe may not set up problems for the student; the student must indicate all steps and work for any given item.

The scribe must allow the student to review the scribed response to make edits. If requested by the student, the scribe may read the response back to the student. Read the response in an even tone, being careful not to cue the student to errors. The student may dictate changes or edits; the scribe must make those changes exactly as dictated by the student, even if a change is incorrect. Only changes made during testing are allowed.

The scribe may ask, "Are you finished?" or, "Is there anything you want to add or remove?" A scribe must take care not to imply in any way that an answer is incomplete or incorrect through these questions.

The scribe may respond to procedural questions asked by the student such as, "Do I have to use the entire space to answer the question?" The scribe may indicate, "No."

Given the interaction with test materials and involvement in recording responses, it is recommended that two adults are present. Scribes must be proficient in reading and writing in the student's spoken language (English or Spanish).

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Response Accommodation
 - Expected Value = 02 = Scribe

CBT The Scribe for Math, Science, and Social Studies accommodation **is not** appropriate based solely on:

- A student's poor handwriting.
- A student's preference to speak rather than write/type.
- A student's poor attention span.
- A student's behavioral response to writing.

Scribes must be proficient in keyboarding. The student tells the scribe exactly what to type directly into the student's test on the computer, and, if needed, indicates answers to select on items.

PBT The Scribe for Math, Science, and Social Studies accommodation **is not** appropriate based solely on:

- A student's poor handwriting.
- A student's preference to speak rather than write/type.
- A student's poor attention span.
- A student's behavioral response to writing.

Scribes must write legibly. The student tells the scribe exactly what to write in the test book, and, if needed, indicates answers to select on selected response items.

Speech-to-Text – English (Requires Transcription)

As English is not the native language, speech-to-text may be appropriate based on ML plan documentation.

Refer to *6.1.3 Accommodations – Response Accommodations – Speech-to-Text*.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Response Accommodation
 - Expected Value = 01 = Speech-to-Text

Spanish Response

The Spanish response accommodation is available to students whose primary language is Spanish. Students should have received content-based instruction in Spanish within the school year.

While Spanish responses on English forms are scored by scorers proficient in English and Spanish, the Spanish Transadapted form should be assigned to students who will respond in Spanish. Do not translate Spanish responses.

Spanish responses on ELA are not scored. In grades 3 and 4, students must respond in Spanish on CSLA.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Non-English Response
 - Expected Value = 01 = Spanish – Written
 - Expected Value = 02 = Spanish – Oral (Scribe)*

*If test is in Spanish, Accommodation Type field must be Both. For CSLA, a CDE-approved UAR is required.

Word Prediction

The word prediction accommodation is available to students as documented on their ML plans.

Refer to *6.1.3 Accommodations – Response Accommodations – Word Prediction*

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Word Prediction
 - Expected Value = Y = Yes

Time and a Half

Accommodation available to students using English forms as documented on their ML plans. For students using Spanish math, Spanish science, Spanish social studies, or CSLA forms, a need for time and a half must be documented on an IEP or 504 plan.

Refer to *6.1.3 Accommodations – Timing Accommodations – Time and a Half*.

PNP Indicators:

- Field = Extended Time
 - Expected Value = ML or Both*

*If test is in Spanish, Accommodation Type field must be Both.

Stop-the-Clock Breaks

The stop-the-clock breaks accommodation is available to students using English forms as documented on their ML plans. For students using Spanish forms, a need for stop the clock breaks must be documented on an IEP or 504 plan.

Refer to *6.1.3 Accommodations – Timing Accommodations – Stop-the-Clock Breaks*.

PNP Indicators: Not applicable

6.1.4 Unique Accommodations

Unique accommodations are available to a significantly limited number of students who have an IEP or 504 plan who meet specific criteria. There must be a direct connection between the student’s disability and the ability to access the assessment, which is used to determine qualification for use of a unique accommodation. Requests to use unique accommodations are submitted to CDE by the DAC through the Unique Accommodation Request (UAR) process.

Unique accommodations must be approved by the CDE Assessment Division prior to use on state assessments. UAR forms are available on the [State Assessment Accommodations Training](#) page. For math and ELA, these accommodations create an “Accommodations Reminder” in PAnext. Districts are responsible for ensuring that students are only provided with a Unique Accommodation if approval was received from CDE’s Assessment Division. If a unique accommodation is provided without CDE approval, the score is invalidated or suppressed, and the student does not count as participating in the assessment. The SAC and/or DAC must locally maintain a master list of all students and their accommodations to ensure appropriate forms and materials are assigned and ordered. **Note:** The 2020 CAS expect students to read (decode a printed or tactile code) and comprehend (make meaning of) literary and informational texts independently and proficiently. Assessment administration adjustments that would change this expectation are not accommodations. Any *modification* of the assessment is a misadministration and will result in an invalid score.

Scribe for ELA and CSLA Constructed Response

The following information applies to ELA assessments, including CSLA. For math, science, and social studies refer to *6.1.3 Response Accommodations* as the scribe accommodation does not require an approved UAR for math or science.

Scribe for ELA or CSLA constructed response must be documented on IEP or 504 plan and only available to students who meet the unique accommodation criteria and are approved by the CDE Assessment Division. Scribing for ELA is only in English; scribing for CSLA is only in Spanish. Refer to the *Guidance Document on Scribe Accommodation for CMAS ELA or CSLA Constructed Response* on the [State Assessment Accommodations Training](#) page.

The scribe accommodation for constructed response items on the ELA or CSLA assessment is available to a limited number of students with a neurological or orthopedic impairment which significantly limits or prevents the student’s motor process of **writing**. Students must have this accommodation on their IEP or 504 plan for instructional and assessment purposes. Only a very limited number of students who meet specific criteria may use this accommodation on the ELA or CSLA assessment and receive a valid score.

The student must be assessed in a separate, one-on-one testing environment.

The scribe must record student responses verbatim into the answer field on the test. The scribe may not prompt or question the student or correct a student’s responses. The scribe may not add, use, or prompt the use of proper mechanics unless the mechanics are initiated and dictated by the student. The scribe may ask the student to restate words, as needed. The scribe may use proper spelling. Scribes must be familiar with content vocabulary.

The scribe must allow the student to review the scribed response to make edits. If requested by the student, the scribe may read the scribed response back to the student. The response must be read in an even tone, being careful not to cue the student to errors. The student may dictate changes or edits to the scribe, and the scribe must make those changes exactly as dictated by the student, even if a change is incorrect. All changes must be made during the testing session.

The scribe may ask, “Are you finished?” or, “Is there anything you want to add or remove?” A scribe must take care not to imply in any way that an answer is incomplete or incorrect through these questions.

The scribe may respond to procedural questions asked by the student such as, “Do I have to use the entire space to answer the question?” The scribe may indicate, “No.”

Given the interaction with test materials and involvement in recording responses, it is recommended that two adults be in the testing environment. Scribes and transcribers must be proficient in reading and writing in the student’s spoken language (English for ELA or Spanish for CSLA).

Refer to *6.1.6 Transcription Instructions*

PNP Indicator:

- Field = Unique Accommodation
 - Expected Value = Y = Yes (Can only be set by CDE)
- Field = Accommodation Type
 - Expected Value = IEP504 or Both
- Field = Response Accommodation for ELA Constructed Response
 - Expected Value = 02 = Scribe

Calculator on Non-calculator Sections for Math

Calculator on non-calculator sections of math be documented on IEP or 504 plan and only available to students who meet the unique accommodation criteria and are approved by the CDE Assessment Division. Refer to *Guidance Document for a Calculation Device on Non-calculator Sections for the CMAS Math Assessment* on the [State Assessment Accommodations Training](#) page..

The Calculation Device and Math Charts and Counters on Non-Calculator Sections accommodation may be available to a limited number of students with a disability which significantly limits or prevents the student from **performing basic calculations**. Students must have this accommodation on their IEP or 504 plan for instructional and assessment purposes. Only a very limited number of students who meet specific guidance criteria may use the accommodation on the CMAS Mathematics assessment and receive a valid score.

Students approved for use of Calculator on the Non-Calculator Section for CMAS Math Assessment will have access to access to the approved grade-appropriate calculator provided by the school/district, which are:

- Grades 3 through 5: Four-function calculator (includes percentage function)
- Grades 6 and 7: Five-function calculator (includes square root and percentage function)
- Grade 8: Scientific

Math tools, including 100s charts, two-color chips, arithmetic tables, one-to-one counters or counting chips, square tiles, Base 10 blocks are approved at the district level. Number lines are not allowed.

PNP Indicator:

- Field = Unique Accommodation
 - Expected Value = Y = Yes (Can only be set by CDE)
- Field = Accommodation Type
 - Expected Value = IEP504 or Both
- Field = Calculation Device and/or Math Charts and/or Counters
 - Expected Value = C = Uses calculator on non-calculator sections
 - Expected Value = T = Uses math charts and/or counters on non-calculator sections
 - Expected Value = B = Uses both calculator and math charts and/or counters on non-calculator sections

6.1.5 Emergency Accommodations

In cases where a student needs a new accommodation immediately prior to the assessment due to unforeseen circumstances, an emergency accommodation may be appropriate. These accommodations are not identified on a student's IEP, 504, or ML plan. Cases could include students who have a recently fractured limb (e.g., fingers, hand, arm, wrist, or shoulder); whose only pair of eyeglasses has broken; or a student returning from a serious or prolonged illness or injury. If a student experiences a concussion immediately before or during assessment administration, contact Arti Sachdeva at CDE (720-316-7184).

If it is determined that a student requires an emergency accommodation on a CMAS or CoAlt assessment, notify Arti Sachdeva at CDE and complete the *Emergency Accommodation Form (Appendix G)*. Maintain the form in the student's assessment file. Provide notification to the parent that an emergency accommodation was provided. Consult with the District Assessment Coordinator (DAC) for approval if required by the district.

For CMAS, use of an emergency accommodation is documented on a student's Personal Needs Profile (PNP) in PearsonAccess^{next}:

- Field = Emergency Accommodation
 - Expected Value = 01 = Scribe
 - Expected Value = 99 = Other (i.e., any emergency accommodation that is not a scribe)

Through the PearsonAccess^{next} user interface, this field is located on the Manage Student Tests screen. Refer to the [Student Registration/Personal Needs Profile Field Definitions and File Layout](#) document for more information about indicating emergency accommodation through the file export/import process.

6.1.6 Transcription Instructions

Transcription of responses must take place in the following situations for students who:

- Use paper-based accommodations and:
 - Require large print or braille tests
 - Respond in a language other than English or Spanish
 - Use an assistive technology device
- Use computer-based accommodations and:
 - Respond in a language other than English or Spanish
 - Use an assistive technology device that is not compatible with TestNav
 - Require use of the online assistive technology form
 - Require use of the speech-to-text and/or word prediction accommodation on a secondary device

Transcription must occur after the administration of each test unit. Only authorized personnel may have access to the test and student responses. **Verbatim** transcription must occur in the presence of a second school or district employee who verifies the transcription is valid. Student work and/or answers that are not transcribed are not scored.

PBT Procedures for Transcribing Student Responses

- Use a No. 2 pencil.
- Transcribers must write legibly.
- The transcriber enters the student's responses into the student's scannable, standard print test book as originally written (including all errors in grammar, mechanics, and spelling) and without embellishment.
- The transcriber/translator must **NOT** be related to the student.

Procedures

1. Transcription must take place in a private, secure environment and, whenever possible, under the SAC's supervision. The transcriber must sign a *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement* from the current year.
2. In an unused standard print test book, the transcriber must copy the student's responses to constructed response items exactly as originally written (including all errors in grammar, mechanics, and spelling) and all marks for selected response and matching/technology enhanced items.
3. On the original test book, prominently mark "DO NOT SCORE" across the front cover with a black marker.
4. Return all test materials and used scratch paper to the SAC and then the DAC. This includes any large print and braille tests, pages printed from assistive technology devices, and any other pages containing students' original or translated answers as these are secure materials.
5. After verifying transcription, the DAC returns the scannable test books to Pearson with the scorable materials. Original test books are returned to Pearson with the nonscorable materials.

Braille

The braille test kit includes a scannable standard print test book. The student may record their answers directly on the adapted format book, on blank braille paper, or use a braille or braille note-taker. A teacher who is proficient in reading braille transcribes the student's responses into the standard print test book included in the braille test kit. The standard print test book is returned to Pearson for scoring. Student work and/or answers not transcribed are not scored.

Large Print

The large print test kit includes a scannable standard print test book. Transcribe student answers into the standard print test book included in the large print kit. The standard print test book is returned to Pearson for scoring. Student work and/or answers not transcribed are not scored. **Note:** If a magnifier sheet was received in the large print kit, return it to the SAC for return to Pearson after testing.

Translation

- The transcriber/translator must be proficient in reading and writing in the student's language and English.
 - **NOTE: Do not** translate and transcribe responses written in Spanish as they are scored by Pearson.
- The transcriber/translator should be familiar with the content area in both English and the student's language.

Assistive Technology

- If the assistive technology device has the capability to print, print the student’s answers for transcription.

Please note: For paper-based assessment accommodations, only scannable test books are scored. Any student responses in non-scannable accommodated forms (such as braille or large print versions of the test), or student responses written in a language other than English or Spanish, require translation, as appropriate, and transcription into a scannable test book for scoring.

CBT Procedures for Transcribing Student Responses

The transcriber must be proficient in keyboarding. Transcriptions must take place in a private, secure environment and, whenever possible, under the SAC’s supervision. Ensure the individual responsible for transcribing into TestNav signed a *CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement* from the current year. Return all test materials and used scratch paper to the SAC and then the DAC. This includes pages printed from assistive technology devices and any other pages containing students’ original or translated answers as these are secure materials.

Selected Response and Technology Enhanced Items

For selected response and technology enhanced items, *the student* enters responses into TestNav during the test session. At the end of the test, once all selected response and technology enhanced items completed, the student is to notify the Test Administrator.

Constructed Response Items

For constructed response items, a trained Test Administrator transcribes the responses after each test unit is completed by the student. Transcription takes place either immediately after unit completion (no student log out required) or delayed (student log out required, Test Administrator must resume), and before the state testing window closes.

Translation

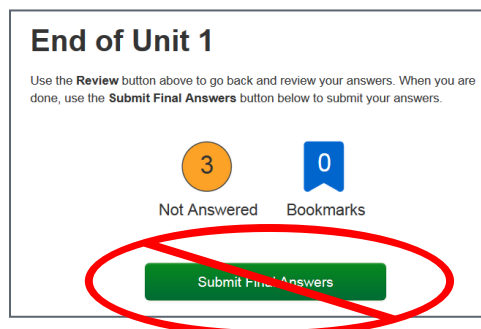
- The transcriber/translator must be proficient in reading and writing in the student’s language and English.
 - **NOTE: Do not** translate and transcribe responses written in Spanish as they are scored by Pearson.
- The transcriber/translator should be familiar with the content area in both English and the student’s language.

Assistive Technology

- If the assistive technology device has the capability to print, print the student’s answers for transcription.
- If the student utilized the AT form with tactile graphics/braille, a teacher who is proficient in reading braille and proficient in keyboarding must transcribe the student’s responses into the online TestNav form.
 - The student may record their answers directly on the adapted format book, on blank braille paper, or use a brailier or braille note-taker.

Procedures

- As the student encounters constructed responses, depending on the accommodation, the student uses a piece of paper, an assistive technology device, or a braille test book to respond to the questions. The student continues testing in TestNav, leaving constructed response items unanswered in TestNav.
- After completing the last question, the End of Unit screen appears. Students should NOT select the green “Submit Final Answers” button.



Transcribing Immediately Following the Student Completing the Test Unit

It is strongly suggested that transcription occurs as soon as the student finishes testing and prior to the student exiting the unit. Adhere to the following steps for transcription immediately following testing:

1. After completing the last question in the unit, the student does NOT “Submit Final Answers” or exit the test.
2. The student is excused from the testing environment.
Note: If student work was recorded on a second device, print the work from the device if possible. After printing or completion of transcription, securely clear all student responses from the second device.
3. Using TestNav’s review drop-down menu in the student’s test, the transcriber navigates to each of the constructed response items.
4. The transcriber copies the student’s marks or responses to constructed response items exactly as originally written (including all errors in grammar, mechanics, and spelling) and without embellishment.
5. The transcriber selects the green “Submit Final Answers” button on the End of Unit screen. The student’s unit status in PearsonAccess^{next} is now “Completed”.
6. Repeat this process for subsequent units.

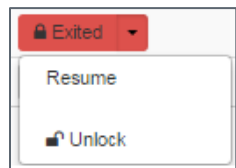
Delayed Transcribing

If transcribing does not immediately follow the student’s completion of the test unit, complete the following steps. (The Test Administrator may assist students who need help exiting their test.)

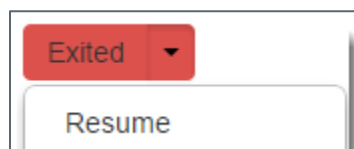
1. The student does NOT “Submit Final Answers” but does EXIT the test unit by completing the following steps:
 - a. Direct students to notify the Test Administrator when they get to the last question or when they arrive at the End of Unit screen (after completing all questions in the unit).
 - b. After the last question, select the button next to the student’s name (top right corner of the screen).
 - c. Choose the option “Sign out of TestNav”.
 - d. Select “Save and Return Later” on the Exit Test screen.
 - e. The sign out confirmation screen appears. The student’s unit status in PearsonAccess^{next} is now “Exited”.

Note: If student work was recorded on a second device, print the work from the device if possible. After printing or completion of transcription, securely clear all student responses from the second device.

2. The Test Administrator “unlocks” and “resumes” the student’s test unit through the PearsonAccess^{next} Students in Sessions screen. To unlock and resume a student’s test, follow these steps in PearsonAccess^{next} using the Test Administrator computer:
 - a. Go to **Testing > Students in Sessions**.
 - b. Type the name of the student’s test session in the **Session List** box.
 - c. Select the session name from the search results.
 - d. Locate the student, select the student’s unit status (**Exited**), and select **Unlock** if locked.



- e. Select the student’s unit status again and select **Resume**.



The student’s status is now “Resumed”.

- f. On the student’s testing device, enter the username and password from the Student Testing Ticket.

3. From the testing device, using the TestNav **Review** drop-down menu or navigation buttons, the transcriber navigates to each of the constructed response items.
4. The transcriber copies the student's marks or responses to constructed response items exactly as originally written (including all errors in grammar, mechanics, and spelling) and without embellishment.
5. The transcriber selects the green "Submit Final Answers" button on the End of Unit screen. The student's unit status in PearsonAccess^{next} is now "Completed".
6. Repeat this process for subsequent units.

Only authorized personnel may have access to the test and student answers. Schools must ensure procedures are in place for secure retrieval of printed materials. Remove all student responses from any assistive technology device immediately following transcription or printing for transcription purposes. It is the DAC's responsibility to ensure this is done in a secure manner. The DAC may adapt the *Secure Data Removal* form, found in *Appendix G* of the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual*, to verify completion of this step. Make documentation available upon request by CDE.

Return printed pages containing the student's answers and any used scratch paper from the test unit as these are secure materials. The SAC returns all secure materials to the DAC.

Students may not have access to assistive technology devices that contain secure materials until all secure materials are removed from the device. Secure devices that contain secure materials with testing materials.

6.2 Assigning and Ordering Accessibility Features and Accommodations Before Testing

Assign special test forms and physical materials prior to testing. When test format, accommodations, and accessibility features are indicated in PANext prior to January 24, 2025 (initial registration deadline) a separate ordering process is not needed as the appropriate physical materials are received automatically. *Table 2* identifies accessibility features and accommodations that require physical materials and/or special form assignment. If the January 24, 2025 deadline is missed, indicate the appropriate information through PANext registrations and place an additional order, if necessary.

6.2.1 Assigning Computer-based Testing Accessibility Features and Accommodations

Assign special CBT forms (e.g., text-to-speech, Spanish text-to-speech, and auditory/signed presentation script for translation) prior to testing. If students requiring these accommodations or accessibility features are not assigned the correct special form, they do not have access to necessary accommodations or accessibility features during testing.

Instructions for assigning special forms through PANext are found in *Appendix H*. Use the UI instructions to assign or update special forms one student at a time. To assign or update special forms for multiple students at once, refer to the [Student Registration/Personal Needs Profile \(SR/PNP\) Field Definitions and File Layout](#) document. (**Note:** Valid values for various fields may vary by content area.)

6.2.2 Ordering Accessibility Features and Accommodations Requiring Physical Materials

Assign accessibility features and accommodations requiring physical materials prior to testing: CBT and PBT auditory/signed presentation scripts, braille, standard print (including Spanish), and large print tests. Accommodated materials are received automatically prior to testing if indicated for students in PANext during the initial registration window from January 6 through 24, 2025. If a new student arrives or if a student has a newly identified need after January 24, the official DAC may order additional materials through PANext after arrival of the initial orders shipment. Inventory all materials. If there are not enough materials in the initial shipment to cover the additional need, place an additional order after updating the corresponding student test(s) SR/PNP settings in PANext. Detailed instructions for ordering additional materials during the additional orders window are included in *Appendix H*.

*Contact CDE Assessment regarding ELA/CSLA. Any modification of the assessment is a misadministration and will result in an invalid score.

6.3 Accommodated Materials During Testing

Always treat all accommodated materials as secure. Like test books, keep accommodated materials in a secure location when not in use for testing. Track all movement of accommodated materials using a chain of custody document.

6.4 Accommodated Materials After Testing

Test Administrators must return all accommodated materials to the SAC after each testing session and after the completion of testing. The SAC must return accommodated materials to the DAC after the school completes testing. After inventorying all materials, the DAC must return secure accommodated materials to Pearson in non-scorable return boxes. **It is imperative that all visual description documents, auditory/signed presentation scripts, and other secure accommodated materials are returned.** See *5.0 After Testing Tasks* for additional information regarding returning materials.

7.0 Reporting

This section describes CMAS and CoAlt reports available for use before, during, and after testing. Contact the CDE Assessment Division with questions about PearsonAccess^{next} Reports and Public Assessment Reports. Contact the CDE Office of Accountability and Data Analysis for Accountability Reports support.

Note: Participation data may vary between CDE *Assessment* reports and CDE *Accountability* reports due to different calculation requirements.

7.1 PearsonAccess^{next} Reports

Three types of reports are available through PearsonAccess^{next} to users with the appropriate roles. Reports include Operational Reports, OnDemand Reports, and Published Reports.

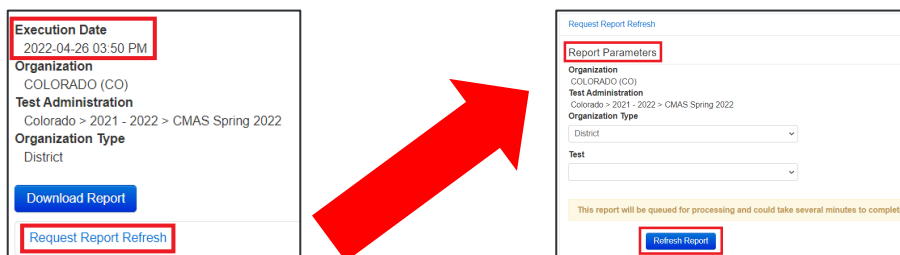
7.1.1 Operational Reports

Operational reports are used before, during, and immediately after testing to assist districts and schools in test setup, progress tracking, and data cleanup. They help identify actions that may need to be taken by Assessment Coordinators as well as data updates that may be needed. These reports are found in PearsonAccess^{next} under **Reports > Operational Reports**. They are available to users with the **Sensitive Data** role.

There are different **Report Categories** available based on the selected administration:

- Organization
- Students and Registrations
- Online Testing
- Orders and Shipment Tracking
- Users

These reports provide a snapshot of data in the system. It is important to always check the **Execution Date** of the report (the day and time the report ran, which indicates if the report contains out-of-date information). Click **Request Report Refresh**, if the option is displayed, to generate a report with current system data.



Confirm/update **Report Parameters** (parameters are only required if indicated by a red asterisk), then click **Refresh Report**. Click the refresh icon (🔄) to refresh the page, then download the updated report when available (click **Download Report**).

Refer to Appendix H: PAnext for information about reports that are particularly useful for specific purposes.

7.1.2 OnDemand Reports

OnDemand Reports (ODRs) are *preliminary* score reports that provide information about an individual student's mastery of skills and concepts in the Colorado Academic Standards. ODRs are considered preliminary because they do not include all the information that will be available on the final student performance reports (e.g., subclaim performance and school, district, and state comparative data). The purpose of ODRs is to provide student performance information as soon as possible.

These reports are found in PearsonAccess^{next} under **Reports > OnDemand Reports**. They are available to users with the **OnDemand Admin Report Access** role or **OnDemand Teacher Report Access** role. ODRs are typically available in June after tests are processed by the vendor and demographic data are finalized. CDE notifies DACs of ODR availability. When the final student performance reports become available in PearsonAccess^{next}, ODRs are no longer accessible.

When on the OnDemand Reports screen, use the filters to view ODRs by student, test, organization, subject, or grade. To view a report, click the blue icon next to the student's name. A pop-up screen displays the preliminary results for the student. When downloaded or printed, the report includes the assessment name and administration year, followed by test details. The test details include the content area of the test and grade level, as well as the district and school to which the student's scores were attributed.

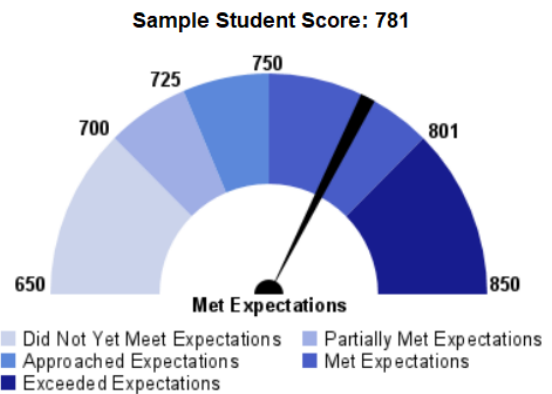
Score information on ODRs includes the student's criterion-referenced achievement results: **scale score** and **performance level**. A scale score is a numerical value that summarizes student performance by placing the points a student earns on a test on a common scale. The scale score is then used to determine the performance level, which describes the concepts and skills students are expected to demonstrate within a range of scores on that test. ODRs also include information on what a typical student knows and can do at the corresponding performance level (students scoring at Performance Level 1 are provided with the skills and concepts needed to achieve at the next level).

ODRs may be shared with parents as the district/school deems appropriate. These reports contain personally identifiable information and should be shared accordingly; they should not be widely distributed.

7.1.3 Published Reports

Final assessment achievement results are provided to schools and districts through data files and PDF reports. Results are found in PearsonAccess^{next} under **Reports > Published Reports**. They are available to users with the **Published Reports** role. Results typically begin becoming available in June after tests are processed by the vendor, demographic data are finalized, and score validation activities are completed. Data files and reports are released on a rolling basis throughout June and July; CDE notifies DACs as results become available.

Results include data such as scale scores; percentile rank; performance level; and performance by reporting category, subclaim, and domain/standard (e.g., points possible and percent of points earned). Depending on the report, data are



In the above example, the student's overall CMAS scale score, 781, is within the particular test's scale score range for the Met Expectations performance level (750-800).

Performance Level Descriptors (PLDs) are found below the graphic. Examples of PLDs demonstrated by students who Met Expectations include:

- Grade 5 Math – Add and subtract decimals to hundredths.
- Grade 5 ELA – Draw evidence from literary or informational texts to support analysis, reflection, and research.

available at the individual, school, district, and state levels. Certain reports include performance by demographic and program categories. For context, the number of valid scores and/or participation information are provided.

Note: CMAS and CoAlt results are available through PearsonAccess^{next} for all administrations going back to the 2013-14 school year. Change the selected administration in PearsonAccess^{next} to access and download results from previous administrations.

Results Embargo

All state assessment results from the Spring 2025 administration will be embargoed and must not be publicly disseminated, distributed, or published by any means until publicly released by the state. Each year the embargo lifts when state assessment results are presented to the State Board of Education (typically in August). While the embargo is in place, districts and schools may:

- Share confidential individual student performance reports with parents/guardians.
- Use aggregated and individual student level results internally for informational and planning purposes.

CDE notifies superintendents and DACs of exact dates and timing of the embargo. After the embargo lifts, ensure any data released by the district/schools includes appropriate suppressions to meet federal and state data privacy requirements, and local school board policy.

Reminder: Colorado statute requires that LEPs ensure appropriate personnel provide and explain assessment results to the parent/guardian of each student enrolled in the district or charter school (C.R.S. §22-7-1006.3 (8)(a)). Resources to support these conversations are available on the CDE Assessment [Communication Resources](#) page (resources are updated after each spring administration and are available in the summer).

Data Files

Two types of data files are produced: **student data files** and **summary data files**. Data file field definition and file layout documents are available on the Colorado Assessments [Portal Data File Layouts](#) page.

- Student data files provide performance data for each individual student test in the district or school. These data are used to populate individual Student Performance Reports (SPRs) and OnDemand Reports.
- Summary data files provide aggregate student performance data for the district or school, as well as for demographic groups. These data are used to populate district- and school-level PDF reports, as well as SPRs.

The following table includes the data files and reports available through PearsonAccess^{next}.

7.2 Public Assessment Reports

CMAS and CoAlt results are publicly posted once the data embargo lifts. For each grade level and content area test, these data include participation, score, and performance level information at the state, district, and school levels. When possible, aggregated student performance data representing 16 or more students is made available. Additional data suppression rules are also applied to aggregated reports to protect student privacy. Aggregated reports do not contain the names of individual students or teachers. Each spreadsheet includes participation, score, and performance level information at the school and district levels for the following reporting categories: Overall, Gender, Race/Ethnicity, Free/Reduced Lunch Status, IEP Status, Language Proficiency, Migrant Status, and Gifted and Talented Status. State data are included for comparison.

7.3 Accountability Reports

The accountability reports referenced in this section are produced by CDE’s Office of Accountability and Data Analysis. Direct all questions related to these reports and state accountability determinations to accountability@cde.state.co.us.

CDE’s Office of Accountability and Data Analysis produces two types of reports that use state assessment achievement data in report calculations and production: Growth and Performance Frameworks. These reports are based on calculation methods and reporting rules that are specific to state accountability; the presented data may differ at times from that released by other CDE offices.

7.3.1 Growth

The Colorado Growth Model looks at how individual students progress from one year to the next based on comparison to academic peer groups. Individual student growth reports are produced by the CDE Accountability and Analytics Unit along with school and district Growth Summary Reports. The Colorado Growth Model also provides information for different student populations and identifies areas of strength and areas that may need more support. Growth provides data necessary for the calculation of annual school and district accountability ratings. Growth is calculated for CMAS ELA and math, PSAT and SAT, and ACCESS assessments.

7.3.2 Performance Frameworks

Each year, schools and districts receive performance ratings to let them and their communities know how well they are doing. These reports are called the District Performance Frameworks (DPFs) and School Performance Frameworks (SPFs). The overall ratings are based on achievement and growth on state assessments, along with postsecondary measures such as graduation rates, drop-out rates, college entrance exams and college matriculation rates. The ratings help inform CDE and the State Board of Education in making decisions about how to support struggling schools.

Appendix A: Glossary

Accessibility Feature (AF) – CBT-embedded and TA-provided features that allow for inclusive, accessible, and fair testing for diverse populations of students. AFs are available to all students.

Additional Order (AO) – An order placed in PearsonAccess^{next} to receive additional assessment or administration materials after the initial shipment of materials is delivered and inventoried locally.

Administrative Consideration (AC) – Change in testing environment conditions

Colorado Academic Standards (CAS) - Expectations of what students need to know and be able to do at the end of each grade in the content areas of reading, writing, math, science, etc.

Colorado Alternate (CoAlt) – Alternate assessment of ELA, math, science, and social studies for students with the most significant cognitive impairment.

Colorado Measures of Academic Success (CMAS) – State assessment measuring mastery of the Colorado Academic Standards in the areas of English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies.

Colorado Spanish Language Arts (CSLA) – Replaces the ELA assessments for eligible ML students in 3rd and 4th grade. Students must receive Spanish language arts instruction within the school year.

Computer-based Test (CBT) – Assessment taken on a computer or tablet device (including iPads and Chromebooks)

District Assessment Coordinator (DAC) – The individual at the district level responsible for the overall coordination of test administration. The DAC is appointed by the superintendent. Also referred to as LEA Test Coordinator

District Technology Coordinator (DTC) – The individual at the district who ensures that technology readiness activities, designed to ensure that testing environments are ready for testing, are completed well in advance of testing.

Dynamic Learning Maps (DLM) – CoAlt ELA and math assessment for students with the most significant cognitive impairment.

English Language Arts (ELA) – The reading and writing content areas.

English Language Proficiency (ELP) – Level of English language development.

Multilingual Learner (ML) NEP/LEP – A student who is linguistically diverse and who is identified (using the state-approved English language proficiency assessment) as having a level of English language proficiency that requires language support to achieve standards in grade-level content in English.

Extended Evidence Outcome (EEO) – Extension of the Colorado Academic Standards, measured on the alternate assessment.

Fluent English Proficient (FEP) – An English language proficiency level. A ML who has spoken, or currently speaks, a language other than English, but who is able to comprehend, speak, read and write English on a level comparable to their monolingual English-speaking peers. Student will be monitored for two years (Monitor 1 is year one) after designation as FEP.

Limited English Proficient (LEP) – An English language proficiency level. A student who comprehends, speaks, reads, or writes some English, but whose predominant comprehension or speech is in a language other than English.

Local Education Agency (LEA) – The school district.

Local Education Provider (LEP) – A district, school, or program providing educational services.

Non-English Proficient (NEP) – An English language proficiency level. A student who speaks a language other than English and does not comprehend, speak, read, or write English.

Paper-based Test (PBT) – Assessment taken on paper.

PearsonAccess^{next} (PANext or PAN) – The website used for the registration, setup, management, and reporting for all content areas of the CMAS assessments and CoAlt Science and Social Studies assessments. PANext requires usernames and passwords to be created for new users or re-enabled for returning users. More information about setup and operation of online testing is available in the *PANext User Guide* located at <http://coassessments.com> > Manuals and Training.

Personally Identifiable Information (PII) – Sensitive student data (e.g., name, SASID, DOB, etc.) that can only be shared with authorized individuals through a secure file transfer.

Physical testing group – Students who take assessments together in a physical testing environment at the same time. During make-up testing, a physical testing group may include students from different test sessions spanning different grades and content areas (administration directions and unit testing time must be the same).

School Assessment Coordinator (SAC) – The individual at the school level responsible for the overall coordination of test administration at their school. Also referred to as School Test Coordinator

Secure materials – All test content or materials that are not made available to the public. This includes CBT and PBT items and student responses. For the CBT, “secure paper materials” include printed Student Testing Tickets, auditory/signed presentation scripts, and used scratch paper. For PBT, “secure paper materials” include test books, used grade 11 science periodic tables, used math reference sheets, auditory/signed presentation scripts, used scratch paper, and any accommodated material (e.g., braille teacher notes and large print visual descriptions). After testing is completed, DACs must collect all secure materials from SACs for packaging and return to the vendor. Proper chain of custody procedures outlined in this document (and as determined by the school district) must be followed so these materials remain secure at all times.

Session – A physical group of students or virtual grouping of students in PANext. These students will take all units of a content area assessment together (they will take the same unit at the same time). For computer-based tests, students must be placed in a scheduled online test session before they can log in to begin or complete testing.

Speech-to-Text (STT) – Accommodation for eligible students with disabilities and Multilingual Learners (NEP/LEP) where the student speaks into an assistive technology device to respond to assessment questions. Transcription may be required.

Storage area – Test materials must be stored in a locked storage area with limited access when not in use. Examples of secure storage include a closet, desk, or cabinet that can be locked. Test materials must not be stored in classrooms.

Student Biographical Data (SBD) – A final opportunity for districts to review student biographical data and make changes to ensure reporting is accurate. SBD is completed in CDE’s Data Pipeline, not PearsonAccess^{next}.

Student Performance Report (SPR) – Assessment results in a printed or printable PDF report for an individual student. Also referred to as Individual Student Report (ISR).

Student Registration/Personal Needs Profile (SR/PNP) – The file or user interface fields used to register students for computer-based and paper-based assessments and indicate the need for accessibility features and accommodations.

School Technology Coordinator (STC) – Districts may choose to identify School Technology Coordinators to coordinate efforts at individual testing sites. The STC is the individual at the school who ensures that technology readiness activities, designed to ensure testing environments are ready for testing, are completed well in advance of testing. If identified, School Technology Coordinators must coordinate with the DTC.

Student Testing Tickets – Contain the unique username and password needed for each student to log in to the TestNav app to take the CMAS assessment. Students launch the app, select the Colorado icon, and then enter the username and password from the Student Testing Ticket. A different ticket is used for each content area assessment.

Student with a Disability (SWD) – Student with an IEP or 504 plan. SWD designation required for assignment of certain accommodations.

Technology Enhanced Item (TEI) – Types of assessment items that present questions and capture student responses in ways not possible on paper-based tests (e.g., drag-and-drop, hot spot). TEIs are converted to a comparable format for paper-based testing.

Test Administrator (TA) – Education professional who administers the CMAS or CoAlt assessment (cannot be a student teacher). For CoAlt assessment specifically, the Test Administrator must be a licensed education professional (substitute teachers may not administer the alternate assessments).

Test Administrator Manual (TAM) – Manuals used by Test Administrators that provide directions regarding administration and security policies and procedures for the various assessments. TAMs include directions that are read aloud or signed, word-for-word, to students on each testing day.

Test Incident Report (TIR) – Spreadsheet used to track reported issues or misadministrations experienced during assessment administration.

Testing Environment – All surroundings while students are testing, including what a student can see, hear, or access.

TestNav – The online test engine used to administer computer-based assessments. TestNav is accessed through the downloadable TestNav Desktop Application; TestNav applications for iPads, Android devices, and Chromebooks.

Text-to-Speech (TTS) – Embedded CBT auditory presentation feature that reads the item and answer options to students. This auditory presentation of the assessment replaces the need for an adult reading from an oral script. TTS must be pre-assigned to students, as needed. TTS is available to individual students based on need.

Unique Accommodations Request (UAR) – Form that must be completed to request the use of a unique accommodation by an individual student with disabilities to use on the assessment. Individual students must meet all criteria on UAR form and supporting data must be submitted for review by CDE Assessment to determine eligibility. Submit UARs via CDE Assessment Syncplicity by December 15.

Unit – An individual part of a CMAS assessment. Units must be administered sequentially for all content areas, including for makeup testing. All CMAS assessments include three test units. For computer-based testing, the test units are locked and need to be unlocked just prior to students beginning each unit. For paper-based testing, pull-tab seals are used to seal each unit of the test book until the time of testing.

User Interface (UI) – The screens accessed by a PAnext user to complete assessment tasks (e.g., register students, place additional orders, manage test sessions) after logging in to PAnext.

Appendix B: CMAS and CoAlt Security Agreement

Note: This form is used by Assessment Coordinators, Technology Coordinators, Test Administrators, and any other district/school employee involved in assessment administration or handling secure materials. The *official* District Assessment Coordinator (appointed by the Superintendent) completes the online DAC Security Agreement form shared by CDE during the *Spring 2025 CMAS Administration Training for DACs* which is automatically sent to CDE through the online form.



Security Agreement

Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt: Math, ELA, Science, and Social Studies

Maintaining the security of all test materials is crucial to obtaining valid results from the CMAS and CoAlt: Math, ELA (including CSLA), Science, and Social Studies assessments. The security of all test materials must be maintained before, during, and after test administration. Because you are involved in the administration of the CMAS and/or CoAlt: Math, ELA, Science, and Social Studies assessments, it is important for you to know that the prohibited activities on the following list threaten the integrity of the test. Engaging in prohibited activities may result in an investigation, suppression of scores, and possible disciplinary action.

This form must be signed by all individuals involved in the administration of the CMAS and/or CoAlt: Math, ELA, Science, and Social Studies assessments to certify that security measures will be maintained and that prohibited activities, such as the examples identified below, have been acknowledged and understood.

District Assessment Coordinators (DACs)

- I have completed all CMAS and CoAlt training as provided by CDE and the assessment vendor.
- I will read the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual* and maintain all identified security measures and administration policies and procedures.
- I will establish and carry out a district security plan.
- I will provide training to all Sensitive Data personnel, DTCs, and SACs in my district in regard to test security, administration policies, and procedures.
- I will collect, inventory, and follow all chain of custody requirements documented in the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual*.
- I will report testing irregularities or security breaches, as specified in the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual*, to CDE.

Sensitive Data

- I have completed all CMAS and CoAlt training as provided by the DAC.
- I will read the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual* and maintain all identified security measures and administration policies and procedures, as they apply to my role.

District Technology Coordinators (DTCs)

- I have completed all CMAS and CoAlt training as provided by CDE and the DAC.
- I will read the appropriate sections of the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual* and maintain all identified security measures and administration policies and procedures.

School Assessment Coordinators (SACs)

- I have completed all CMAS and CoAlt training as provided by the DAC.
- I will read the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual* and maintain all identified security measures and administration policies and procedures.
- I will establish and carry out a school security plan.
- I will train all Test Administrators in regard to test security, administration policies, and procedures.
- I will not remove secure test materials from the school's campus unless returning the materials to the DAC.
- I will collect, inventory, and follow all chain of custody requirements documented in the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual* and as determined by the district.
- I will report testing irregularities or security breaches, as specified in the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual*, to the DAC.

CMAS and CoAlt Test Administrators

- I have completed all CMAS or CoAlt Test Administrator training as provided by the SAC.
- I will maintain security measures and administration policies and procedures identified in the *CMAS Test Administrator Manual* or the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual*.
- I will not download any part of the assessments, unless an assistive device that requires downloading content is used for a student with an approved accommodation. In this rare situation, the content must be securely removed from the device immediately after the student completes the assessment.
- I will not remove secure test materials from the school's campus.
- I will remove or cover prohibited visual aids in the testing environment and configure the room to prevent a student from viewing another student's test materials or testing device screen.
- I will not leave test materials unattended or fail to keep test materials secure when in my possession.
- I will not explain or read passages, sources, or test items to students. (Exception: Reading is only allowed if administering an auditory/signed presentation script or CoAlt assessment.)

- I will not coach students (e.g., give students verbal or non-verbal cues) during testing, or alter or otherwise interfere with students' responses in any way.
- I will not engage in activities that will result in lack of supervision of students at any time (e.g., use a cell phone or other prohibited electronic device [unless for purposes of communicating with the SAC, DTC, or technology support], check email, grade papers), including leaving students unattended at any time during the test session.
- I will not allow students to communicate with each other in any way or cause disturbances at any time during the test session.
- I will not allow students to use cell phones or other prohibited materials and electronic devices (e.g., smartphones, smart watches, smart glasses, iPods, eReaders) at any time during the test session.
- I will not encourage students to finish any test unit early.
- I will not provide students with more time than is allotted for testing (except for students who have an extended time accommodation listed in their approved IEP, 504, or ML plan).
- I will collect, inventory, and follow all secure chain of custody requirements as determined by the school/district.
- I will not actively read, view, or comment on student responses (except when viewing student responses for accommodation purposes, such as scribing or transcription).
- Some CMAS accommodations and all CoAlt tests require Test Administrators to view and read test content, and/or transcribe student responses. If I am administering such an accommodation or the CoAlt assessment, I will not disclose any test content that I view while providing these accommodations.
- I will report testing irregularities or security breaches, as specified in the *CMAS Test Administrator Manuals* or the *CoAlt Test Administrator Manual*, to the SAC.

All individuals involved in CMAS and/or CoAlt administration

- I will not actively read or view the assessment items or content before, during, or after testing except if necessary to administer an auditory/signed presentation script or CoAlt assessment.
- I will not copy or otherwise reproduce **any part of** secure test materials including test stimuli, test items, and student responses or save any part of the assessments.
- I will not discuss the content of the assessments with anyone, including students or school personnel, through verbal exchange, email, social media, or any other form of communication before, during, or after testing.
- I will not score—formally or informally—test items or student responses.
- I will not engage in any activity that will adversely affect the validity, reliability, or fairness of the test(s).

I acknowledge the information above, pertaining to my role in the CMAS and/or CoAlt: Math, ELA, Science, and Social Studies administration, and agree to all of the statements associated with my role. I also acknowledge that a failure to abide by the terms of this agreement may result in serious consequences, as described above.

I acknowledge that I have read and will follow Section 2.0 Test Security and Administration Policies of the CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual, and/or the CMAS Test Administrator Manuals or CoAlt Test Administrator Manual as they apply to my role(s).

The signed form must be maintained physically or electronically by the district for three years.

Administration of the CMAS and CoAlt assessments may require student responses or task-based materials to be temporarily stored on local devices. Because the student responses are unencrypted and the task-based materials contain assessment content, they are secure and must be treated as such.

- **Student responses saved on secondary devices:** Certain accommodations require the use of secondary devices for students to respond to assessment questions (e.g., speech-to-text, word prediction). To be scored, responses saved on secondary devices need to be transcribed into online or paper test forms, depending on the testing mode that is used by the student. All student responses must be removed from the secondary device or flash drive immediately following transcription or printing of student responses for transcription purposes.
- **CoAlt science task manipulatives:** While hard-copy CoAlt task manipulatives are included in CoAlt science test kits, they are also available electronically to allow for customization based on individual student need.

It is the DAC's responsibility to ensure that all secure content is deleted after testing or transcription in a secure manner.

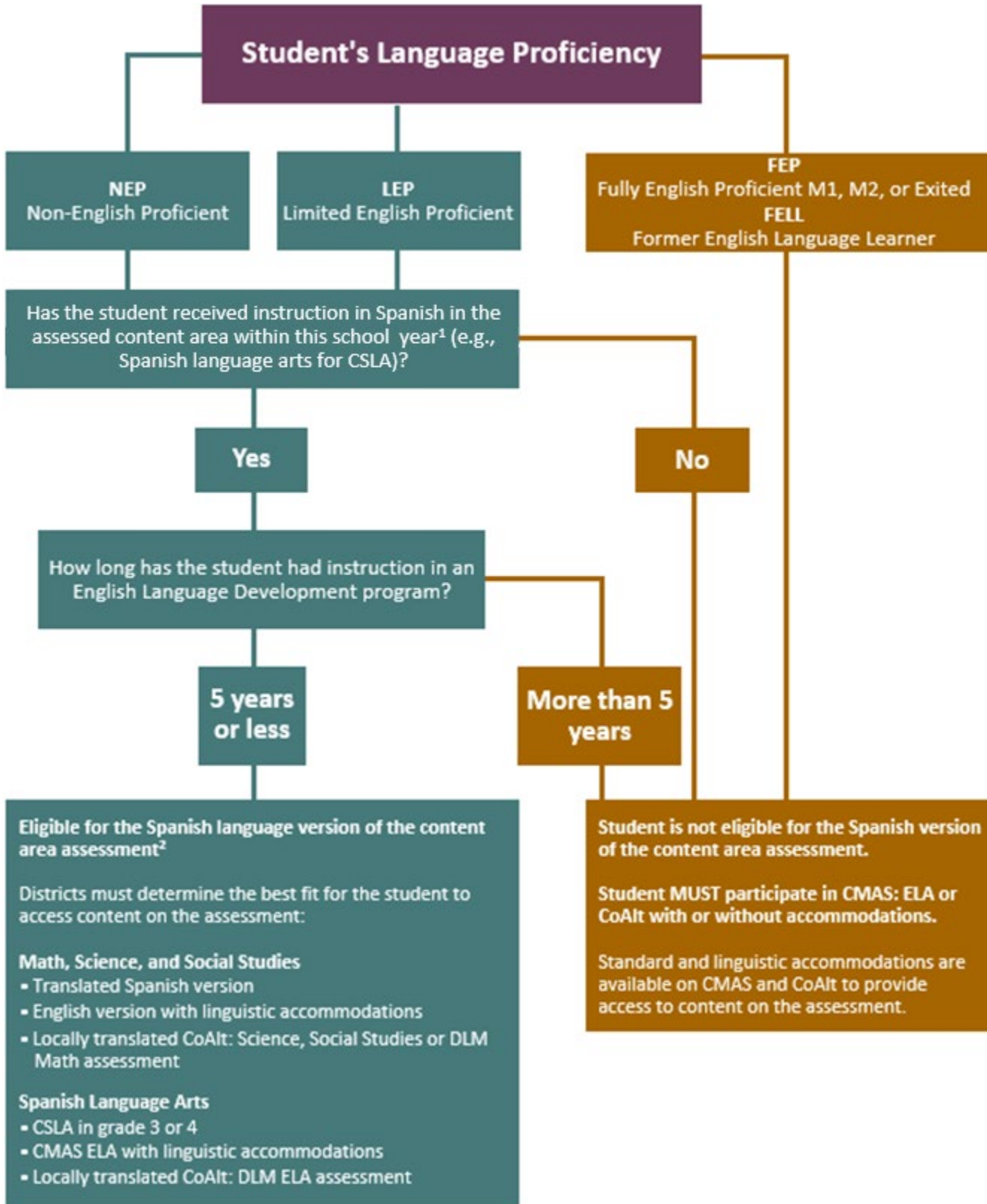

User Accounts

PAnext is a secure platform that is accessed through user accounts. User accounts are created and maintained by Assessment Coordinators at the District and/or School level.

PAnext User Roles and Permissions

The table on the following page shows standard base and add-on roles that may be assigned to PAnext users. Role-associated functions that may be performed by each user type are indicated. Individuals can be assigned more than one role to fulfill the need for additional permissions (e.g., a School Assessment Coordinator who will create test sessions and manage student registration data (PII*) will require the School Test Coordinator and Sensitive Data roles).

The official DAC for each district is assigned the LEA/District Test Coordinator base role and appropriate add-on roles. The DAC may confer roles to other PAnext users in their district as appropriate.

CMAS Role	PAnext Base Role
District Assessment Coordinator (DAC)	LEA/District Test Coordinator
School Assessment Coordinator (SAC)	School Test Coordinator
District Technology Coordinator (DTC)	Technology Coordinator
CMAS Test Administrator	Test Administrator

Higher level roles, like LEA/District Test Coordinator, include permissions of lower-level administration roles. DACs do not need the School Test Coordinator or Test Administrator role and SACs do not need the Test Administrator role.

Add-on roles are assigned in addition to base roles to provide access to additional functionality in PAnext. The following add-on roles are assigned to DACs:

- Sensitive Data Role – View and edit sensitive student data*
 - Users with this PAnext role have access to PII
 - Must have this role to import SR/PNP files
- Student Test Update – Allows export/import of STU file to batch update Void and Not Tested codes/reasons
 - Must have this role to void tests (including through the PAnext user interface)
 - Assigned to DACs at the beginning of the assessment window
- OnDemand Admin Report Access – Provides access to post-test on-demand individual student reports – these reports do not include comparative data
 - Assigned to DACs when OnDemand Reports become available in PAnext
- Published Reports – Provides access to post-test reports (i.e., results) and data files

Note: Some add-on roles are only available at certain times before, during, or after the administration window. Additionally, all users are locked out of PAnext at different times throughout the year:

Scheduled PAnext Lockouts (occur annually)

- December 15, 2024 through January 5, 2025: Administration setup (programming by Pearson and initial student registrations loaded by CDE)
- January 25, 2025 through February 2, 2025: Initial materials order pull (performed by Pearson)
- Beginning COB May 7, 2025: Close of data clean-up window
 - Official DAC user accounts are enabled when results (i.e., data files and reports) are available in the summer (typically in June).
 - If additional data updates are needed after PAnext is locked, the district’s Data Respondent must submit those changes through the optional Student Biographical Data (SBD) review process through CDE’s Data Pipeline. Refer to Appendix K for SBD dates.

*Personally Identifiable Information (PII) can be viewed/updated by users with the Sensitive Data and Student Test Update roles. Districts should only assign these user roles to individuals who may access PII.

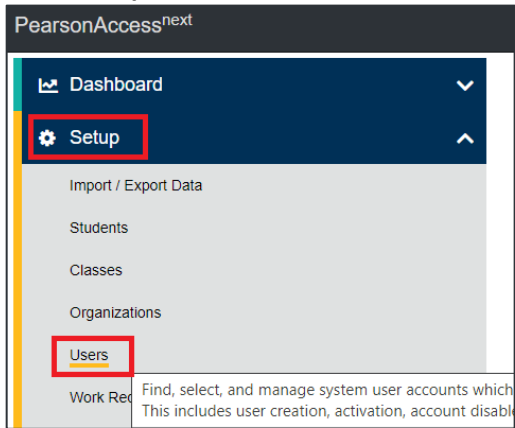

Initial Orders – Test Format, Accessibility Features, and Accommodations

The default test format for CMAS assessments is online (O) for computer-based testing (CBT). If districts provide paper-based testing (PBT) information to CDE by December 15, 2024 through the *District Testing Information and Format Selection* form (shared upon DAC completion of *CMAS Administration Training*), CDE will change the test format to paper (P) for students taking the indicated grade level and content area tests at the appropriate organizations. If notification is not provided to CDE regarding test format, or if individual students require PBT forms and/or accommodations, it is the district's responsibility to update the test format to paper (P) and add the accommodations in PAnext for the appropriate students from **January 6 to 24, 2025**.

Online Forms with Accessibility Features or Accommodations

- Auditory Presentation: Text-to-Speech – Text is read aloud to the student by means of the embedded text-to-speech software.
 - Accessibility feature for math, science, and social studies
 - Available in English and Spanish
- Auditory/Signed Presentation: Script (reader/signer) – Form used with scripts for translation into languages other than English or Spanish for computer-based testing (CBT), including with the signer accommodation. To assign the appropriate form, place the student's test in a test session with the **Proctor Reads Aloud** checkbox selected, and session **Form Group Type** set to **Auditory/Signed Presentation**.
 - Auditory/signed presentation script is an accommodation for online math, science, and social studies tests
- Assistive Technology – Form is for use with compatible outside assistive technology devices/software.
 - Prior to testing, schools should try the device in a secure practice environment to determine if it is compatible with TestNav. This is done through the PearsonAccess^{next} Training Site.
 - If the device is not compatible with TestNav, the student may need two devices for testing, and transcription of responses into the student's test is required.
- Accessibility features that can be set in advance but are not form-specific:
 - Enlarged Pointer – Enlarges the size of the pointer used by the student to interact with the online test. This accessibility feature must be indicated in the PNP in advance if needed by a student.
 - Color Contrast – Can be set to a specific background and font color so a student does not have to make their own adjustments during testing, but any student can access this accessibility feature at any time, regardless of setting in advance.
 - Zoom Percentage – Can be set to a specific enlargement so a student does not have to make their own adjustments during testing, but any student can access this accessibility feature at any time, regardless of setting in advance.

For students not requiring a special form, additional indications are not required in PAnext as the students are automatically assigned to a form once their online test session is “prepared”. Unless indicated otherwise, all students are defaulted to a “main” form of the assessment. All assessment tools are accessible to students on the “main” form, but online accommodations and the text-to-speech accessibility feature are not accessible unless assigned prior to testing. If students are not correctly assigned to special forms before “preparing” the test session, remove the students from the test sessions in order to correct the special forms assignment.

Paper Test Forms

- Paper Test Book – sent as kits with associated materials as follows:
 - Grade 11 science includes periodic table
 - Math includes math reference sheets and rulers/protractors as appropriate by test
- Large Print Kit – large print tests are spiral-bound and measure 14 inches by 18 inches. Kit includes the necessary standard print materials for transcription.
 - A visual descriptions document used by the student is included in the large print kits when needed.
- Spanish Paper Test Kits – test content and associated materials presented in Spanish
- Braille Kits – braille test materials produced in UEB code. Math and science kits printed in UEB with Nemeth and UEB Math/Science. Kit includes the necessary standard print materials for transcription.

Auditory/Signed Presentation Scripts – Used to provide an auditory presentation (oral reading) or signed presentation of the test form by a district/school employee to a student who cannot decode text. As indicated, some auditory/signer scripts require documentation on the student’s IEP, 504, or ML plan. The CBT and PBT auditory/signer scripts are not interchangeable.

- PBT English Auditory Presentation Script
- PBT Spanish Auditory Presentation Script –for students with an ML plan (NEP/LEP only)
- PBT Auditory/Signed Presentation Script for Translation* - accommodation for students with disabilities or ML plan (NEP/LEP only)
- CBT Auditory/Signed Presentation Script for Translation* - accommodation for students with disabilities or ML plan (NEP/LEP only)

* Scripts for Translation are used for presentation in languages other than English or Spanish, including sign language.

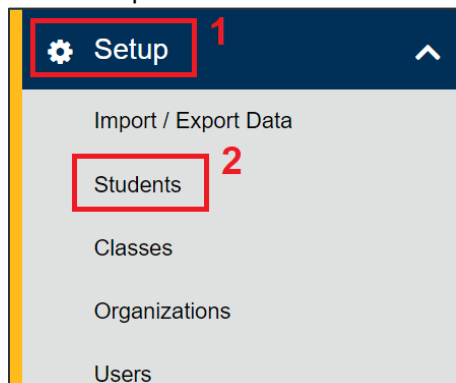

Automatic orders are triggered if the paper test format (and any associated accommodations) is indicated from January 6 to 24, 2025. Any indication of paper testing after January 24, 2025 requires the DAC to place an additional order prior to testing (refer to *Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt Critical Dates* for additional order dates).

- Select the **Setup** tab.
- Select the **Students** action.
- Find the student.
- Place a checkmark in the box to the left of the student's name.
- From the **Tasks** drop-down, select **Manage Student Tests**.
- Select the **Start** button.
- The Test Details screen appears.

- If the student is not already assigned to a test, select the student name from the **Student** drop-down, select the appropriate test from the **Test** drop-down, and select the appropriate organization from the **Organization** drop-down.
- From the **Test Format** drop-down, select **Paper**.
- If an accommodated paper form is needed, select the accommodations for each student.
- Select **Save**.
- After the green confirmation message appears, select **Exit Tasks** to continue.

Assigning and Ordering Auditory/Signed Presentation Materials

For initial orders, scripts used for PBT or CBT auditory/signed presentation are ordered by indicating the testing format and the appropriate auditory/signed presentation information for the student in PANext either via SR/PNP or student-by-student through the User Interface. The registrations information entered into PANext from January 6 to 24, 2025 are used to fulfill initial orders for auditory/signed presentation scripts.

Note: Only auditory/signed presentation provided to a student by a district/school employee reading from a word-for-word script document requires materials to be ordered. For CBT, Auditory Presentation: Text-to-Speech (English or Spanish) is provided by embedded software and *does not require the ordering of any physical materials*.

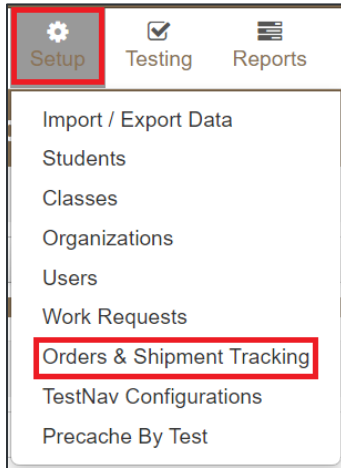

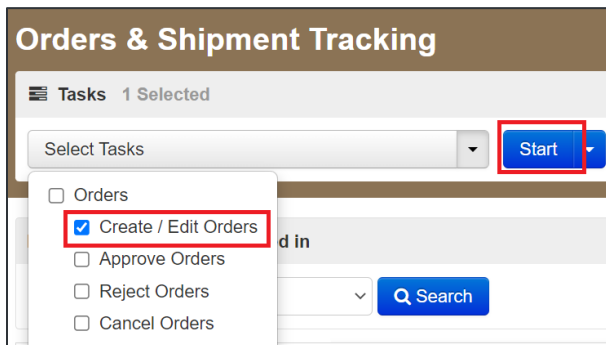
Additional Orders (DACs only)

Following the close of the initial orders window on January 24, 2025, DACs may submit additional order requests to Pearson. Only the official DAC registered with CDE may place additional orders. The Additional Orders window for secure materials opens one day after the district receives the initial materials shipment through April 29, 2025.

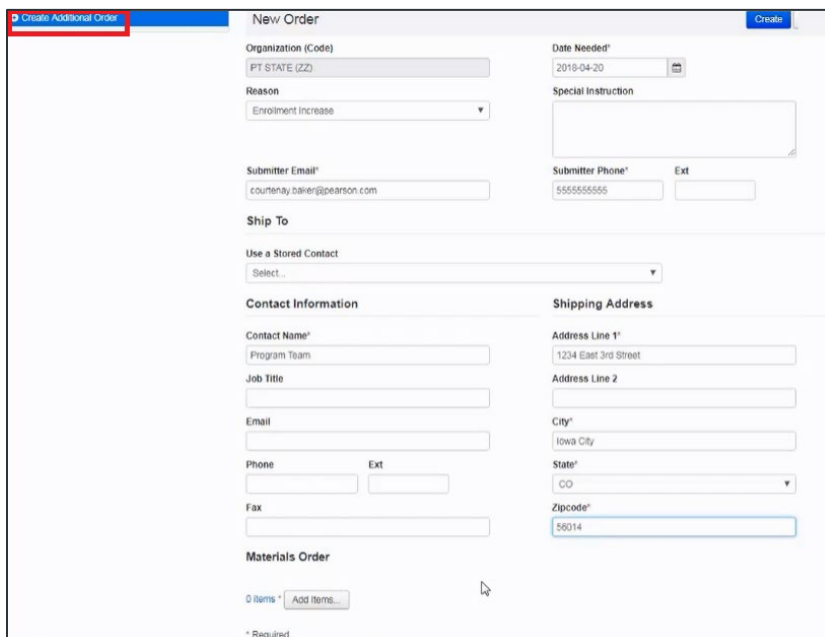

Student Records – Enroll, Register, and Assign Student Tests

All student records require completion of three steps in PearsonAccess^{next}. First, **enrollment** occurs when a student record is created. Once created/enrolled, **register** the student to the current administration (i.e., **CMAS Spring 2025** or **CoAlt Science and Social Studies Spring 2025**). Lastly, once the student is registered, **assign** the appropriate tests. PearsonAccess^{next} Operational Reports

Operational reports help identify actions that need to be taken by Assessment Coordinators as well as data updates that may be needed. These reports are found in PearsonAccess^{next} under **Reports > Operational Reports**. There are different **Report Categories** available based on the selected administration: Organization, Students and Registrations, Online Testing, Orders and Shipment Tracking, and Users. Many useful reports are found in the **Students and Registrations** and **Online Testing** categories.

Note: It is important to always check the **Execution Date** of the report (the day and time the report ran, which indicates if the report contains out of date information). Click **Request Report Refresh**, if the option is displayed, to generate a report with current system data.

For online testing specifically, the **Session Roster** report is very useful (**Reports > Operational Reports > Online Testing > Session Roster**). This report shows all tests that were completed (Test Status = attempt/complete), tests that are in sessions that were never prepared/started (Test Status = assigned), and tests that are partially completed by the student or never started by the student but in a prepared/started session (Test Status = testing/in progress).

- Tests in “assigned” status may still need to be administered, or they may need to be coded with Not Tested Codes/Reasons.
- Tests in “testing” status need one of the following actions to be taken:
 1. Student needs to complete the test,
 2. Test needs to be removed from the session in order to add Not Tested Coding (if all units are in “ready” status and the student will not test), or
 3. Incomplete units need to be marked complete in order to add Void Test Score Coding (if one or more units are in a status other than “ready” and the student will not complete the test).
- Tests in “attempt” status were completed, but some might need Void Test Score Coding if they should not be scored.

Other operational reports that are helpful for both online and paper-based testing are found in the **Students and Registrations** category (Reports > Operational Reports > Students and Registrations).

- **Students where Responsible Org is Different from Testing Org** - Students registered to test at my organization but a different organization is currently listed as responsible for the student.
 - Some differences may be accurate for students whose scores should go to a different district as your district is providing educational services for that district.
- **Students Who Tested Outside of Responsible Org** - Students registered to test outside of my organization but my organization is responsible for the student.
 - This shows students who transferred out of your district but your district is still listed as responsible. You may want to reach out to the new district to ask them to update the Responsible School Code field if this is incorrect. The statewide DAC directory is available at <http://www.cde.state.co.us/assessment/dac>.
- **Students Enrolled but not Registered for Test Administration** - List of all students who are enrolled for a test administration but are not registered.
 - If anyone unregistered students, they are found on this report. Re-register the students and add the appropriate test assignments, then apply *Not Tested Coding*, if appropriate. Remember, students who move away must not be unregistered – these records are handled with coding if a transfer request was never received from the new district.
- **Students Registered but not Assigned to a Test** - List of all students that are registered for a test administration but do not have any student tests assigned to them.
 - If anyone unassigned tests, those students are found on this report. Reassign the appropriate tests, then apply *Not Tested Coding*, if appropriate.
- **Students with Multiple Tests of Same Subject Area** - List of students that have more than one test of a specific subject area.
 - If any students are assigned both ELA and CSLA in grades 3 and 4, they appear on this report. Remove the test assignment that was not/will not be used.
- **Students Tests that have been Assigned but have not yet Completed** - List of all students that are registered for a test administration and have a student test assigned to them but the test has not yet been completed.
 - This report shows if a test that is in “assigned” status already has *Not Tested Coding* applied.
- Use the following reports to check coding (if you want your schools to check codes but you **don't** want to give them the Student Test Update Role, which allows batch exporting and importing codes through the STU file as well as voiding test scores through the user interface).
 - **Not Tested Student Tests** - List of individual student tests with Not Tested Coding indicated
 - **Void Score Tests** - List of individual student tests with Void Test Score Coding indicated

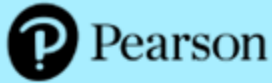

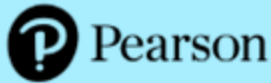

About CMAS and CoAlt Data

The purpose of this information is to provide an overview of the data collection activities for the Colorado Measures of Academic Success (CMAS) Science, Mathematics, and English Language Arts including Colorado Spanish Language Arts (CSLA) and Colorado Alternate (CoAlt) Science assessment programs. This information provides a general overview of these processes along with accompanying procedures. Other Assessment Division and vendor manuals are referenced where appropriate. For example, this information provides a brief overview of the Student Biographical Data (SBD) review process. Detailed step-by-step directions for the SBD process are available on the Assessment Division's Assessment Trainings web page at: <http://www.cde.state.co.us/assessment/trainings> and in the *Assessment Division Data Pipeline Manual for SBD*. For convenience, the following references are made throughout this information for the following assessment programs:

- CMAS is used to refer to the CMAS Science, Social Studies, Math, and ELA including CSLA assessment program.
- CoAlt is used to refer to the CoAlt Science and Social Studies assessment program.

Definitions

PearsonAccessnext (PANext) is the website used for student registration, test setup, administration preparation, and assessment and data management for CMAS and CoAlt. In order to use PANext, usernames and passwords are set up for individual users. Access to sensitive data is determined by specific roles that are assigned to each authorized user. More information about setup and operation of computer-based testing is available in the *PANext Online User Guide* at <http://coassessments.com> > Manuals and Training.

Student Registration/Personal Needs Profile (SR/PNP) refers to both the PANext process of importing/exporting student data and the file layout used to import/export the data. SR/PNP file layouts with field definitions and the SR/PNP file templates are available through <http://coassessments.com> > Data Resources.

Student Test Update (STU) refers to both the process and the file upload used during the PANext post-test clean up window. The STU export/import field definitions and STU file are available through <http://coassessments.com> > Data Resources.

Test Session is a virtual data grouping of students in PANext. These students are grouped together within PANext for test management purposes and to provide log in information to the student tests. Each PANext test session consists of one grade level and one content area. For online testing, student test placement in a scheduled PANext test session is required before students can log in to a test.

User Interface (UI) refers to the PANext screens used to update student data, create test sessions, proctor cache test content, and enter all other administration information.

Data Section 1: Reviewing Organizations in PANext

This section covers the steps, processes and procedures involved in checking district and school information in PANext.

Colorado Organizations in PANext

For each test administration, CDE provides the vendor with an organization (ORG) file containing official district names/codes and school names/codes. PANext uses this list to establish a permissions-based organizational hierarchy that restricts users from viewing or accessing data that are not associated with their organization and with their role within the organization. For example, if a user is assigned a school level permission, they are only allowed to see student information associated with that school. The ORG file is also used to cross check any student information that is added to PANext to ensure that a student can be associated with a known organization. **District Assessment Coordinators (DACs) should contact the Assessment Division if they discover that an organization in their district is not available in PANext.**

PAnext uses three sets of district and school codes:

- **Testing:** Testing District and Testing School are used to identify where testing occurs. The testing location is the location at which the student takes the test.
- **Responsible:** Responsible District and Responsible School are used to identify where the vendor sends reports and how CDE Assessment and Accountability attribute scores in reports.
- **Shipping:** Ship School codes are used to ship reports to a different school than the Responsible School.

For most students, testing site codes are the same as responsible site codes. However, there are situations when this is not the case. For example, some Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) may serve only as testing sites for students. See the following appendices for information on setting up PAnext for these situations:

- Testing at District Run Programs
- Approved Facility Schools and Division of Youth
- Home School Students

Data Section 2: Preparing Student Data Prior to and Following Assessment Administration

This section covers the steps, processes, and procedures involved in the preparation of student data for assessment administration. Complete these procedures in preparation for student testing.

Student Data in PAnext

The CMAS and CoAlt assessment programs use an SR/PNP import process for creating/storing student demographic data in PAnext, assigning appropriate computer-based test (CBT) or paper-based test (PBT) forms, initially ordering physical assessment materials, gathering student accommodation information, and assigning students to classes (i.e., groups of students that can be added to test sessions). The fields in the SR/PNP for both assessment programs appear in the same order; however, some fields are “filler” and others have different expected values based on whether the SR/PNP file is for CMAS or CoAlt. For detailed information about the SR/PNP file layouts, review the documents at <http://coassessments.com> > Data Resources.

SR/PNP Upload

For the spring administration, CDE completes an initial SR/PNP upload to PAnext from the October Count data that districts submit into Data Pipeline’s Student Interchange.

PAnext Registration Updates

After CDE uploads the initial student data to PAnext, districts manage their student data directly. At any time during the assessment window, districts can update student demographic information. PAnext is the source data for CMAS and CoAlt demographic data used for reporting. **Note:** Updating student data in Data Pipeline after the initial CDE SR/PNP upload does not update data in PAnext. Conversely, updating student data in PAnext does not update student data in Data Pipeline.

Data Management Activities in PAnext

Use the *PAnext Online User Guide*, available at <http://coassessments.com> > Manuals and Training, for step-by-step directions to complete the following activities in PAnext through the UI and/or a file import:

- Updating student enrollments
 - Adding new student enrollments
 - Editing student demographic data
 - Moving student enrollment data between organizations (transfer request/work request)
- Registering students
- Assigning student tests
- Creating PAnext test sessions
- Updating student data after test and session assignment

Information on transferring student enrollment between districts is available at <http://www.cde.state.co.us/assessment/trainings>.

Assigning Students to Special Forms

Step-by-step directions for assigning PBT students to paper forms and CBT students to the text-to-speech and color contrast accessibility features and accommodated CBT forms are available in the *PAnext Online User Guide* at <http://coassessments.com> > Manuals and Training or *Appendix H* in this manual. Assignments are completed by entering the information in the appropriate fields of the SR/PNP either via a file or through the UI.

Importing the SR/PNP Export into Excel

The section **Importing a .csv File into Microsoft Excel** provides instructions for importing the SR/PNP export into Microsoft Excel. Following these instructions maintains the appropriate data formatting so various fields do not require re-formatting before importing the updated file back into PAnext.

Data Clean Up Procedures and Documentation in PAnext

Districts and schools clean up student information (i.e., demographic data and invalidation coding) in PAnext. An additional clean up window, Student Biographical Data (SBD) review, takes place in CDE's Data Pipeline system as a final opportunity to clean up student information used for reporting. While SBD is optional, CDE Accountability's request to reconsider process cannot be used to address district reporting errors that could have been corrected during SBD.

- PAnext data clean up – Prior to May 7, 2025*
- SBD review – May 15 through 28, 2025 (tentative)

*Districts can determine if they will implement an internal school-level review deadline after which the DAC would disable school-level PAnext accounts to allow for a district-level final review period.

PAnext Data Clean Up – District- and/or School-level

Prior to May 7, 2025, districts and/or schools perform the following tasks in PAnext before, during, or after student testing:

- **Ensure all students are registered and have assigned tests in PAnext** (for both CBT and PBT). DACs and SACs perform the steps outlined in *Appendix H: PAnext Quick Reference Guide to Student Records – Enroll, Register, and Assign Student Tests*.

Notes:

- If students are missing grade level/content area test assignments, they are added by CDE if this is not completed by the school or district.
- If registrations are removed, CDE re-adds the registrations with corresponding test assignments if this is not completed by the school or district.
- **“Mark Complete” all PAnext student test assignments** that are not in “Completed” status due to either of the following reasons: 1) the student did not submit the test correctly or 2) the test was started but not completed by the student. DACs and SACs perform the steps outlined in *Appendix H: PAnext Quick Reference Guide to Mark Complete Units of an Incomplete Online Test*.

Notes:

- The “Marked Complete” reason does not invalidate the student test. Invalidation (i.e., Void Student Test Code/Reasons, Not Tested Code/Reasons) are indicated on the Manage Student Tests screen(s) in PAnext or through the STU file import by a user with the Student Test Update (STU) role.
- For students who never started their tests (i.e., all units in “Ready” status), remove their tests from any started test sessions – do not mark complete these tests.
- **Stop all PAnext test sessions that are still in “Started” status** after the district finishes testing or by the end of the assessment window. In a “Started” session, all units for all student tests must be in “Completed” or “Marked

Complete” status in order to “Stop” the test session. *Remove tests that were not started (i.e., all units in “Ready” status) from the started test sessions before stopping the session.* DACs and SACs follow the steps outlined at <https://support.assessment.pearson.com/PAsup/testing/stop-a-session>.

- **Update accommodation fields in PANext** based on actual usage during testing. DACs and SACs perform this task through the PANext UI. Updates for form-dependent accessibility features and accommodations (e.g., TTS) are not allowed after a student takes a test. DACs and SACs with the Sensitive Data role can complete this task through the SR/PNP file import. Users with the Sensitive Data and STU roles can complete this task through the STU file import.

- **Update all demographic fields in PANext.** This update includes the non-required fields used for reporting. Data are to reflect demographic information at the time of testing. DACs and SACs with the Sensitive Data role can perform this task through the PANext UI or through the SR/PNP file import process. DACs and SACs with the Sensitive Data and STU roles can complete this task through the STU file import process.

- **Resolve Rejected Student Test Alerts for CMAS paper-based tests in PANext.** Paper-based tests that were scanned but were not matched to a student record in PANext create rejected student test alerts. Resolve these alerts to move the tests to scoring – if unresolved, the tests are not scored. DACs and SACs with the Rejected Student Test role resolve these alerts through the PANext UI. Steps for this process are outlined at: <https://support.assessment.pearson.com/display/PAsup/Fix+Rejected+Student+Test+Details>.
- **Update invalidation codes.** DACs and SACs can update invalidation codes (i.e., Not Tested and Void Test Score Reasons/Codes) via the PANext UI. DACs and SACs with the sensitive data and STU roles can complete this task through the STU import process. (See directions below: **Update Invalidation Codes**)
 - If score suppressions are needed, submit *Testing Irregularity Reports (Appendix D)* and the corresponding spreadsheet (available through <http://www.cde.state.co.us/assessment/training-cmas>) to CDE by May 2, 2025. Only CDE can indicate score suppressions.

PANext Data Clean Up – District Reminders

If the district implements an internal school-level clean up period, districts must update any remaining temporary or incorrect SASIDs, update student demographic information (including Responsible Organization) to reflect data accurate at the time of testing, and confirm or enter invalidation codes (i.e., Not Tested and Void Test Score Reasons/Codes) **prior to May 7, 2025**. DACs can disable school-level and other district-level user accounts before their final district-level review, if desired.

- DACs with the Sensitive Data role must update any remaining temporary SASIDs through the UI. <https://support.assessment.pearson.com/display/PAsup/Update+Student+Data>
- DACs and Sensitive Data users with the STU role can update student demographic information used in reporting, Void Test Score Codes/Reasons, and Not Tested Codes/Reasons through the STU file. <https://support.assessment.pearson.com/display/PAsup/Import+and+Export+Data>

SBD Review (Optional)

The SBD review is tentatively scheduled for May 15 through 28, 2025. This review process is completed through CDE’s Data Pipeline system after the assessment window closes and before final results are available. The purpose of the CMAS and CoAlt SBD review is to allow districts the opportunity to verify the accuracy of the demographic data that was submitted in PANext for each student. Data are to reflect student demographics at the time of testing. Invalidation

coding (i.e., Not Tested and Void Test Score Codes/Reasons) submitted for appropriate students is also verified at this time.

The SBD review is not a mandatory process. Districts may choose whether to participate in the SBD process. State and federal accountability reporting (including school and district performance framework ratings and priority and focus school designations) rely on accurate demographic and test score data. Therefore, the impact of the SBD review of demographic data on accountability reporting is profound. Districts should be aware that performance framework requests for reconsideration are only considered for districts that participate and approve their data in the SBD process.

Note: Post-testing, changes made to data used for cross-validations, such as IEP/504 or ML status when the student had accommodations, will result in invalidation of student scores. CDE will apply suppression coding in these cases.

Data Section 3: Void Test Score and Not Tested Codes and Descriptions

Student test records with void test score or not tested codes/reasons (i.e., invalidations) do not receive scores for the invalidated content area assessment(s). Table 1 provides a brief overview of the CMAS and CoAlt invalidation categories.

- The student is assigned to a test but not assigned to a test session. Apply a not tested code and reason for the student’s test.
- The student was assigned to a paper test but did not start testing.
- The student started or completed a paper-based test, but should not receive a score (e.g., misadministration, parent excuse) so the material was returned as nonscorable.

Apply **void test score codes/reasons** to records of students who began testing but should not receive scores. These students may have finished testing and submitted their tests, or they may not have finished testing, but school personnel applied “mark complete” to the online test record. (**Note:** Mark complete reasons do not invalidate tests.) Student tests that were completed or marked complete appear as “attempt” in the online test status field. If a void test score code/reason is applied to a student test record, the record does not receive an overall score.

Marked complete reasons are for district or school use only. They do not follow the student test record into scoring and therefore do not stop a test from being scored and included in district and school reports and accountability. While a marked complete reason is required if a student test is marked complete, the district or school must still apply a void test score code/reason to the student test if the intent is to not score the test (e.g., “Withdrawn” is entered for a marked complete reason so in addition to this step, Void 03 must be indicated on the student test record).

Enter not tested and void test score codes/reasons through the PAnext UI or a Student Test Update file. The ability to enter this information through either method is determined by user permissions as assigned through PAnext. **See the not tested and void test score code/reason definitions in Table 2 for additional information.** CDE will provide guidance on State Use Only codes (listed in Table 1 and/or PearsonAccess^{next}) if any will be used for the Spring 2025 CMAS and CoAlt administrations.

If students take tests that are inappropriate for their grade level (e.g., 7th grader taking science, 3rd grader taking 4th grade math and ELA assessments), the resulting scores are invalid and will be suppressed.

02 First Year in U.S. Multilingual Learner (For English Language Arts Only)

Not Tested Code/Reason 02: First Year in U.S. Multilingual Learner

STU Coding: Not Tested = Y; Not Tested Reason = 02

This information only applies to the ELA assessment. All First Year in U.S. students must take mathematics, science, and social assessments, as applicable by grade and school sampling.

Districts use the following guidance to determine if students who are Multilingual Learners, who enrolled in a United States (U.S.) school for the first time on or after April 8, 2024 (first year in the U.S.), will participate in ELA or CSLA, or if they are exempt from language arts testing this year.

- First Year in U.S. students who are Non-English Proficient (NEP), based on WIDA Screener and a local body of evidence, may be exempt from the English language arts assessment.
 - Students with a primary or home language other than Spanish are exempt from ELA testing. Use Not Tested Reason 02 for ELA.
 - **Students with a primary or home language of Spanish:**
 - In grades 5 through 8 are exempt from ELA testing. Use Not Tested Reason 02 for ELA.
 - **In grades 3 and 4 who are:**
 - **Receiving Spanish language arts instruction are required to take CSLA.**
 - Not receiving Spanish language arts instruction this year are exempt from ELA including CSLA testing. Use Not Tested Reason 02 for ELA.
 - A parent/guardian of a student who meets exemption guidelines may choose to have their child participate in ELA testing. The student's ELA tests are excluded from Achievement calculations for the current year (2024-25) and the next year (2025-26) but are included in Growth calculations after the second administration (student's 2024-25 ELA score to 2025-26 ELA score).
- First Year in U.S. students who are Limited English Proficient (LEP), based on WIDA Screener and a local body of evidence, take the state language arts assessment that best matches their instruction: CMAS ELA, CSLA (if eligible), or CoAlt ELA (if eligible).
 - **Students in grades 3 and 4 with a primary or home language of Spanish who are receiving Spanish language arts instruction this school year are required to take CSLA.**
 - Students who are not eligible to take CSLA* are encouraged to take ELA.
 - If the student does not test their first year in U.S., they are excluded from Accountability calculations during the current year (2024-25) but are included for Achievement for the next year (2025-26). Use Not Tested Reason 02 for ELA.
 - If the student does test their first year in U.S., they are excluded from Achievement calculations for the current year (2024-25) and the next year (2025-26) but are included in Growth calculations after the second administration (student's 2024-25 ELA score to 2025-26 ELA score).

When registering students in PAnext, districts indicate ELA testing exemption for eligible students by completing the field *Date First Enrolled in U.S. School* (the first date on which the student enrolled in a U.S. public school) and code the ELA assessment as *Not Tested Reason 02*, if applicable.

*Students in grades 3 through 8 with a primary or home language other than Spanish, students in grades 5 through 8 with a primary or home language of Spanish, or students in grades 3 and 4 with a primary or home language of Spanish who are not receiving Spanish language arts instruction.

Note: Only Not Tested Reason 02 is used for students who are first year in the U.S. **Void Test Reason 02 (Interrupted and Not Completed) is not used for these student test records.**

02 Interrupted and Not Completed

Void Test Score Code/Reason 02: Interrupted and Not Completed

STU Coding: Void Test Score Code = Y; Void Score Reason = 02

Void Score Reason 02 is used to identify students for whom the district does not want scores or reports produced because the students' testing was interrupted. These students stopped testing prior to the completion of the test session due to unforeseen circumstances (e.g., the student became ill during Unit 3 and could not complete testing in a make-up session).

Note: Only the Void Score Reason 02 is used for tests that were interrupted and not completed. **Not Tested Reason 02 (First Year in U.S. Multilingual Learner) is not used for these student test records.**

03 Withdrew Before/During Testing

Not Tested Code/Reason 03: Withdrew Before/During Testing

STU Coding: Not Tested = Y; Not Tested Reason = 03

Void Test Score Code/Reason 03: Withdrew Before/During Testing

STU Coding: Void Test Score Code = Y; Void Score Reason = 03

Not Tested Reason 03 is only used if the student moved before they started testing. Do not apply this code until the end of the official testing window (after April 25, 2025).

Void Score Reason 03 is only used if the student moved and one of the following applies:

- The student started but did not complete testing and the new Colorado district of enrollment did not submit a "Work Request" to transfer the student registration and test assignment(s) through PAnext. (This is considered a district-to-district transfer. Refer to [Student Transfer Request Guidance](#) for more information.)
- The student started testing but is no longer enrolled in a public school or moved out of state before completing the test.

Note: If the student completed all content area tests before moving to a different district, do not apply this code.

04 Student Test Refusal

Not Tested Code/Reason 04: Student Test Refusal

STU Coding: Not Tested = Y; Not Tested Reason = 04

Void Test Score Code/Reason 04: Student Test Refusal

STU Coding: Void Test Score Code = Y; Void Score Reason = 04

Not Tested Reason 04 is used to indicate that when provided an opportunity to test, the **student** refused to begin testing.

Void Score Reason 04 is used to indicate that when provided an opportunity to test, the **student** started testing but then refused to continue testing.

05 Non-Approved Accommodation

Void Test Score Code/Reason 05: Non-Approved Accommodation

STU Coding: Void Test Score Code = Y; Void Score Reason = 05

Void Score Reason 05 is used to indicate that a student received a non-approved accommodation during testing.

If a student was provided or accessed scribe on ELA/CSLA or calculator on non-calculator sections of math but was not approved through the UAR process, or if they were provided an accommodation not listed in *Section 6.0* of the *CMAS and CoAlt Procedures Manual*, apply Void Score Reason 05 if an individual student report is not to be produced.

Note: Cases of students who received a non-approved accommodation but for whom districts would like an individual student report produced for local use must report the situation through the *Testing Irregularity Report* process. Results for these students are not aggregated in school and district results and count against participation.

06 Misadministration

Not Tested Code/Reason 06: Misadministration

STU Coding: Not Tested = Y; Not Tested Reason = 06

Void Test Score Code/Reason 06: Misadministration

STU Coding: Void Test Score Code = Y; Void Score Reason = 06

Not Tested Reason 06 or Void Score Code 06 is used if a misadministration occurred and no overall scores should be produced. A misadministration occurs when a standardized security or administration procedure is violated and/or when the validity of a student's test score is in question.

Not Tested Reason 06 is used if a student is exposed to test content prior to testing. Examples of misadministrations that result in the use of Not Tested Reason 06 include the following:

- Students receive information about test items from anyone prior to testing.
- A Test Administrator or school staff member:
 - Provides students with information about test items prior to the test.
 - Leaves secure test materials unattended anywhere outside of the central secure storage area in the school creating a security breach resulting in students not testing.
 - Loses secure test materials prior to testing or is at any time unable to account for the location of test materials creating a security breach resulting in students not testing.

Void Score Reason 06 is used if a student's test was misadministered after the student began testing. Examples of misadministrations that result in the use of Void Score Reason 06 include the following:

- Students share answers during testing.
- A Test Administrator or school staff member:
 - Gives any cue about possible answers, verbal or non-verbal, to students.
 - Asks student(s) to change answers.
 - Enters answers for students (except for scribe accommodation).
 - Leaves secure test materials unattended anywhere outside of the central secure storage area in the school creating a security breach but students tested.
 - Loses secure test materials prior to testing or is at any time unable to account for the location of test materials creating a security breach but students are tested.
 - Clarifies any test items for students.
 - Does not provide students with documented accommodations or provides students with an accommodation that is not documented.
 - Does not observe time limits and requirements (e.g., not giving students the entire unit time to test or giving students who do not have an extended time accommodation more than the maximum testing time).
 - Does not follow test environment and/or posted materials guidelines.
 - Does not provide directions from the TAM for the test (for each unit).

Students with Not Tested Reason 06 or Void Score Reason 06 do not receive a score.

Maintain documentation for any misadministrations.

Notes:

- Any modification is considered a misadministration that results in an invalid score.
- If a major misadministration occurs, **submit a Test Incident (Irregularity) Report to CDE through Syncplicity.** Never email Personally Identifiable Information (PII) to CDE or assessment vendors. PII includes student names and other sensitive student data.

07 Medical Exemption

Not Tested Code/Reason 07: Medical Exemption

STU Coding: Not Tested = Y; Not Tested Reason = 07

Void Test Score Code/Reason 07: Medical Exemption

STU Coding: Void Test Score Code = Y; Void Score Reason = 07

Not Tested Reason 07 is used to identify students who are unable to start the statewide assessments due to a documented, significant, and fully incapacitating medical condition or emergency (e.g., student is in the hospital after a car crash) that extends across the entire (or remaining) test window. In order to qualify for a special consideration, the incident or condition must be so severe that it prevents the student from participating in instruction offered either at school or at a state or district-run facility.

Void Test Score Reason 07 is used to identify students who are unable to complete the statewide assessments due to a documented, significant, and fully incapacitating medical condition or emergency (e.g., student is in the hospital after a car crash) that extends across the entire (or remaining) test window. In order to qualify for a special consideration, the incident or condition must be so severe that it prevents the student from participating in instruction offered either at school or at a state or district-run facility.

This code is not used for students who are absent during testing due to typical illnesses.

08 Part Time Public and Part Time Home School Student

Not Tested Code/Reason 08: Part Time Public and Part Time Home School Student

STU Coding: Not Tested = Y; Not Tested Reason = 08

Void Test Score Code/Reason 08: Part Time Public and Part Time Home School Student

STU Coding: Void Test Score Code = Y; Void Score Reason = 08

Not Tested Reason 08 is used to identify any non-tested students with part-time district and part-time home school status.

Void Test Score Code 08 is used to identify any students with part-time district and part-time home school status who may have tested but should not receive a report.

- If a district wants a score for a part-time homeschool student but does not want the score included in district or school reports, apply the following coding:
 - Responsible district identifier = District code where the test was administered
 - Responsible school/institution identifier = HHHH
 - For each scorable test assignment:
 - Not tested code/reason = Blank
 - Void test score code/reason = Blank

09 Parent Excuse

Not Tested Code/Reason 09: Parent Excuse

STU Coding: Not Tested = Y; Not Tested Reason = 09

Void Test Score Code/Reason 09: Parent Excuse

STU Coding: Void Test Score Code = Y; Void Score Reason = 09

While districts are responsible for administering the state assessments, districts should document all parent excusals consistent with state law and district policy. **Receipt of parent excusal documentation is required before indicating Not Tested or Void Test Score Code/Reason 09.**

Not Tested Reason 09 is applied if a **parent excused** their child from testing before the student started testing.

Void Test Score Reason 09 is applied if a **parent excused** their child from testing after the student started testing.

Note: A Void Test Score Code/Reason 09 Parent Excuse is valid for students who start testing but do not respond in the last unit of the test. This code is not valid and is not processed if the student responded in all units, and a score will be produced.

Exception: In the rare case that a parent excusal is received while a student is participating in Unit 3 (Unit 2 for grade 11 science) and the student is pulled out of the session during testing, districts can follow the process below to ensure a Parent Excuse code is included with the student record in the final data:

- a. On the day the student is removed from the test session, the School Assessment Coordinator
 - a. notifies the District Assessment Coordinator of the testing irregularity.
 - b. applies a misadministration code to the student record in PearsonAccess^{next} (Void Test Score Code/Reason 06).
- b. The District Assessment Coordinator completes a *Testing Irregularity or Security Breach Form* (located in Appendix D of the *CMAS/CoAlt Procedures Manual*) with the applicable information, notifies Sara Loerzel in CDE's Assessment Division, and submits the completed form through CDE Assessment Syncplicity in the Assessment Forms folder by **May 2, 2025**. CDE will change the misadministration coding to Parent Excuse from testing coding after the PearsonAccess^{next} clean-up window ending **May 7, 2025**. The district can verify the code change during the CMAS SBD process.

Below is language from Colorado Revised Statutes §22-7-1013(8)(a-c) regarding parents excusing their student from testing:

(a) EACH LOCAL EDUCATION PROVIDER SHALL ADOPT AND IMPLEMENT A WRITTEN POLICY AND PROCEDURE BY WHICH A STUDENT'S PARENT MAY EXCUSE THE STUDENT FROM PARTICIPATING IN ONE OR MORE OF THE STATE ASSESSMENTS ADMINISTERED PURSUANT TO SECTION 22-7-1006.3.

(b) IF A PARENT EXCUSES THEIR STUDENT FROM PARTICIPATING IN A STATE ASSESSMENT, A LOCAL EDUCATION PROVIDER SHALL NOT IMPOSE NEGATIVE CONSEQUENCES, INCLUDING PROHIBITING SCHOOL ATTENDANCE, IMPOSING AN UNEXCUSED ABSENCE, OR PROHIBITING PARTICIPATION IN EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES, ON THE STUDENT OR ON THE PARENT. IF A PARENT EXCUSES THEIR STUDENT FROM PARTICIPATING IN A STATE ASSESSMENT, THE LOCAL EDUCATION PROVIDER SHALL NOT PROHIBIT THE STUDENT FROM PARTICIPATING IN AN ACTIVITY, OR RECEIVING ANY OTHER FORM OF REWARD, THAT THE LOCAL EDUCATION PROVIDER PROVIDES TO STUDENTS FOR PARTICIPATING IN THE STATE ASSESSMENT.

(c) A LOCAL EDUCATION PROVIDER SHALL NOT IMPOSE AN UNREASONABLE BURDEN OR REQUIREMENT ON A STUDENT THAT WOULD DISCOURAGE THE STUDENT FROM TAKING A STATE ASSESSMENT OR ENCOURAGE THE STUDENT'S PARENT TO EXCUSE THE STUDENT FROM TAKING THE STATE ASSESSMENT.

Update Invalidations through the PAnext UI

Two types of invalidations are applied through PAnext: Not Tested and Void Test Score codes and reasons. The type of code used depends on the status of the test.

Not Tested

Indicate not tested coding for tests that were never started by the student (i.e., all units still in **Ready** status in an online test session that was not prepared, assigned but not in a prepared/started online test session, or paper test submitted with nonscorable materials). **Users with the DAC, SAC, Sensitive Data, or Student Test Update role can complete this task.** The option to indicate a not tested code and reason appears on all student tests in **assigned** status under Setup > Students > Manage Student Tests in PAnext.

Void Test Score

Void only apply to tests in **attempt** status (i.e., all units of the test in **completed** or **marked complete** status). A user must have the **Student Test Update** role to code a student's test as void in PAnext. If a test is still in **testing** status, a **DAC, SAC, or Sensitive Data** user must first mark complete the remaining unit(s) of the test in order to void.

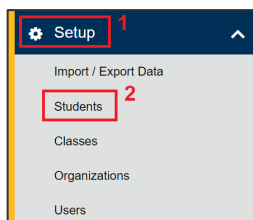
The option to indicate a void code appears on student tests under Setup > Students > Manage Student Tests in PAnext once the test is in **attempt** status (i.e., all units **completed** or **marked complete**).

- **Online** – If a test is in **attempt** status, do not use Not Tested Reasons/Codes as they do not invalidate the test.
- **Paper-based** – The void option is not available until the test is received and scanned by the vendor.

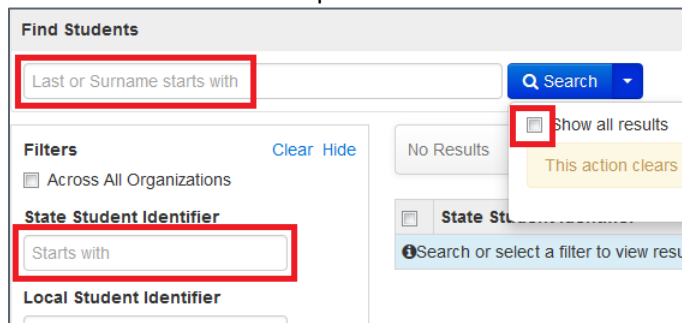
Note: Indicating a Marked Complete Reason **does not** invalidate a test; apply the Void Test Score Code/Reason separately (and as appropriate for each test assigned to the student) through the following steps.

The Student Test Update (STU) file is used to batch load invalidation coding. Refer to *Data Section 4: Export/Import Data Files* for step-by-step guidance.

Data Section 4: Export/Import Data Files

PearsonAccess^{next} data files available through Setup > Import/Export Data are used to export current data from the system and import updates to records. Some data file types can create new records. Using data files allows changes to multiple records at the same time (batch loading) as opposed to making changes one-by-one through the PearsonAccess^{next} user interface. The following data files are available for use as determined by assigned user roles.





BOCES and Out of District Testing Sites

BOCES

BOCES are involved in state assessments in several different ways. Some BOCES operate schools and are responsible for testing students enrolled in their schools. Other BOCES operate programs but serve as testing sites for students. This section groups BOCES into three basic scenarios and describes the processes that are followed for all content areas of CMAS and CoAlt science and social studies.

Scenario 1: BOCES that operate schools that have a 4-digit CDE school codes and the school is the student’s primary school of enrollment. In this situation, the BOCES follow the same procedures as a typical school district in PANext. CDE uploads information for the BOCES as part of the pre-ID upload. In this scenario, the testing and responsible district and school are the same. In the SR/PNP layout, a student’s district and school data are coded as follows:

- Testing district code: 4-digit BOCES code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Testing district name: BOCES name as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Testing school code: School code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Testing school name: School name as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible district code: 4-digit BOCES code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible district name: BOCES name as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible school code: School code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible school name: School name as it appears in Data Pipeline.

Scenario 2: BOCES that operate like programs and administer state assessments to students from ONE “Home” Colorado District. In this situation, the BOCES follow the same procedures as a typical public school located within a Colorado School District in PANext. Using the same process used to assign school level user roles to the typical public schools in the districts, the “home” district assigns BOCES staff user roles to a BOCES School within their district. While CDE sets up a “BOCES school” within the district CDE is unable to pre-populate students enrolled in the BOCES schools based on information in Data Pipeline. Districts must move students from the primary school enrollment indicated in Data Pipeline to the BOCES school. In this scenario, the testing district and school is different from the responsible district and school. In the SR/PNP layout, a student’s district and school data are coded as follows:

- Testing district code: 4-digit official CDE BOCES code
- Testing district name: BOCES name
- Testing school code: 4-digit unofficial code (BBBB) assigned by Assessment Division
- Testing school name: Official BOCES name with “testing site” added to end
- Responsible district code: “Home” district code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible district name: “Home” district code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible school code: Primary school enrollment school code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible school name: Primary school enrollment school name as it appears in Data Pipeline.

Scenario 3: BOCES that operate like programs and administer state assessments to students from MULTIPLE “Home” Colorado Districts. In this situation, the BOCES is set up as a unique district in PANext. BOCES and “home” districts transfer students to this district through “Work Requests – Enrollment Transfer” in PANext because CDE cannot identify the students from the information in Data Pipeline. CDE sets up a BOCES district with a school code within PANext to use as the testing site. Districts and BOCES work together to create a list of students who need to test at the BOCES. In this scenario, the testing district and school is different from the responsible district and school. In the SR/PNP file, a student’s district and school data are coded as follows:

- Testing district code: 4-digit official CDE BOCES code
- Testing district name: BOCES name
- Testing school code: 4-digit unofficial code (BBBB) assigned by Assessment Division
- Testing school name: Official BOCES name with “testing site” added to end
- Responsible district code: “Home” district code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible district name: “Home” district code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible school code: Primary school enrollment school code as it appears in Data Pipeline
- Responsible school name: Primary school enrollment school name as it appears in Data Pipeline.

Out of District Testing Sites

There are cases in which students take state assessments at locations outside of their home school district, but student scores should return to the home district. For example, a district may send special education students to a central location for testing. Or, online students may test in a district close to their residence but outside of the district of enrollment.

In situations like these, the testing site is the district code of the testing site. Testing sites and “home” districts transfer students to this district through a “Work Requests – Enrollment Transfer” in PANext because CDE cannot identify the students from the information in Data Pipeline. Reporting and testing sites work together to create a list of students who will test at the testing site. In this scenario, the testing school is different from the responsible school; and the testing district may also be different from the responsible district. In the SR/PNP file, a student’s school data and district data (if needed) are coded as follows:

- Testing district code: Testing district’s 4-digit CDE district code
- Testing district name: District name
- Testing school code: Testing district’s 4-digit CDE district code or 4-digit unofficial code if the site is a program
- Testing school name: Official testing school or testing program name
- Responsible district code: Official CDE “Home” district code
- Responsible district name: “Home” district name
- Responsible school code: Official CDE “Home” school code
- Responsible school name: “Home” school name.

Testing at District Run Programs

Some districts may test at program sites within their district that do not have an official CDE school code. If the students are administered tests at the program site, there are two options for districts to use to help track and test these students in PANext.

Option 1: Assign the students to a unique testing group.

In this option, testing and responsible district and school codes are the same and represent the school of official student enrollment. In this option, set up the CMAS Test Administrator with permissions for the school of enrollment.

Option 2: Assign the students to a created/unofficial school site within the district.

In this option, testing/responsible district codes and the responsible school code represent the district and school of official student enrollment. The testing school code is an unofficial code that represents a testing site. **To get a testing school unofficial code, districts need to contact the Assessment Division.** In this option, set up the CMAS Test Administrator with permissions for the unofficial testing site.

Approved Facility Schools and Division of Youth

Students placed out-of-district by a public agency (enrolled in Approved Facility Schools) and incarcerated students (Division of Youth Corrections) do not have information in Data Pipeline. Therefore, CDE cannot pre-populate student data into PAnext. DACs for Approved Facility Schools and the Division of Youth Corrections must upload the full SR/PNP file layout into PAnext (refer to SR/PNP layout documentation at <https://coassessments.com/layouts/>).

Home School Students

Home school students taking the CMAS assessments need to have a record in PAnext. However, districts may limit home schooled student reporting data to the information in Table 5. **Note:** A home school organization is found in PAnext for every district. The organization code is CO-DDDD-HHHH (DDDD equals the district’s four-digit code) and the organization name is the name of the district plus “Home School” (e.g., Sample District Home School).

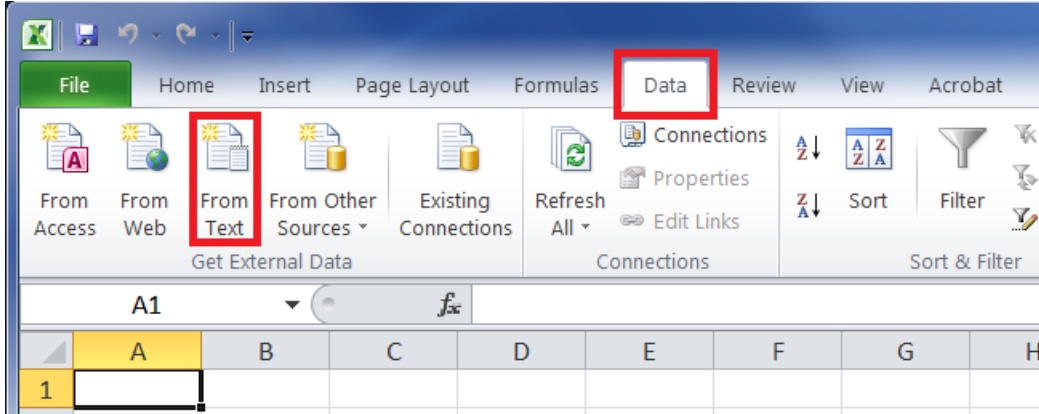

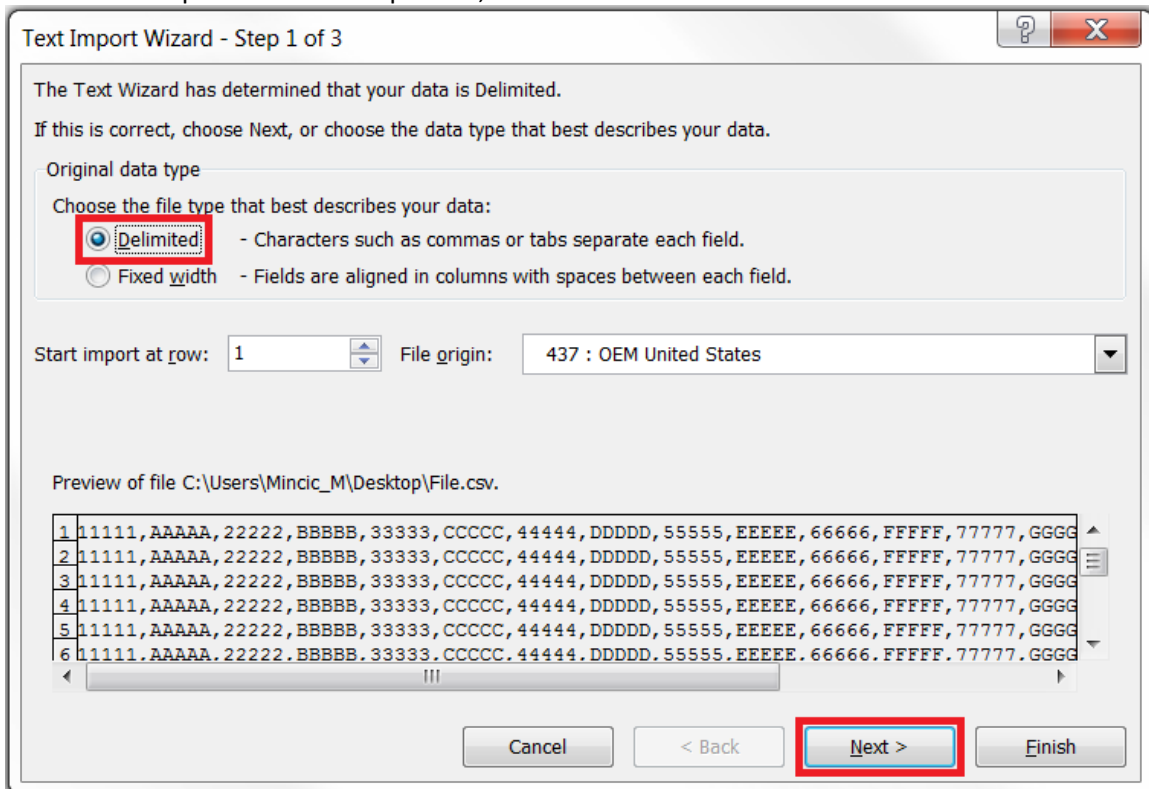
Importing a .csv File into Microsoft Excel

To retain the formatting of variables in a .csv file in Microsoft Excel, import all fields as text. Below are step-by-step instructions explaining how to complete this process.

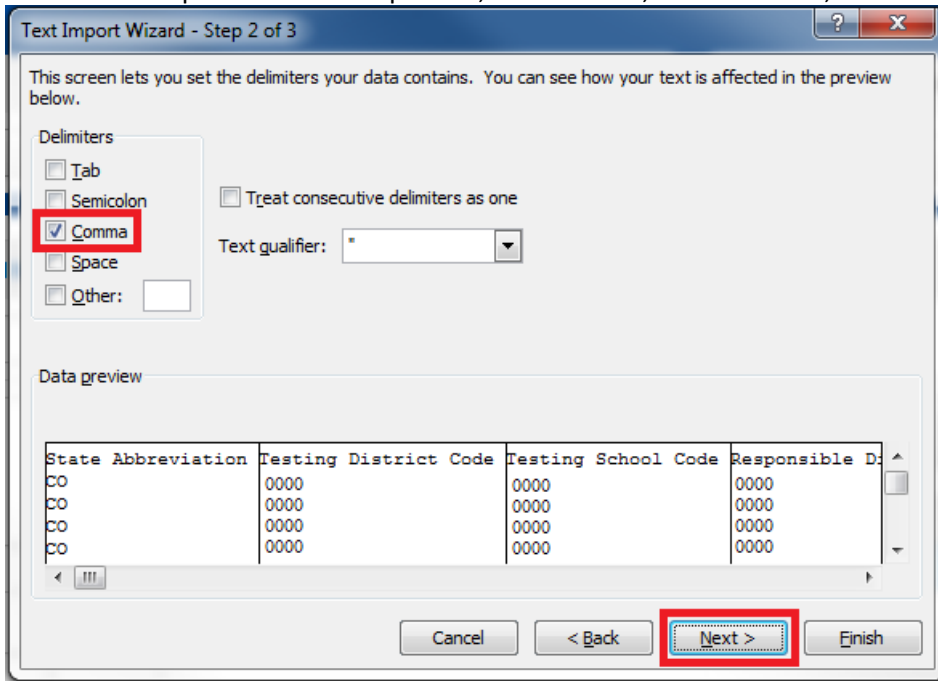
- 1) Open Microsoft Excel.
- 2) Select the Data tab, then select From Text.



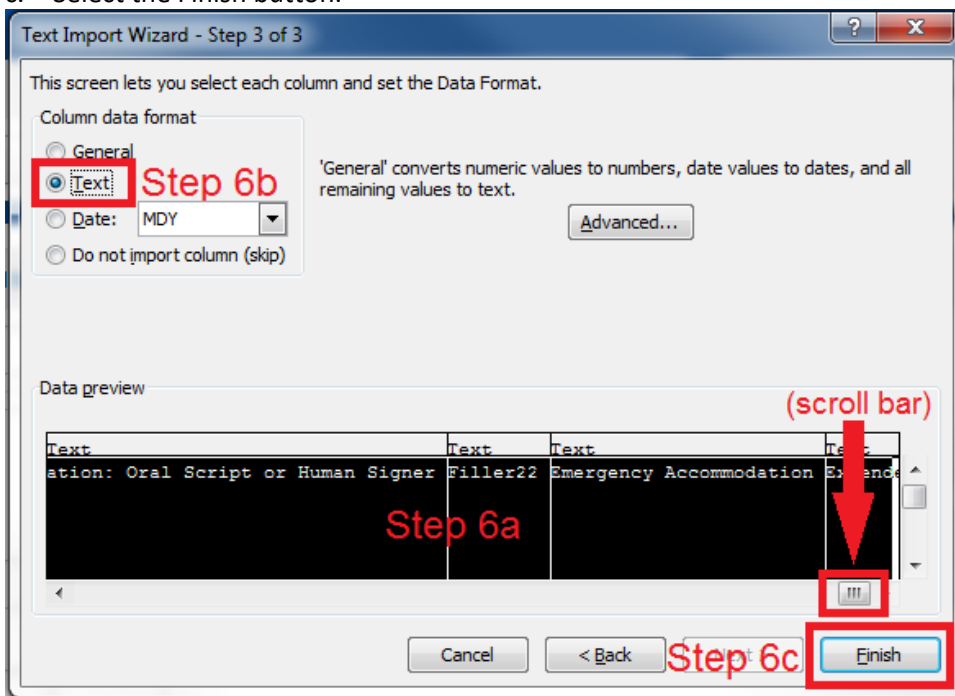
- 3) An Import Text File window will appear. Locate the locally saved .csv file and select Open.

- 6) On Text Import Wizard – Step 3 of 3,
- Highlight all the fields in the file. (Select the first column, hold down the Shift key on the keyboard, drag the scroll bar to the right, and select the last column to highlight all fields at once.)
 - Once all fields are highlighted, select Text in the Column data format box.
 - Select the Finish button.



- Save a working version of the file in Excel format.
- Make updates to the file using the Excel format.
- Before importing the updated file back to PANext, save the file as .csv.
- Import the updated .csv file into PANext.
