1 MADAM CHAIR: The next item on the agenda is 2 Recognition of Colorado's United States Senate Youth 3 Scholarship winners. Commissioner? MR. HAMMOND: Thank you very much. 4 I'11 turn this over to Dr. Keith Owen. The next two things 5 6 are some of the more really pleasant thing we get to do -7 MADAM CHAIR: Yeah, we get to do a few fun 8 things and this is one of them. 9 MR. HAMMOND: -- and to honor some great 10 kids. So with that I'll turn it over to Keith Owen. 11 MR. OWEN: Sure. Good morning, Madam Chair. 12 13 MADAM CHAIR: Yes. MR. OWEN: So today we would like to honor 14 Serene Singh and Brandon Lee, the Colorado delegates for 15 the 53rd annual United States Senate Youth Program. 16 17 Selection for the U.S. Senate Youth Program is based on a student's outstanding abilities and 18 19 demonstrated qualities of leadership in an elected or 20 appointed high school student office, in addition to outstanding leadership abilities and a strong commitment 21 to volunteer work. 22 23 Two delegates are chosen from each state, the District of Columbia, and the Department of Defense 24 Education Activity. The student leaders gathered in 25



1 Washington, D.C., from March 7 through 14, 2015, not too 2 long ago, for a week of intensive study of the Federal Government and, in particular, of the U.S. Senate. 3 Speakers for the Washington Week program included the 4 President of the United States, Barack Obama, U.S. 5 6 Senators including Senator Cory Gardner from Colorado, Congressional Representatives, ambassadors, Supreme Court 7 Justices, and NASA administrators. 8 In addition, each delegate received a \$5,000 9 college scholarship. This scholarship, in addition to 10 the program week in Washington, D.C., is made possible by 11 a grant from the William Randolph Hearst Foundation. 12 Of 13 the applications received, Serene and Brandon rose to the top by demonstrating high academic achievement, 14 leadership ability, and a commitment to public service. 15 16 To give you a little background on each of 17 the awardees, Serene Singh is a senior at Rampart High School in Colorado Springs. She currently serves as 18 senior class president, speech and debate president, and 19 vice co-chair for the Colorado Youth Advisory Council. 20 She is very active in videobroadcasting, FBLA, NHS, and 21 French Club. Serene has won a national championship, 22 three state championships, and various district 23 24 championships in speech and debate. She was also runnerup for Miss Teen Colorado and recently won the 25



1 prestigious full-ride Merit Boettcher Scholarship. 2 Upon graduation, Serene plans to pursue her 3 undergraduate work with a double major in pre-law and political science. Ultimately she aspires to be 4 appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court. 5 6 MADAM CHAIR: Very good. We like that. MR. OWEN: Just a small background there. 7 Brandon Lee is a senior at ThunderRidge High 8 School, in Highlands Ranch, and is ranked first in his 9 He currently serves as the vice president of the 10 class. Colorado Assn of Student Councils. He is very active in 11 the Colorado All-State Orchestra, Boy Scouts, and the 12 13 Asian-Pacific Development Center Youth Leadership 14 Academy. Following graduation, Brandon aspires to 15 16 attend West Point Academy and study political science. 17 He plans to become a lawyer and represent Asian-American 18 immigrants. 19 Both Ms. Singh and Mr. Lee epitomize what 20 our nation needs for the next generation of leaders -- a person who challenges himself academically, cares about 21 people, serves their community, and is willing to do the 22 23 hard work required to make our world a better place. 24 Please help me recognize Serene and Brandon as they come forward to say a few words. 25



1 (Applause) MR. LEE: Madam Chair and members of the 2 3 Board, thank you so much today for the opportunity to speak to the State Board of Education. As Dr. Owen has 4 said, my name is Brandon Lee and I'm a senior at 5 6 ThunderRidge High School in Highlands Ranch, Colorado. First I would like to thank the Colorado 7 Department of Education for choosing me as a delegate and 8 I would really appreciate that because they have not 9 cancelled my selection because I thought it was a 10 11 mistake. Secondly, my secondary education plans have 12 13 changed very recently. I will be attending Harvard University this fall with an emphasis on biology and 14 political science. But there has been no change in my 15 16 passion, involvement, and interest in our government. 17 My week in Washington was a surreal and profound experience. It had been the first time in D.C. 18 19 for me, and to me, the atmosphere glowed. Bustling with energy, D.C. was very dynamic and always active, quite 20 unlike our Congress. USSYP granted to me many rare and 21 behind-the-scenes opportunities, from eating dinner next 22 to the Constitution to meeting President Barack Obama, 23 24 president of the World Bank, Jim Kim, Colorado Senators Michael Bennett and Cory Gardner, and visiting the 25



1 Department of State, NASA Headquarters, the Arlington 2 National Cemetery, the Pentagon, and many more. The other 103 delegates that attended, 3 however, was the most interesting part of the trip. 4 The first conversation I had in D.C. regarded gerrymandering 5 6 and Alabama congressional districts. Debate topics ranged from political polarization, abortion, Ferguson, 7 political polarization, Obamacare, welfare, and did I 8 mention political polarization? 9 Somewhat unfortunately, I honestly believe 10 11 that my fellow delegates spoke the words "political polarization" at USSYP more times than I had hours to 12 13 sleep. These surprised me because they had such a cynical view of Congress, and it seemed that, for the 14 first time in my life, I found fellow young adults 15 16 interested in bipartisanship more than the legalization 17 of marijuana. It's an incredibly humbling feeling to know 18 19 that the best student leaders in the world had gathered

into one room. I met one delegate who has made national
news recently for being accepted into all eight Ivy
League schools. Another one of my friends, from
Wisconsin, knew more about the state Senate and
gubernatorial elections in Colorado than I did myself.
This led to one question: How was I selected? What if

1 the other delegates thought of me in the same way? What 2 if I would not be remembered or respected? Or what if no 3 one liked me? It was then that I realized that this is 4 what Barack Obama must feel on a daily basis. 5 But 6 President Obama reassured us that this was not the case. When he spoke to us, he emphasized key issues in our 7 time, especially ethnic and economic inequalities. 8 Не also subtly made fun of Republicans for not believing in 9

10 climate change. But most importantly, he told us, "Don't 11 worry about who you want to be. Focus on what you want 12 to do."

13 And with this I humbly headed back to Colorado, my home, inspired and changed, ready to end 14 political polarization. The youth ages 18 to 29, after 15 16 all, make up about 15 percent of the vote, but only about 17 20 percent of eligible voters voted in 2014. While we are upset with Congress we are electing them in the first 18 19 Thus, education is not simply the answer. place. We must use that education as a purpose, where the youth can 20 express their ideas, fears, and goals. By implementing 21 the invaluable ideals that the youth possess, a true 22 impact can be made in the United States, which will 23 reflect this large, growing constituency. Soon the youth 24 will be responsible for America's issues as these 25



1 problems fall to us, and with hope, determination, and 2 confidence, I am content with America's legacy, because I've met 103 of the best leaders who will spearhead our 3 generation to success. 4 Thank you so much for this opportunity. 5 6 MADAM CHAIR: Thank you. (Applause) 7 MADAM CHAIR: Thank you, Brandon. 8 Serene? MS. SINGH: Madam Chair and members of the 9 Board, I wanted to first start off by saying thank you 10 all so much for this prestigious opportunity. Brandon 11 and I are both very excited to have been able to 12 13 participate in such an important and rewarding experience. 14 Being selected for the United States Senate 15 Youth Program, in and of itself, is already a truly a 16 17 prestige and an honor beyond any that I can ever had imagined. I truly feel fortunate to be standing in front 18 19 of you all, even today, in addition to the week that you've already been granted -- that you've already 20 21 granted me. I wanted to quickly address what the program 22 itself meant to me before I dive into everything else. 23 24 With that, I have a quick story.

It was a really cold afternoon and it had



just snowed a foot or so, thanks to Colorado. My older 1 2 sister had went outside and said, "Hey, Serene, I think you have a package, the Hearst Foundation or something 3 like that." And I'm not joking at all when I said I 4 grabbed the envelope, ran upstairs, closed the door, hid 5 6 the envelope, and began crying. Confused, my sister followed me and forced me to open the package, and if I 7 was already crying of excitement, nervousness, and 8 everything in between before, you can imagine what I felt 9 afterwards. The way my mom describes it as 10 (indiscernible) which literally, in Punjabi, translate to 11 "happy beyond comprehension" is the way I was feeling. 12 And that feeling of (indiscernible) never left me 13 throughout the Washington Week, and honestly won't ever 14 leave me because of my experiences and the memories that 15 I've recollected from D.C. 16

17 It wasn't just meeting the President or taking creepy selfies with Senator Gardner throughout the 18 19 week that left that feeling for me. In fact, it was the unique individual perspectives and doors that had opened 20 in my way from the time I walked out of my home at 21 Colorado Springs to the time I returned back a week 22 later. I have learned how to walk around in six-inch 23 24 heels everywhere, and that is something Brandon did not 25 learn.



I learned that I am a debater. 1 Despite 2 being that, I can still get nervous, and beyond belief nervous when I'm asking a question to my greatest role 3 model, Justice Steven Breyer. And I learned that the 4 world is actually full of individuals who also, just like 5 6 me, want to make a passionate change and want to evoke social justice. We just have to reach out, find them, 7 and then ask them questions. 8 My roommate in D.C. always told me, "The 9 best people out there are the ones who love life," and 10 11 she's completely right. Passion after D.C. has become a crucial part of who I am and the way I want to live my 12 13 life. I won't forget the advice of one of the 14 Senators in D.C., who said, "People won't care about how 15 much you know unless they know how much you care." And 16 17 that is one of the truest facts and that is the philosophy, coupled with (indiscernible), which I want to 18 live with, and that equals a pretty happy Serene. 19 Upon returning from D.C., I asked my mom to 20 give me unhealthy, fattening, greasy pizza. 21 The Mayflower had treated me so much like royalty that I 22 23 almost missed my unhealthy lifestyle. But as soon as I 24 began eating my pizza, I asked my mom for a fork, a knife, and a napkin. And since then that's how I eat 25



1 everything.

2	I know the way I eat is not the most
3	impressive lesson I learned but it shows that Washington
4	Week changed me at a deeper, at a more inherent level
5	than just my career path and my interests. It sparked a
6	vision and passion in me to become a better individual so
7	I can better serve and better represent those around me.
8	And so immediately upon arriving back to
9	Colorado Springs, Brandon and I had begun planning the
10	superlative awards for all the 100 delegates to enjoy and
11	participate in, a gift from us Colorado delegates to the
12	rest of the nation's delegates. But Washington Week, by
13	far, is the best gift I could have asked for in this last
14	year of high school.
15	Thank you, Mom, for hearing my nonstop
16	chatter about pollical polarization and Obamacare. I
17	know you don't care about it but I know you do care that
18	I am passionate about it. I gained one of the sweetest,
19	best friends who I know will be there with me through
20	thick and thin, Brandon Lee, as well as an enormous
21	family packed with support and relentless love, which I
22	am extending today. My family is being extended today
23	with all of you.
24	And with that I thank you all far baing nart

24And with that I thank you all for being part25of this incredible journey and perhaps the best week of



1 my entire life. Thank you.

2 (Applause)

MADAM CHAIR: Serene Brandon, we thank you both. You were wonderful representatives of Colorado. We're really excited about that. We'd like each of you to come up front and receive a certificate and stand with your Board representative. So Serene and Steve, if you would like to do this first, and the Commissioner.

9 (Pause)

MADAM CHAIR: Steve, if you'd come up, DebScheffel is your representative.

12 (Pause)

MADAM CHAIR: The next item on the agenda is
Recognition of the 2014 Colorado Milken Educator, Carrie
Harper, of Sunnyside Elementary in Durango.

16 Commissioner, I will turn it over to you.

MR. HAMMOND: Thank you. She's from Durango and on the screen there. Dr. Owen will lead the presentation. But the neat thing about this particular award is an unrestricted amount of \$25,000 this individual receives from the Milken Foundation. So it's a very prestigious award and an honor to get that. So, Keith.

24 MR. OWEN: Madam Chair. So this morning
25 we're here to honor Ms. Carrie Harper. She's the 2014



Colorado Milken Educator. She's located in Durango, 1 2 Colorado, but she's joining us by videoconference. You can see her there. There's a little bit of a delay on 3 the screen. 4 Good morning, Carrie. Can you hear us okay? 5 6 MS. HARPER: Yes, I can hear you. MR. OWEN: Okay. I'm going to give a little 7 background on the award and then we're going to let you 8 talk for a few minutes. 9 Okay? 10 MS. HARPER: Okay. Thank you. 11 MR. OWEN: Great. Great. So the Milken Educator Award provides 12 13 recognition and unrestricted financial award of \$25,000 to exceptional elementary and secondary school teachers, 14 principals, and specialists who are furthering excellence 15 16 in schools throughout the country. Each year, 17 exceptional educators, considered without their knowledge by a blue-ribbon panel appointed by each state's 18 Department of Education, are caught unaware with the news 19 of their \$25,000 award, which they can use in any way. 20 I can certainly say that Carrie was caught 21 by surprise. I had an opportunity to go down and hand 22 her this award in Durango, and absolutely did not know 23 24 what was going on and was almost, I think, fell over when we announced her name. 25



1 But I can tell you that these announcements 2 are made in these surprise assemblies, and they're held at the recipient's school, and they're attended by 3 students, peers, as well as federal, state, and local 4 officials and the media. The nice thing about this 5 6 opportunity was we found out that Mr. Milken actually has a residence in Durango, and so he was able to stay at his 7 place and then come over and hand out the award, which 8 all the superintendents in the Southwest found 9 10 interesting, and I think were trying to locate where his residence is at. 11

12 So at a surprise assembly at her school, on 13 February 4th, Carrie Harper of Sunnyside Elementary 14 School and Durango School District was named the 2014 15 Milken Educator. She was presented with a \$25,000 check 16 from the Milken Family Foundation in recognition of her 17 exceptional work as a model teacher for the state and 18 nation.

19 She has been an elementary teacher for the 20 past six years, and is currently teaching third grade at 21 Sunnyside Elementary. I also had the opportunity to 22 inform Superintendent Dan Snowberger that Carrie was 23 hired under my last year as being superintendent in 24 Durango, which he did not want to acknowledge but he had 25 to accept that was a fact.



1	Ms. Harper is a consummate professional who
2	serves as a role model for not only her students but her
3	colleagues and other teachers as well. Ms. Harper
4	cultivates a love for reading as a lifelong habit. She
5	has impact that absolutely reaches beyond her classroom.
6	She is a data team leader at Sunnyside. She helps
7	establish school assessments and provides professional
8	development to her own colleagues in technology. In
9	short, she is an outstanding teacher and absolutely is
10	deserving of this award, this outstanding award.
11	And so now I'd like to introduce the 2014
12	Colorado Milken Educator, Ms. Carrie Harper, and ask her
13	to say a few words.
14	(Applause.)
15	MS. HARPER: Well, thank you so much, Dr.
16	Owen. I really appreciate those kinds words of
17	introduction.
18	And can you all hear me okay? Can somebody
19	just give me a wave to make sure we're good?
20	UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Yep.
21	MADAM CHAIR: Gotcha.
22	MS. HARPER: Okay. Hi.
23	So I appreciate that I was hired under your
24	being the superintendent, Dr. Owen, and your inspiration
25	of going to CDE has been a role model for a lot of



1 teachers in our region as well, so thank you for just 2 being an inspiration at the district level. 3 It's an incredible honor to get to speak with all of you today. I regret that I can't be there in 4 person to thank each of you for this opportunity. And I 5 6 do want to thank the Milken Family Foundation for this When I was surprised I think there were some 7 award. people that I wasn't able to thank because I was just 8 completely shocked, so I wanted to make sure that I thank 9 10 them for this amazing award. The Milken Family 11 Foundation gives hope and public recognition and credit to the education profession. Many thanks to family, 12 13 friends, and, of course, my incredibly supportive husband, Brad. 14 I consider this award not as an individual 15 16 accomplish but as a byproduct of the hard work and 17 dedication that all teachers devote to their students, 18 parents, and fellow colleagues. I am blessed with the 19 support of a strong and dynamic staff at Sunnyside Elementary and District 9R. Our superintendent, Mr. 20

Snowberger, is an outstanding superintendent who has spent countless hours meeting with teachers, parents, and students, to listen and inform them of the many changes in the education system. He is readily available and diligently seeks way to engage the public, education



leaders, and educators in the many changes in policies
 and processes.

3 Vanessa Fisher, my principal, coach, and mentor, believes in each teacher and student's abilities 4 and developing skills. She consistently encourages all 5 6 of her teachers and students to dream big and set goals which have led to an environment that maintains a high 7 standard of excellence. I hope that you all get the 8 privilege of getting to meet them, and if you haven't met 9 them already. 10

Since becoming a teacher almost seven years 11 ago I have seen education change rapidly. I believe in 12 13 the change because I see how we can inspire and educate students. New quality standards for teacher evaluation 14 shifts the focus away from the teacher and onto the 15 reasons we are all here today -- the students. I am 16 17 encouraged in the changes that have been made but not complacent in the further development that our children 18 need in order to become lifelong learners. 19

To continue forward with the changes needed I know that relationships must be at the forefront. Michael Fullan, who wrote *Leading in a Culture of Change*, said, "Deep and sustained reform depends on many of us, not just a few who are destined to be extraordinary." His words are a reminder that we impact our students when



1 we work together. This is also echoed by Ecclesiastes 2 4:12, "Though one may be overpowered, two can support each other. A cord of three strands is not easily 3 divided." 4 We collaborate to bring the change needed to 5 6 develop students to become lifelong learners, more 21stcentury minded, having high EQs -- emotional intelligence 7 -- being creative, and of a problem-solving mindset. 8 Again, thank you so much for this 9 10 opportunity. I eagerly look forward to working with you in the future. 11 (Applause) 12 13 MADAM CHAIR: And, Ms. Harper, we would like that. We commend you for your exceptional work as a 14 model teacher and we congratulate you on receiving the 15 16 Milken award. This is especially important for me, as 17 the Third Congressional Representative. I'm your congressional representative. And we'd like to present 18 you with your certificate, and we will mail the actual 19 certificate to you. The Commissioner and I will come 20 over and stand by the screen. You probably can't see us 21 but we'll send you a picture of it. 22 23 MS. HARPER: Thank you so much. 24 (Pause)

MS. HARPER: Thank you. I wish I could be



1 there with you right now. I'd give you a big squeeze, a 2 big hug. 3 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Okay, Carrie. We're going to get ready to take a photo. Can you hear me? 4 MS. HARPER: Okay. Yes. 5 6 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: All right. You can put down the phone if you'd like. 7 MS. HARPER: Okay. 8 9 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: All right. Here we go, guys. Smile. 10 11 There we go. Thank you. (Applause) 12 13 MS. HARPER: Thank you very much. You've had to get creative with this online stuff. 14 MR. OWEN: We're going to be closing out the 15 16 screen now. Okay? 17 MS. HARPER: Okay. Thank you. MR. OWEN: Have a great day. 18 19 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Bye. 20 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Congratulations. MS. HARPER: Have a great day. It's so good 21 22 to see you all. Thank you. 23 MADAM CHAIR: Okay. Ms. Markel, we are 24 ready to go into executive session. MS. MARKEL: An executive session has been 25
