2	MADAM CHAIR: Greeley-Evans School
3	District 6 to request to approve its Innovation
4	application
5	MS. SCHROEDER: By far.
6	MADAM CHAIR: (indiscernible) the Early
7	College Academy. Commissioner?
8	MR. HAMMOND: Thank you very much. And I'll
9	go ahead (indiscernible) really. I'm going to turn on
10	the (indiscernible).
11	MS. MORGAN: Sure.
12	MR. HAMMOND: And then we'll get started.
13	MS. MORGAN: So this the second round of an
14	Innovation plan coming to you, same circumstances. This
15	is their first time creating an Innovation school and so
16	they need to be designated as a district of Innovation.
17	You'll be pleased to know I don't believe they're asking
18	for a waiver to 191, so so this may be somewhat more
19	straightforward than your previous discussions.
20	But we have two people here from the
21	district to present to you and share about your plan.
22	And then again, your decision is to either approve or not
23	approve, just on the criteria that (indiscernible).

MADAM CHAIR: Okay.



1	UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Thank you, Gretchen.
2	Thank you, Commissioner Hammond, and to the State Board
3	Members. We thank you for the opportunity to be able to
4	come before you and present our Innovation plan for Early
5	College Academy in Greeley-Evans School District 6. It
6	is our first school of Innovation to come before the
7	State Board.
8	We want to first start by sharing with you
9	that Early College Academy will meet, in fact, both of
10	the requirements for approval from the State Board of
11	Education as stated in state law Statute 22-32.5-
12	107(3)(a), in that it will increase academic achievement
13	within the education school and the Innovation does
14	ensure the school is fiscally feasible.
15	Early College Academy began about 18 months
16	ago in a collaborative effort between the superintendent
17	of District 6 and the president of Ames Community
18	College. As a result, our mission was developed by our
19	advisory committee of Early College Academy to create a
20	high school where students could earn a four-year high
21	school diploma simultaneously to earning a two-year
22	Associate of Arts degree from Ames Community College.
23	The purpose then of our Innovation status that we are
24	requesting from you is that it will District 6 the
25	flexibility to hire the very best staff and remove any



barriers to success towards this ambitious mission. 1 And 2 we believe it is very ambitious. 3 By granting Innovation status, we ensure that the Early College Academy leadership and our 4 instructional staff will have the values, the passion, 5 6 and the (indiscernible) expectations for learning of our students in this academy in order to enable successful 7 implementation of that mission (indiscernible) our 8 vision, rather, and the components of Early College 9 Academy. And with that, I'm going to turn it over to Mr. 10 Paul Francisco, our director of career and technical 11 education in post-secondary. And he is going to share 12 13 with the very specific waivers that are in the application. 14 MR. FRANCISCO: So --15 16 MADAM CHAIR: I'll try (indiscernible). 17 MR. FRANCISCO: -- we sought waivers in two In the areas of human resources, we --18 specific areas. we sought waivers which would allow District 6 to create 19 a unique educational program, which will become Early 20 College Academy. To accomplish this subjective, Early 21 College Academy will hire teachers and other employees 22 under at-will employment terms, utilize the schedule and 23 24 provisions of our administrative provisional and technical salary schedule. 25



Our second area, we ask for waivers of 1 2 scheduling in calendar to overcome future barriers --3 barriers that may occur as the program develops. waiver of both the Board of Education policy and the State policy to ensure that the principal has the 5 6 flexibility to change the calendar for Early College Academy to maximize the use of the blended relationship 7 with Ames Community College, while at the same time 8 meeting the requirements for both the high school and the 9 Associates of Arts problem. Our local board has reviewed 10 these -- our such waivers as you see outlined in our plan 11 and has a -- has already approved those waivers. 12 13 As illustrated in our Innovation plan, a -a vote of the consenting parties has been conducted, 14 which includes our advisory committee members and our 15 16 administrative team. We're talking about a very small 17 numbers of teachers for this particular plan, so there are only three District 6, I think, teachers who will be 18 initially employed by the school. Those teachers have 19 been -- have been given our Innovation plan and over --20 about three weeks ago. And we plan on them voting on or 21 before July 25th. So the vote of the staff will occur 22 23 school -- before school begins. And although many of the 24 people that would be involved in the school accountability are -- have already chimed in and voted 25



1 for this plan, we also will have the school 2 accountability committee vote on this plan at their 3 earliest time when they can. UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: But as an Innovation 4 school, Early College Academy will be empowered with the 5 6 flexibility to meet the academic achievement goals and ensure that each and every student is simultaneously 7 attained at Ames Community College Associate of Arts 8 degree as well as a high school diploma. 9 Innovation status will allow Early College 10 11 Academy to increase the frequency and customization of professional development needed for our staff, the 12 13 training, and the planning for our instructors to be successful. Innovation status will also permit the 14 school to establish a new innovative culture focused on 15 successful implementation of this ambitious mission. 16 17 This is necessary to meet the needs of our diverse student population in our community to foster a culture 18 19 of excellence and to prepare our students for a rigorous academic experience and ultimately post-secondary 20 21 success. District 6 is prepared to move forward and 22 23 begin this exciting journey within our community. confident that this school of Innovation will increase 24 academic achievement and that our budget is fiscally 25



1 feasible. We thank you for the opportunity to be able to 2 present to you this afternoon. And we, as you (indiscernible) in our vision (indiscernible) of our 3 students. We'll answer any questions that you may have. 4 MADAM CHAIR: Angelika? 5 6 MS. SCHROEDER: I -- I may be brain dead. (Overlapping) 7 MS. SCHROEDER: Are you taking an existing 8 high school and putting in a program? Is the geographic 9 location on the campus -- did you tell me that and I 10 didn't get it? 11 12 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: No. That is a great 13 question. MS. SCHROEDER: Okay. 14 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: No, actually. This is 15 a brand new school. It is on a location (indiscernible) 16 17 partnership with Ames Community College. They have (indiscernible) building and we will be leasing it from 18 19 them. And so we will be on the Ames campus, but it will be a separate building, so it will be its own high 20 school. 21 MS. SCHROEDER: With three teachers? 22 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Three teachers and also 23

(indiscernible) faculty.

MS. SCHROEDER: And how many -- how many



1 kids do you expect, please? UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Right now we have 170 -2 3 MS. SCHROEDER: Wow. UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: -- students. Yes, and 5 6 we're starting with ninth and tenth grade students. MS. SCHROEDER: Okay. 7 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: (Indiscernible) the 8 following (indiscernible). When we are here 9 (indiscernible) 50 to 500 students at capacity. 10 MS. SCHROEDER: Very cool, thank you. 11 MADAM CHAIR: What -- what are some classes 12 13 that they might take at -- what kind of things are you looking at? I -- I love your idea. I think it's great 14 we have a similar thing, so -- but I was just curious. 15 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: (Indiscernible). 16 17 MADAM CHAIR: What will they --MR. FRANCISCO: The Associate of Arts 18 19 program is centered around their liberal arts degree, so there are about 36 different programs that they can do. 20 All of the classes are focused on guaranteed transfer 21 classes with the community college systems, so students 22 23 compare that with a two-year -- two more years at a fouryear college within the -- the state system. 24

MADAM CHAIR: But still, what are some



1 specific classes they can take? 2 MR. FRANCISCO: Sure. So students can major 3 in psychology. We have science majors, such as biology, chemistry, physics. Students can take -- like I said, there's about 36 --5 6 MADAM CHAIR: So they're pretty academic classes? 7 MR. FRANCISCO: They're very academic 8 classes around -- associated around liberal arts. It was 9 not intended to -- to focus on career and technical 10 11 programs --12 MADAM CHAIR: Okay. 13 MR. FRANCISCO: -- or -- and it -- and it -it can -- it can be used to -- to accomplish and 14 Associate of Science degree. However, that degree is 15 16 very small at Ames Community College. And for -- for 17 this initial program, we focused on a liberal arts degree for students. 18 19 MADAM CHAIR: Okay. 20 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: The classes that they will take will typically be like English 120, 121, 21 political science class, and a science class. So -- so 22 23 that they not only attain the requirements for an AA 24 degree, but also fulfill our high school diploma

graduation requirements as well. So they're general



1 classes. 2 MADAM CHAIR: And -- and at a higher level 3 than they might just take --UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: At college level, yes. 4 MR. FRANCISCO: Yes. 5 6 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: (Indiscernible). (Overlapping) 7 MADAM CHAIR: And save money too. Good 8 point. 9 10 (Overlapping) 11 MADAM CHAIR: Angelika? MS. SCHROEDER: Are there -- are there 12 13 entrance requirements? I mean, is there a certain GPA that's required or is there any --14 MR. FRANCISCO: We did not do that. We --15 16 we decided that the only entrance requirements for a 17 student to fill out an application and to get one recommendation from a teacher or from an administrator or 18 19 from a counselor. In the application process, (indiscernible) just general information was collected 20 from students. We relied on -- on parents to learn about 21 the program and for students to learn about the program 22 23 and the academic rigor of the guaranteed transfer classes 24 and then just make their own decision as to whether they 25 would apply.



1 What we were seeking was to get sort of a 2 balance across the system. We didn't want to seek out only the best and brightest. We wanted students to be 3 able to take this opportunity. So really, the only requirement is that a student does have to graduate from 5 6 the eighth grade and be eligible to graduate into the ninth grade or from the ninth grade into the tenth grade 7 for the admission class. 8 MS. SCHROEDER: And of the kids you have, is 9 10 it a diverse population? Can you identify the makeup, 11 demographic makeup? I didn't bring the 12 MR. FRANCISCO: Yes. 13 statistics with me, but it is a very diverse population. It is a cross-section from around our district. And we 14 will have --15 MS. SCHROEDER: Does it match -- does it 16 17 match the overall district demographics? MR. FRANCISCO: Yes, it does. 18 19 MS. SCHROEDER: In terms of the various 20 percentages? It does. I think we do have 21 MR. FRANCISCO: a higher percent of females than males that we saw coming 22 in, but as far as our other demographic information, we 23 24 saw a very good cross-section from across our district.

MS. SCHROEDER: Thank you.



1 MADAM CHAIR: Any other questions? 2 MS. SHEFFEL: I just want to say thank you. 3 I think it's an Innovation plan. I like it. I understand it's innovative. MR. FRANCISCO: Stacey (ph), make sure they 5 6 have a detail. 7 MS. SHEFFEL: Thank you. MADAM CHAIR: I think this is going to be 8 easier than the last one. 9 MS. SCHROEDER: Why don't you make the --10 lost my (indiscernible) stuff. 11 MADAM CHAIR: Any other comments, questions? 12 13 MS. SCHROEDER: Steve's going to do it. MADAM CHAIR: Where is my --14 (Overlapping). 15 16 MS. SCHROEDER: Yeah, that was very clear. 17 MR. DURHAM: Would you like a motion? MADAM CHAIR: Yes. 18 19 MR. DURHAM: Move to approve Greeley-Evans 20 School District 6 (indiscernible) to approve its Innovation application at the Early College Academy. 21 MADAM CHAIR: Second? 22 23 MS. SCHROEDER: Second. MADAM CHAIR: Deb? 24 MS. SHEFFEL: (Indiscernible). 25

1 MADAM CHAIR: Appreciate it. 2 MS. SCHROEDER: Kind of cheered us up a 3 little. (Overlapping) 4 MADAM CHAIR: All right. 5 6 (Overlapping) MADAM CHAIR: Oh, okay, but (indiscernible). 7 Are they going to come? Oh, I just wondered. 8 Casey, Dr. Owens, you have a ESEA update issue for us? 9 MR. OWENS: Madam Chair? 10 MADAM CHAIR: Yes. 11 MR. OWENS: Good afternoon. I'll be brief. 12 13 We are continuing to work with the U.S. DOE regarding our application for a waiver extension and don't really have 14 anything to update you on today, except that the talks 15 16 were still progressing. We did get some feedback on 17 several of the items and they've requested some 18 additional information. And we're working to get that 19 turned in. Hope to have more of an update, not myself, but some of the -- probably one of the staff, Pat 20 Chapman, will have an update for you in the August 21 meeting around how those talks have progressed. 22 23 We are trying to reconcile some of the 24 statute that was passed in the -- in the spring, specific around 1323 and how that works with the waiver request. 25



- 1 And but I think U.S. DOE's been fairly open. I -- I -- I
- 2 have good hopes that we're going to be able to get this
- 3 thing worked through and it will have something hopefully
- 4 approved and be talking to you about that at the August
- 5 meeting.
- 6 MADAM CHAIR: Okay.
- 7 MR. OWENS: So no real major updates right
- 8 now.
- 9 MADAM CHAIR: Any questions? Comments?
- 10 This is Dr. Owen's last meeting.
- MS. SHEFFEL: Oh, no.
- 12 MADAM CHAIR: He will be moving down road to
- 13 Colorado Springs and I (indiscernible) I think you've
- 14 done an exemplary job. I certainly have enjoyed having
- 15 you.
- MR. OWENS: Thank you.
- 17 MADAM CHAIR: I think we all owe you a vote
- 18 of thanks.
- MR. OWENS: Oh, thank you.
- MADAM CHAIR: And, you know, goodbye,

- 24 been my sincere pleasure to be here the last four years
- 25 and have had a great experience, great opportunity.

SCHROEDER: -- and thus he was -- and 19 thus he was --MADAM CHAIR: She's got the original. 20 got the card. 21 MS. SCHROEDER: -- given increasing 22 23 responsibilities of the Department; and whereas Mr.

Hammond was appointed as the interim commissioner on --

in December 2010 while the Colorado State Board of



1	Education conducted a national search for a new
2	commissioner of education and whereas the Colorado State
3	Board of Education requested that he submit his name for
4	consideration for the position of commissioner of
5	education; and whereas the Colorado State Board of
6	Education unanimously selected Robert K. Hammond as the
7	commissioner of education in May 2011; and whereas the
8	Commissioner was charged with implementing several major
9	educational improvement programs throughout the state
10	based on laws passed by the Colorado legislature, signed
11	by the governor, and appropriate, detailed in Colorado
12	State Board of Education rules; and whereas the
13	Commissioner recruited and retained one of the nation's
14	strongest leadership teams to lead the agency through the
15	process of developing the new education initiatives in
16	collaboration with school districts across the states and
17	other stakeholders; and whereas the Commissioner has been
18	deeply committed to providing districts the most useful
19	supports and services from all offices at CDE. He has
20	transitioned the Department from one that focused
21	primarily on compliance to one of service and support,
22	thus prompting many superintendents to respond to the
23	Commissioner's annual evaluation survey with words of
24	high praise and appreciation; and whereas through his
25	focus on serving the State's 178 districts, the



1	Department was able to effectively implement new academic
2	standards, new assessments, and new educator evaluation
3	system, a new accountability system, and a new early
4	literacy law in accordance with the timelines and
5	requirements outlined in State law; and whereas the
6	Commissioner's dedication to fiscal accountability
7	improved the Department's practices and brought trust and
8	respect from the U.S. Department of Education regarding
9	the Department's federal compliance; and whereas the
10	Department became highly regarded for its expertise,
11	support, and service to schools and districts across the
12	state; and whereas a collaborative and supportive
13	relationship was established with a broad group of
14	stakeholders throughout the state, including businesses,
15	foundations, and non-profit organizations; and whereas
16	education leaders across the state praised the
17	Commissioner for his leadership, accessibility,
18	encouraged to seek out diverse opinions in order to make
19	the best decisions for students and communities; and
20	whereas state legislators gave public recognition to the
21	Commissioner for his strength of leadership, credibility,
22	and ethical standards in making sound policy
23	recommendations to lawmakers; and whereas his service on
24	various commissions, boards, the executive leadership
25	groups, among them the PARCC governing board, the Council



- of Chief State School Officers, and Colorado Creative

  Industries Council was a tribute to his peers'

  recognition of his quality leadership, ethical standards,
- 4 problem-solving abilities, collaborative skills,
- 5 incredibility across leadership groups around the nation.
- 6 Now therefore be it resolved the Colorado State Board of
- 7 Education formally commends Robert K. Hammond for his
- 8 outstanding services Colorado commissioner of education
- 9 is indefeatable -- indefatigable efforts to increase
- 10 academic achievement, champion academic civil rights for
- 11 all students, and to develop continuous improvement
- 12 systems (indiscernible) all educators, students, parents,
- and communities across Colorado. I'm sorry.
- 14 (Applause)
- 15 MR. HAMMOND: All I have to say is just you
- 16 can tell I didn't write that. It would be one paragraph.
- 17 But bless your heart. Thank -- thank you all very much.
- 18 It's been a pleasure serving you. Like any boards, it's
- 19 been very interesting and always challenging, but I --
- 20 I've enjoyed my time here and with all of you. And even
- though for the millions listening, if Dr. Schaffer (ph)
- is out there, I wouldn't be in this position if I didn't
- work for him, because he encouraged me to get out there
- 24 and apply. And I'll always thank him for that, and
- 25 because he saw something in me that I didn't see in

SCHROEDER: I seconded it already, but you can throw it in. 13 (Overlapping) 14 MADAM CHAIR: Okay. Dr. --15 MS. MAZANEC: Dr. who? 16 17 MADAM CHAIR: It's suggested that we do into executive session in order to discuss salary. 18 19 MR. DURHAM: Can you? My only recommendation, I mean if you're -- you -- if you approve 20 an interim, it's your only time together. You should 21 discuss --22 23 MS. SHEFFEL: I agree. 24 MR. DURHAM: -- with Elliott --

(Overlapping)

MS. MAZANEC: I second that. 1 2 MADAM CHAIR: Okay, so we'll -- read us into 3 exec session. 4 MR. DURHAM: But we have to come back together at the end. 5 6 MADAM CHAIR: Yeah, I'll clear the room. (Overlapping) 7 MS. BURDSALL: An executive session has been 8 (indiscernible) for today's State Board meeting in 9 conformance with 24-6-402 (3)(b), C.R.S. to consider the 10 appointment of a public official for employment who 11 requested that the matter be addressed in executive 12 13 session pursuant to (indiscernible). 14 (Pause) MADAM CHAIR: Board is back in session. 15 have approved the appointment of Elliott Asp as interim 16 commissioner. 17 18 MS. MAZANEC: (Indiscernible) we're voting 19 on the issue. MADAM CHAIR: And Mr. Durham has a motion 20 about the salary. 21 22 I think --MR. DURHAM: 23 MS. MAZANEC: No. 24 MR. DURHAM: -- if I'm not mistaken, my motion needs to be through the appointment and the 25



1	salary.
2	MS. MAZANEC: Yes.
3	MR. DURHAM: So the motion would be to
4	appoint Dr. Elliott Asp as interim commissioner and the
5	salary commiserate with his current pay level to be
6	determined by the director by the Department personnel
7	director. And so that would I think that would be
8	does that cover (indiscernible), do you think?
9	MADAM CHAIR: I think so. Second?
10	MS. SCHROEDER: Second.
11	MADAM CHAIR: Second. Moved and seconded.
12	MR. DURHAM: (Indiscernible) discussion.
13	MADAM CHAIR: Any discussion?
14	MR. DURHAM: I do have a little discussion.
15	MADAM CHAIR: Little discussion?
16	MR. DURHAM: Well, not more than 30 minutes.
17	MADAM CHAIR: Oh, thanks.
18	MR. DURHAM: No, just a couple of things.
19	This is likely I think based on the next piece of
20	business we'll go through (indiscernible) last some
21	significant period of time. As we're already behind
22	schedule (indiscernible) so I do think it's important, at
23	least from my perspective, (indiscernible) anticipate
24	this is not a this is not a stand-still period of
25	time There's a lot going on and I think there's a lot



- 1 going on in the Department that may need attention to
- 2 move forward over the next few months. I mean, I'm not
- 3 receiving complaints from charter school people, for
- 4 example, that somehow charter school unit is not as
- 5 charter friendly as it needs to be. And those are the
- 6 kinds of complaints (indiscernible) resolve.
- 7 I think review of the agency rules and
- 8 regulations, that those need to be -- need to be in a
- 9 situation in burdening the districts as little as
- 10 possible reporting requirements and all the rules as a
- 11 result of statutory (indiscernible) that we need to press
- 12 forward with (indiscernible) privacy issues, and trying
- to wrap a number of those things up. So I hope that no
- one in the Department or -- or (indiscernible)
- 15 commissioner think that this is housekeeping for the next
- 16 six months. It shouldn't be.
- 17 MADAM CHAIR: Thank you, Mr. Durham. I
- 18 would make the comment that you have sort of outlined a
- 19 program which we have not talked about as a Board.
- MR. DURHAM: No --
- 21 MADAM CHAIR: And we need to talk about
- those kinds of things.
- MR. DURHAM: There are a number of things we
- 24 need to.
- MADAM CHAIR: Yeah.



1 MS. GOFF: (Indiscernible) I apologize. 2 Thank you for the indulgence. Did we vote on the salary 3 MR. DURHAM: No, not yet. I was speaking to 4 the motion. 5 6 (Overlapping) 7 MS. BURDSALL: I'm going to call the roll. Steve Durham? 8 9 MR. DURHAM: Aye. 10 MS. BURDSALL: Jane -- Dr. Flores? 11 MS. FLORES: Aye. MS. BURDSALL: Jane Goff? 12 13 MS. GOFF: Aye. (Overlapping) 14 MS. BURDSALL: Pam Mazanec? 15 MS. MAZANEC: Aye. 16 17 MS. BURDSALL: Marcia Neal? 18 MADAM CHAIR: Aye. 19 MS. BURDSALL: Dr. Scheffel? 20 MS. SHEFFEL: I'm going to vote no, because I appreciate Elliott's willingness to take on this role 21 and I know he brings a lot to the table. I guess I feel 22 that six business days to allow us to find an interim was 23 24 insufficient, so I object to the process. So I'll vote 25 no, thank you.



MS. BURDSALL: Dr. Schroeder? 1 2 MS. SCHROEDER: Aye. 3 MADAM CHAIR: Motion carries. The only other thing we have is this search -- I guess Jane and Steve were going to talk about the process. 5 6 MS. SHEFFEL: And public comment. 7 (Overlapping) MADAM CHAIR: Yeah, or do you have any or 8 does everybody kind of know what it is? Steve? 9 The search process? 10 MR. DURHAM: Yeah, I -- Jane, you want to --11 (Overlapping) 12 13 MADAM CHAIR: Sure. MS. GOFF: We did say we've give an update 14 (indiscernible). 15 MS. SCHROEDER: I like -- I have no idea. 16 17 MADAM CHAIR: Oh. MS. SCHROEDER: Which is before the Board 18 19 report. 20 MADAM CHAIR: She's here? Okay. MS. GOFF: (Indiscernible) I mean, before I 21 knew it, I will -- I will (indiscernible) everybody 22 (indiscernible) a link to these updates will be in the 23 24 same place they are now, which is on our stakeholder page under Announcements, right? 25



1 MS. FLORES: Oh. 2 MS. GOFF: But and then now that we have this out on our agenda, you'll be able to link to this 3 (indiscernible). 4 MS. BURDSALL: (Indiscernible) on that . 5 6 MS. GOFF: (Indiscernible) whatever happened to intervene (indiscernible) agenda for the date. 7 mean, you could find the same link (indiscernible) there 8 and --9 10 MS. MAZANEC: It's probably easier to find 11 it on the -- those state -- the CDE website. MS. GOFF: Go to the statewide web page and 12 13 look around the website. MS. MAZANEC: That's another date. 14 MS. GOFF: (Indiscernible) website. But 15 16 here's -- here's basically what the summary of what --17 what could happen. And this is -- this is open -- open (indiscernible). The search sub-committee, our first 18 19 meeting was on May 20th. We already started to draft and 20 approve what's called the documentation quotation, or DQ This is -- this is the form that initiates the 21 solicitation process to select an executive search firm. 22 23 The DQ form was finalized and posted on the State bid website and CDE's website two days later on May 22nd. 24 And the proposal submission deadline was set for June



1 4th, which was I believe two weeks later. 2 MS. MAZANEC: Excuse me, can I -- can we ask 3 questions during this? So who put together the DO form? Did you guys put it together or was that --4 MS. GOFF: (Indiscernible) sub-committee in 5 6 conjunction with the procurement officer here at CDE, Trish --7 (Overlapping) 8 MS. MAZANEC: So does that mean it was 9 10 largely driven by Trish having experience in doing these 11 things? MS. GOFF: Yeah, yeah. If -- if I'm right, 12 13 it's -- it's sort of a state template form, in a way. It's customizable for the -- for any bid that an agency 14 or department is doing. So there are some -- there are 15 some standard language in it. Flexibility is ours --16 17 MADAM CHAIR: (Indiscernible). MS. GOFF: -- as far as this time in setting 18 19 (indiscernible) deadline dates, big amounts, or budget (indiscernible). And -- and a lot of -- and the criteria 20 for this particular (indiscernible) or for what we would 21 be using to select a firm, criteria (indiscernible). 22 23 MS. SCHROEDER: Oh, I'm sorry. I'm sorry. 24 (Overlapping)

MS. GOFF: I'm not going to start over,



thank you very much. So yes, Steve and Val and I, our 1 2 first meeting was Trish -- Tony was also -- Tony and Bizy 3 is our State Board office center part. We had -- spent that day -- those -- those couple hours resulted in what we considered to be our final form -- form -- firm --5 6 firm form and it was very similar to what we did the last 7 time. And so that was put on the websites and it went -sent to -- broadly it went to superintendents, districts, 8 9 other connected education-related groups. So when we set the July -- or June 4th --10 MS. MAZANEC: Wait, so it didn't go out to 11 search firms? It did, didn't it? 12 13 MS. GOFF: Yeah, there was -- yeah. Yeah, There were some direct contacts. That's how 14 thank you. we've been referring to them. So there was -- there was 15 16 a specific list of firms that we had suggested that 17 people -- you -- you guys had, a couple of you. We had a 18 list of some that we used prior and to recontact and let them know about the bid. So that's where we were. 19 20 Following the June 4th deadline for the -that first round, we received one proposal only. And 21 that is not sufficient for the -- to have a fair and a 22 23 competitive bid process, which is what everybody would 24 prefer. Makes it a lot more credible, a lot more reliable and believable, not only for the firms, but for 25



1 the public as well. And firms welcome competition. -- they would. They appreciate knowing there is -- they 2 3 have a competition. So only one firm being submitted caused this 4 to -- to be deemed a failed solicitation. So that's --5 6 that's a fairly -- it's not -- it doesn't happen every day, I'm sure, but it's not unusual that when the bid 7 pool is not satisfactory, we do that. So as a result of 8 the -- of that, the sub-committee, we met again -- was it 9 only yesterday? It was only yesterday. Yesterday -- and 10 11 determined what the next steps will be in light of the fact that we would -- we have a set of options here, 12 13 either first of all, declare it a failed process, start over. If you start the process over. Or apply what is 14 known as the elected officials exemption, which means 15 that we as a board can do our own search. We can sort of 16 17 structure our own search. We have the flexibility to, for example, contact or suggest a list of firms to -- to 18 make contact with. We can invite others outside of the 19 Board to work -- you know, to relay through us suggested 20 firms and then we send them. We have -- we get a 21 coordinated grouping for direct contact again. 22 But in addition to that, it will also be 23 posted again on the CDE website and then on our usual 24 places. We -- we will -- we can always continue talking 25



- 1 about if we need to, what are some even further out
- 2 avenues to -- to get as wide a net as possible.
- 3 (Overlapping)
- 4 MS. MAZANEC: We need to limit it to
- 5 Colorado.
- 6 MS. GOFF: So -- no, we can -- we want to do
- 7 -- yeah, we're not -- we're not closed to -- we can't be.
- 8 We shouldn't be, so we're not. But that will happen.
- 9 The -- the goal of where we left it yesterday was the
- 10 goal for the next -- to have the new, quote, the bid form
- 11 -- it's not really the same as the state procurement
- form, because we're doing it on our own, so we do have a
- 13 little flexibility in certain requirements under the
- 14 state procurement form. We will of course still set a
- 15 target budget range. We will of course have to have some
- 16 target dates. We're looking at having the posting and
- 17 the context begun and under way by June 15, 16th -- 15th
- 18 or 16th.
- 19 MADAM CHAIR: Is that a reasonable date? Do
- you think you'll be (indiscernible)?
- MS. GOFF: Well, we chatted a lot about
- that. That's for the new posting only. That won't take
- 23 too much time.
- MADAM CHAIR: Okay.
- MS. GOFF: The new deadline, the submission



- deadline date now, we agreed on July 6, which is a week
- 2 longer than the first one was. And as many -- many firms
- 3 or even several that were contacted, they -- it's not --
- 4 it's not -- since it's not the first time they heard
- 5 about it, they're aware this is going on in Colorado, a
- 6 lot of them will have been prepared to -- to do it
- 7 anyway.
- 8 So that'll be -- it's a way -- we'll see.
- 9 We have three weeks, as opposed to two. And with many of
- them, that's an additional two weeks anyway.
- 11 MADAM CHAIR: (Indiscernible) Jane
- 12 (indiscernible).
- 13 MS. GOFF: From what they had before. So
- that's -- that's part of that. So July 6 -- June 15th,
- 15 new posting. You could watch for that. July 6th, this
- is the date that we're -- we expect the new bids, the new
- 17 round of bids, to be here. And then from then we --
- 18 dates after that, there are some tentatives in mind. You
- might be looking at a special meeting for the down-the-
- 20 road piece to interview a couple of finals, so firms.
- 21 And then vote on which firm we want to choose to guide us
- 22 through this the rest of the way.
- So I say early August, first week of August,
- 24 we might have a special meeting. I -- if I were all you,
- 25 I'd pencil it in in dark black pencil. We do have a



- 1 regular board meeting the following week with a real
- 2 heavy agenda. So we're trying to be practical and, you
- know, practical about how much should be -- can be put
- 4 into a two-day period (indiscernible).
- 5 MS. MAZANEC: Okay. Was there coffee in
- 6 there?
- 7 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Oh, my goodness. Yeah,
- 8 there was, but I didn't spill it.
- 9 MS. SCHROEDER: You didn't spill any.
- 10 MS. MAZANEC: (Indiscernible) looked like
- 11 you spilled it on your (indiscernible).
- 12 (Overlapping)
- 13 MS. GOFF: So that's it, I think, pretty
- 14 much. Be looking for the -- this -- this exact text --
- oh, one more thing. This exact text will be on -- on
- 16 Board docs. We talked about that, and on the State Board
- 17 page. One other note that will not be necessarily on the
- 18 public websites, because it's not pertinent to anybody
- 19 but us right now, Board Members, if you have firms in
- 20 mind, names of firms, of you've heard of other firms or
- 21 people that suggested firms or someone has asked you how
- 22 can so-and-so get a hold of -- you know, get involved in
- 23 the big process, if you will pass those on -- pass the
- info. Bizy's great at making connections if she has to
- 25 figure things out. But let's use Bizy as our central



- depository for these names and such. She -- she will
- 2 directly contact them in addition to others we -- we plan
- 3 to again.
- 4 MS. BURDSALL: And then if we have that by
- 5 Monday, (indiscernible) so that we can be timely in
- 6 getting the revised -- the new --
- 7 MS. GOFF: The new --
- 8 MS. BURDSALL: -- proposal put together.
- 9 MS. GOFF: It all lines up really well that
- 10 way, so -- so Monday the 15th is kind of --
- MS. SCHROEDER: So do you have a list of the
- 12 firms you've contacted?
- MS. GOFF: We haven't been doing that. She
- 14 has.
- MS. BURDSALL: So it's --
- MS. GOFF: And the procurement offices
- 17 (indiscernible).
- MS. BURDSALL: Yeah, we -- yes.
- 19 MS. GOFF: She'll -- she does. She has
- 20 some.
- 21 MS. BURDSALL: I do have a list. And then
- since we're (indiscernible) other firms that
- 23 (indiscernible) to reach out to them as well, see if they
- 24 would like to submit a bid before the sub-committee's
- 25 first review and then come --



1 (Overlapping) 2 MS. SCHROEDER: So you did have a list of 3 the firms that applied last time? 4 MS. BURDSALL: Uh-huh. MS. SCHROEDER: Because I do remember there 5 6 was one firm that didn't make the cut, but -- and it wasn't one of the big (indiscernible). I can't remember 7 which one it was. 8 9 MS. MAZANEC: Can we all see the list of search firms that are being --10 MS. GOFF: Yeah, what -- what -- what we're 11 thinking right now is the --12 13 MS. MAZANEC: Because we would -- we might suggest some if they're already on the list. 14 MS. SCHROEDER: Right. 15 MS. GOFF: Well, yeah, (indiscernible) take 16 much time or (indiscernible). 17 18 (Overlapping) 19 MS. BURDSALL: -- and say these are (indiscernible) reached out to. 20 (Overlapping) 21 MS. MAZANEC: -- figure out who we have on 22 our list. 23 24 MS. GOFF: That's a good idea.

MS. MAZANEC: Thank you.



1 MS. FLORES: And hope that, you know, the 2 audience that's listening will maybe have -- out there 3 too. MS. GOFF: It's --4 What? MS. MAZANEC: 5 6 MS. GOFF: It's a little bit longer time for people to respond --7 8 (Overlapping) MS. GOFF: And it's a little -- it's already 9 been -- we've already started it. The word's out, which 10 helps. It'll go -- spread a little faster, so I think 11 we're good with what we can be good with right now. 12 13 we will review all of them that come in and recommend we have forms. We have tools to use to evaluate the 14 qualities of them and we'll pick some for the Board to 15 consider for interviews. Have that part -- part by May -16 - by August, we'll be done. So that's all I have. 17 MADAM CHAIR: And I'm sure as time comes 18 19 closer or if he hasn't already, Tony will be reminding more of the confidentiality rules that apply to a lot of 20 this. 21 That's correct, although most of 22 MR. DYL: those frankly won't kick in until you actually have 23 24 meetings --(Overlapping)



- 1 MADAM CHAIR: Well, I know it's more with
- the candidates, but, you know, you kind of want to not be
- 3 throwing these names around.
- 4 MS. GOFF: It's -- it's -- I have an opinion
- 5 about that, but it doesn't mean it's -- it law.
- 6 MS. FLORES: Interesting.
- 7 MS. GOFF: I just think we need to be
- 8 mindful of this is a competitive process, so sort of keep
- 9 in mind that everybody's got their interest. That's all.
- 10 Thank you.
- MS. SCHROEDER: Public comments
- (indiscernible)?
- 13 MS. BURDSALL: There's one person that's
- 14 signed up (indiscernible).
- 15 MADAM CHAIR: Oh, yes, I'm sorry. Thank
- 16 you, Bizy. We have one final public comment from Deborah
- 17 Cole (ph). Deborah? I'm sorry. I didn't know they
- 18 (indiscernible). Thank you, Deborah.
- 19 MS. COLE: Madam Chair and Members of the
- 20 Board. Can you hear me? It doesn't sound as though I'm
- 21 --
- 22 MS. MAZANEC: Yes, bring it up a little
- 23 closer to you.
- 24 MADAM CHAIR: If you bring it down a bit.
- MS. MAZANEC: There you go.



1 MS. COLE: Okay. 2 MS. MAZANEC: (Indiscernible). I'd like to read from testimony 3 MS. COLE: given to a Congressional meeting in 1958 by a world class 4 expert on psychological warfare, Edward Hunter, on the 5 6 undermining of an American national character: "I see as a part of the softening-up process 7 in America the liquidation of our attitudes on what we 8 used to recognize as right and wrong, what we used to 9 accept as absolute moral standards. There's no such 10 thing as truth or a lie and any belief we may actually 11 hold is simply because of our lack of sophisticated. We 12 13 are told we need to be objective, but the word is used with the meaning given to it by dialectical materialism." 14 He described the American POWs he had 15 "The Communists selected Americans who had fine 16 studied: 17 intelligence quotients but with poor education. heads were like a good solid, but empty bucket, only 18 19 waiting to be filled. The Communists did so with their own slanted material." 20 Hunter describes the push against the 21 individual in favor of the collective: "I remember when 22 23 I was young man, every personnel department was looking 24 for leadership qualities. Today, they ask instead if the 25 man gets along with everybody. When we raise a young man



to believe that at all costs he must get on with 1 2 everyone, we have put him into a state of mind that almost quarantees if he falls into the hands of any 3 enemy, such as the Communists, he will react as if he had 4 been raised to get on, because he must not be anti-5 6 social. One of the qualities that enabled men to 7 resist brainwashing was what Hunter called closed-8 mindedness. He explained as "When you have already 9 reached a conclusion on a specific matter in question and 10 under the circumstances, there's no earthly use in 11 discussing it. One doesn't discuss, for instance, 12 13 whether it isn't all right to slap one's mother in the face or to slap one's county in the face by making 14 propaganda for the enemy. Finally, and ominously, the 15 most important elements of mental survival stamina are 16 17 faith and convictions. I never expected this to be questioned. After all, my information came out of the 18 19 experiences of the brainwashed themselves. Yet there has been almost peculiar resentment of that finding. I 20 believe this is the most significant of my discoveries 21 for Americans, for it reveals a national vulnerability 22 that has crept into our character." 23 24 Against this background, consider --

MADAM CHAIR: (Indiscernible).



1	MS. COLE: a recent U.N. report
2	characterizing what 21st century education should be: A
3	vision fully embraced by the common core. Quote,
4	"Education must fully assume its central role in helping
5	people to forge more just, peaceful, tolerant, and
6	inclusive societies." Three sentences. "It must give
7	people the understanding, skills, and values they need to
8	cooperate in resolving the interconnected challenges of
9	the 21st century."
10	Ladies and gentlemen, it's a dangerous
11	world. And we must not predicate the education of our
12	young people on words like "peaceful," "tolerance," and
13	"inclusive." I tremble for them and for my country.
14	Thank you very much.
15	MADAM CHAIR: Thank you. Appreciate it.
16	Any other business to come before the Board? If not,
17	then we stand adjourned.
