- 23 quick glance, so just the front -- first page to show the
- 24 high level of where every Board's budget is. But I'd be
- 25 happy to provide you with the detailed.

BURDSALL: As of your -- I'd say 3 September reimbursement if you're just providing me with 4 your October reimbursement, because we're always a month 5 6 behind. So since we've at the November Board Meeting, between the beginning of November and now --7 MS. GOFF: Okay. 8 MS. BURDSALL: -- I'll have your October --9 MS. GOFF: So as of the -- the previous 10 filing date. 11 12 MS. BURDSALL: Exactly. 13 MS. GOFF: All right. Thank you. I -- I had thoughts at one point of asking if we might have that 14 information printed on this. 15 MS. BURDSALL: Oh, what --16 17 MS. GOFF: Because with the other quorum report for each of us, which is public information as 18 19 well. It's often hard to tell when the ending of that is, unless you --20 21 MS. BURDSALL: Sure. MS. GOFF: -- leaf through the entire thing. 22 MS. BURDSALL: Yeah. 23

- 9 MS. BURDSALL: Is that okay?
- 10 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Okay. Further questions?
- 11 Seeing none, Commissioner Asp, your Strategic Priorities
- 12 Report.
- 13 MR. ASP: Yes. I'd like to invite Jennifer
- Mello, our Legislative Liaison, to discuss the
- 15 Legislative Priorities Document with the Board.
- MS. MELLO: Good morning. It's lovely to
- 17 see you all on a nice snowy day. So I thought we would
- 18 start with the Legislative Priorities today. Just as a
- 19 reminder, at the last meeting we didn't get a chance to
- 20 discuss this, but I had provided you with just my
- 21 suggestions on what I would call almost technical updates
- to the Legislative Priorities you adopted in 2015.
- Obviously, this is your document. It's your prerogative.
- 24 If you want to suggest additional changes or have
- 25 discussion about particular items, that's -- that's your



- 1 role.
- 2 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Questions for Ms. Mello.
- 3 Okay. None. Jennifer, are you -- are you picking up any
- 4 commentary at the capitol about what kinds of education
- 5 bills might be introduced or are we still in the phase
- 6 where there's little specific discussion?
- 7 MS. MELLO: Mr. Chair, yes, there -- I mean,
- 8 certainly, there is -- it's a little bit more detailed
- 9 than a rumor, but nothing that we've seen in writing at
- 10 this point. That's kind of where we are in the phase.
- 11 There are any number of issues being circulated out
- 12 there. I'm happy to go through those a little bit. I
- think perhaps to -- part of what you're asking is do our
- 14 Legislative Priorities address some of those issues, I
- 15 would say, yes, we are generally well covered. I mean, I
- 16 can't promise you for a fact that a bill will come along
- 17 that we -- we may not have addressed in our Legislative
- 18 Priorities. But there's nothing particularly new under
- 19 the sun.
- 20 There's not a lot of -- at least that I'm
- 21 hearing of right now, you know, completely brand new
- ideas and proposals out there. So I think we're
- 23 relatively well covered. Mr. Chair, would you like me to
- 24 go through the -- the list of what I'm hearing about
- 25 might come at the capitol now? Or would you -- do you



- want me to do that after we finish the Legislative
- 2 Priorities?
- 3 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Any other questions about
- 4 Legislative Priorities?
- 5 MS. GOFF: Yes. I do.
- 6 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Yes, Ms. Goff.
- 7 MS. GOFF: Very quick. And, Jennifer,
- 8 apologies if you went through this with us last month.
- 9 On the last one, the date of collection in Access, what
- 10 happened, if anything, to this original, the red-lined
- 11 safety priority? Where is that? It's gone now. It was
- 12 -- it was crossed out and --
- MS. MELLO: Oh.
- 14 MS. GOFF: -- suggested it be taken out and
- 15 replaced with our -- actually this more current work of
- ours anyway.
- 17 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: (Indiscernible).
- MS. MELLO: Mr. Chair, Board Member Goff,
- 19 that was passed last year. So there was legislation last
- year that addressed the issue of separate reporting for
- 21 marijuana discipline violations.
- MS. GOFF: Okay.
- MS. MELLO: So it -- it just didn't seem
- 24 necessary to continue to include it in our priorities.
- 25 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Yes. Dr. Schroeder.



1 MS. SCHROEDER: Thank you. Do we vote on 2 this today so that it's -- it --3 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: No. I -- we're -- I think 4 MS. SCHROEDER: How is it final? 5 6 MS. MELLO: Mr. Chair, and -- and I'll defer 7 Bizy on protocol, but typically in the past you all have taken a vote to kind of say, yes, these are our 8 priorities for the legislature. 9 10 MS. SCHROEDER: That's what I thought -- so I was trying to figure out, since this is not a voting 11 item today, when is it -- when are we done, done? So 12 13 that we can share this with legislatures? UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Do we do it in 14 December? 15 16 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: We can certainly schedule 17 it for a vote in December. I think that's plenty of time 18 19 MS. SCHROEDER: Well --CHAIRMAN DURHAM: -- for this. Yes, 20 Dr. Schroeder. 21 MS. SCHROEDER: So I had a discussion last 22 23 night with some legislatures who represent the Poudre School District. And they tell me that they had never 24

heard of the State Board's positions. And so I had



- discussion with Jennifer and she assured me that, yes, in
- 2 fact, we do send that to them. Apparently, we send that
- 3 to them when they are getting a hurricane of other items.
- 4 And so I was wondering if, perhaps, if, in
- fact, we are fine with it, if we could vote on it today,
- 6 so that it could be shared with them at an earlier time
- 7 then when they get everything else that they can't --
- 8 apparently can't get. None -- none of these three
- 9 individuals are on the Education Committees. So they
- 10 wouldn't be looking as carefully. But they were very --
- 11 they requested Jennifer's name and they were very
- interested in seeing what the State Board's position is
- on items.
- 14 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Dr. Flores.
- 15 MS. FLORES: Since we haven't discussed
- them, and I think we should discuss them. Don't you
- 17 think that December would be a better time?
- 18 MS. SCHROEDER: Well, if that's all we can
- 19 do. I thought -- this is, what, the second or third time
- 20 we've had them. So I didn't know whether we were
- 21 finished with them or not.
- MS. FLORES: All right.
- MS. SCHROEDER: So if you have some more
- items to discuss, then let's do that.
- MS. FLORES: Yeah. I mean, I think you



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1 should continue and I think we just looked at them, but -2 3 MS. SCHROEDER: Okay. MS. FLORES: -- I think we need to have 5 some. 6 MS. SCHROEDER: Okay. That's fine. CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Yes, Ms. Mazanec. 7 MS. MAZANEC: I agree. I -- I would like to 8 take a closer look at them before we vote on them, 9 because they weren't -- it was an information item --10 11 MS. SCHROEDER: Okay. MS. MAZANEC: -- and I haven't studied the 12 13 documents. 14 MS. SCHROEDER: Okay. CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Further, I think -- I 15 16 think we will lay it over for action to the December 17 meeting. And the December meeting is early in the month. 18 That should be -- should be timely enough for 19 legislatures, I think. Any additional questions? 20 Ms. Mello, you wanted to comment on the other kinds of legislation you've heard about? 21 MS. MELLO: Sure. Chairman Durham, and I'll 22 23 just say on -- on the legislative priorities, if you have

questions or wondering about this in the -- between now

and December, obviously feel free to be in touch. And



- 1 I'm happy to just provide additional information if that
- 2 helps you in your decision-making process for -- for
- 3 December. Yeah.
- 4 So yeah, here's a -- just a general overview
- of some of the topics I think will be important in the
- 6 upcoming session around preschool and K-12 education.
- Obviously, the funding issues I think will be up front,
- 8 first and foremost. You're all aware I sent you the
- 9 information last week about Governor's budget proposal,
- 10 which has proposed an increase by inflation enrollment,
- 11 but then a 50 million dollar increase in the negative
- 12 factor. So it is a -- a real dollar increase in funding
- for K-12. But it does not adequately keep up with growth
- 14 and inflation would be the very simple way I would
- 15 describe that.
- So that is going to be a very, very, very
- 17 hot topic at the capitol. I think that will actually
- 18 consume much of the conversation around K-12 issues this
- 19 particular session. Additionally, I do think we will see
- 20 some continued discussion of some of the bills we saw
- 21 last year around our Colorado Academic Standards and the
- 22 common core. I think we will see continued discussion
- about testing, the level of testing, the amount of
- 24 testing, the grades for testing. I don't think that
- topic has been completely exhausted yet.



1 So we will see more legislation on that. 2 There are some rumors that -- there's been kind of 3 repeated efforts over the last few years to enhance the accountability for online schools. I think we may see some legislation come on that again. There has been some 5 6 discussion about the GED test, the adult education test and allowing for more options than just the one test that 7 -- that currently we have. I think that schools and districts and the Colorado Education Association may well 9 be bringing forth legislation around another -- another 10 11 year of timeout. So the last couple of years we've had 12 13 statutory provisions adopted that for both purposes of educator effectiveness the 191 provisions and the school 14 and district accountability have essentially had a 15 timeout, because of some of the data issues and 16 17 transitioning the testing system. So I think that it's 18 likely that we will see yet another request for another year of transition time in that. I think we will see --19 last year we discussed this quite a bit as a group. 20 There was some legislation around charter 21 schools in terms of increasing kind of the standard for 22 districts to maintain exclusive chartering authority. I 23 24 think that will come back. I don't know that it will be in the exact form as last year, but we will see that. I, 25



1 also, think there's going to be discussion and -- and 2 legislation around mill levy equity and how mill levies are distributed to charter schools as well as traditional 3 district schools and how CSI kind of is in that mix. 4 Last year there was a bill that you all 5 6 supported that had to do with kind of providing some incentive funding to BOCES to get them to kind of be more 7 proactive about helping small, rural districts 8 consolidate their back office functions as a way of 9 saving resources. I think that legislation will -- will 10 reappear. I'm now hearing there might be two different 11 bills around school funding task forces. So last year 12 13 there was a legislation by Representative Hamner and Representative Rankin, primarily, around a task force to 14 kind of look over all of our school funding issues and 15 how we're doing that. I think that will be coming back. 16 17 There may be additional efforts by other members of the legislature on that. And then the final 18 19 item I will mention is, the Concurrent Enrollment Program is something that we seem to want to talk about every 20 year at the capitol. So I think we will talk about that 21 again this year. I think on the one hand there's some 22 23 desire to expand access to the Concurrent Enrollment And then there's, also -- the community 24 Program. colleges have long expressed some concerns about the 25



- 1 level of funding they receive under that program, kind of
- 2 how the funding essentially gets split between the school
- district and the community college.
- 4 So they may want to have some conversation
- 5 about that and -- and what that funding formula looks
- 6 like. So that's my -- my summary of the rumor mill. I'm
- 7 almost finished here. In terms of Interim Committee
- 8 action, the School Safety Committee decided not to move
- 9 forward with any legislation at this point in time.
- 10 There are three reports due out soon from the Arapaho
- 11 High School arbitration case. They said they wanted to
- wait and see what those had to say before they made any
- decisions about legislation.
- 14 The non-legislative members of the School
- 15 Safety Interim Committee will continue to meet into the -
- the legislative session. So the Interim Committee,
- 17 itself, did not propose any legislation. That doesn't
- 18 mean that once they have -- those folks have more
- 19 information from this arbitration reports, they may very
- 20 well likely decide to introduce some legislation in
- 21 February or a little bit later into the session. And
- then, finally --
- MS. SCHROEDER: Jennifer, can you --
- MS. MELLO: Oh, of course.
- 25 MS. SCHROEDER: -- can you remind -- can you



- just expand a little bit more, because I have forgotten
- what the Arapaho High School -- what the three -- when
- 3 you started to describe some events that folks were
- 4 waiting for. And I can't remember what they are.
- 5 MS. MELLO: Sure.
- MS. SCHROEDER: Please.
- 7 MS. MELLO: Mr. Chair, Madam Vice Chair, the
- 8 --
- 9 MS. SCHROEDER: (Indiscernible).
- MS. MELLO: The -- my understanding is the -
- 11 the family of Claire Davis has entered into arbitration
- 12 with the school district.
- MS. SCHROEDER: Oh.
- 14 MS. MELLO: And as part of that arbitration
- 15 process there is some public reporting expected.
- MS. SCHROEDER: Okay.
- 17 MS. MELLO: I -- I'm not familiar enough
- 18 with the legal details to know why we're going to have
- 19 three reports, but that's my understanding.
- MS. SCHROEDER: That's the question. Okay.
- MS. MELLO: Out of that --
- MS. SCHROEDER: Thank you.
- MS. MELLO: -- process there will come some
- 24 reports. And folks wanted to see that --
- MS. SCHROEDER: Sure.



1 MS. MELLO: -- before they made any 2 decisions for that legislation. 3 MS. SCHROEDER: Thank you. MS. MELLO: And then, just finally, real 4 quick, the Early Childhood Commission moved forward with 5 6 three bills. Those were approved by legislative counsel yesterday. So these bills will be introduced at the 7 beginning of January as Interim Committee Bills. 8 9 The first one allows for a state tax credit for childcare expenses to begin in 2016. That is capped 10 at -- and you have to have an income of less than 85 11 thousand in order to take advantage of that credit. 12 13 estimated cost of that is 46.2 million dollars a year to the state. So given the budget situation, that may be an 14 uphill battle. They also, approved legislation to expand 15 -- there's something in place already called the 16 Childcare Assistance Cliff Effect Pilot Program. 17 was limited to ten counties. Now more counties can 18 19 participate in the pilot as a result of their second bill, if it passes. 20 And then, finally, they did move forward 21 with the task force to address the childcare needs of low 22 23 income parents as parents seek to advance their education. That task force would be housed at the 24 Department of Labor and Employment. The Department of 25



- 1 Education is a named member of that task force.
- MS. FLORES: Excuse me. Where will it be
- 3 held?
- 4 MS. MELLO: The Colorado Department of Labor
- 5 and Employment.
- 6 MS. FLORES: Okay.
- 7 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Okay. Any questions of
- 8 Ms. Mello regarding legislation that we might be seeing
- 9 during the session? I would -- would presume -- would
- 10 you plan to have your first meeting with the legislative
- 11 committee in early January or in December at -- I'm
- trying to remember when it was last year.
- MS. MELLO: Mr. Chair, it's -- it's
- 14 obviously at the discretion of the -- of the committee,
- 15 itself. I'm happy to meet whenever they want. There
- 16 might be some good -- we might have some good discussions
- 17 to start with in December, if that's what you all would
- 18 like to do. And I apologize.
- 19 I failed to mention another big bill --
- 20 sometimes the big ones are so big you almost forget about
- 21 them, but data privacy, of course, will be a huge topic.
- 22 And one that you all have instructed us to take a very
- lead position on. You've, obviously, been doing that
- internally as a department and -- and with the contacts
- 25 the department has. You've, also, asked me to do that



- 1 legislatively. And so we're proceeding with that as
- well.
- 3 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: All right. Very good.
- 4 And we'll -- Dr. Scheffel is -- is the chair of that
- 5 committee and we'll ask her to schedule a meeting and
- 6 confer with you when there's -- you think there's enough
- 7 -- enough to discuss in terms of positions we might want
- 8 to take on legislation and particularly if Representative
- 9 Lundeen's privacy bill once there's something on paper
- that would probably trigger a meeting to discuss that.
- 11 Anything else? Thank you very much.
- MS. MELLO: Thank you.
- 13 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: We'll now proceed to
- 14 action item 8.01.
- MS. SCHROEDER: Well, we -- do we need to
- 16 discuss -- I mean, I'm a little confused now. Apparently
- 17 there wasn't enough discussion as yet on this to vote.
- 18 So shouldn't we be discussing it?
- 19 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: I think we'll discuss it
- 20 when it's --
- MS. SCHROEDER: When it's next in front of -
- 22 -
- 23 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: When we discuss it at the
- 24 time --
- MS. SCHROEDER: Okay.



1	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: we take action, I
2	think.
3	MS. SCHROEDER: Got it. Got it.
4	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: So we'll we'll get it
5	on
6	MS. SCHROEDER: Okay.
7	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: the December meeting.
8	MS. SCHROEDER: Thank you.
9	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Okay. We'll proceed now
10	to action to action item 8.01, the Elementary and
11	Secondary Education Waiver Request, which we've had on
12	the agenda and, also, had a study session. Any comments
13	from anyone staff on yes, Dr. Asp?
14	MR. ASP: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. We
15	we're here to answer questions, Allyson Pearson and,
16	also, Pat Chapman are available to answer any questions
17	you may have. I feel like we had a very good study
18	session and opportunity to discuss it in depth. So we're
19	happy to take any other questions. We don't have
20	(indiscernible).
21	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Yeah. Okay.
22	MR. ASP: Thanks.
23	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Any questions and/or
24	comments from Members of the Board? Yes.
25	MS. SCHROEDER: I'll make a motion.



1	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Yes. Good point.
2	Dr. Schroeder, would you like to make a motion, please?
3	MS. SCHROEDER: I move to approve the
4	changes that have been made to Colorado's ESEA Waiver
5	Renewal Request since it was first submitted to the US
6	Department of Education in March 2015 and to approve the
7	submission of the ESEA Waiver Renewal Request to the US
8	Department of Education for its consideration of the
9	request.
10	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Is there a second to that
11	motion?
12	MS. GOFF: Second.
13	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Ms. Goff. Okay. It's
14	been moved and seconded. Comments on the motion? The
15	Chair will make a few comments. The it's clear that
16	we have a a very flawed federal statute, because if
17	you you have a federal statute in which virtually
18	every Colorado school fails to fails to make the grade
19	and every Colorado school would be required to send a
20	letter to all of the parents noting that their that
21	their failure.
22	It's clear that this law has long if it
23	ever accomplished anything, it is clearly reached the
24	point where it doesn't accomplish anything except grind
25	out lots of paperwork to get waivers from the most



1 owner's provisions. I tried to examine some of -- some 2 of the consequences and did talk to several superintendents and while my inclination is not to -- is 3 not to support -- not to support this waiver, I think a good part of the job of this Board is to try not to make 5 6 life more difficult for our local school districts. it's clear that life would be more difficult for many of 7 those school districts without a waiver and would, 8 likely, result in the -- in their waste of tax payer 9 10 resources. The only -- there are a number of advantages 11 to not having the waiver, one of which would be to try 12 13 and remind our members of congress that they really ought to do something about this and that the federal intrusion 14 into education is not productive for -- for -- in 15 16 achieving either their objectives or in achieving the 17 educational objectives of the parents, and teachers, and school boards, and superintendents in this state. 18 19 I think it's safe to say that No Child Left 20 Behind has been a catastrophic failure and it really is time to move on. And I would strongly suggest if this is 21 not remedied in the next year with some change in 22 23 statutes that getting a waiver approved in the -- and let me ask what's the term of this waver? 24

MR. ASP: It -- it'll be at the discretion



- of the US Department of Education. It's likely that they
- 2 would give us a -- a one-year waiver, but they can give
- 3 us up to a three-year waiver.
- 4 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Let's not ask for more
- 5 than a one-year waiver. And -- because I think if some
- 6 action isn't taken, perhaps that it's time for Colorado
- 7 to put -- put enough pressure on to see that -- that some
- 8 changes are made at the federal level, because the -- the
- 9 current situation is intolerably bad. Any further
- 10 discussion? Yes. Ms. Goff?
- 11 MS. GOFF: I agree. I appreciate that. We
- 12 were chatting earlier, I'm sorry I brought it up to them
- 13 so early in the morning. I -- I made apologies for that,
- 14 but the -- the situation with ESEA reauthorization right
- now and what a rollercoaster we've all been on,
- unnecessarily, I think, it would have been best if folks
- 17 back there had not made any projections about timeline
- 18 and just let it -- let it happen when it's going to
- 19 happen. The latest that I have heard and I believe a lot
- of you have been in on some of the same conversations is
- 21 that there is -- they are now projecting that possibly by
- November 30th, there will be some activity on this,
- possibly on the floor of a certain chamber.
- So we've got that. Encouraging, hopefully -
- 25 I mean, I'd love to think that would happen. The



1 conference committees between the two chambers have --2 are yet to be totally finalized, but that is in process. And once that happens, they're -- they trust that things 3 can move along at a good, reasonable, productive pace. 4 So that's what we know. So it's not that --5 6 it's not that there's reason to think nothing is absolutely happening and that the whole thing is doomed 7 amidst all the confusion but -- in Washington. But, on 8 the other hand, realistically, until we see it, we don't 9 -- we don't see it. So I do think that for the purposes 10 of the next year, a one-year waiver is -- is reasonable 11 and rational. 12 13 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Yes. Dr. Flores. MS. FLORES: Yes. You know, I'm -- I'm 14 really concerned about the testing, the evaluation, 15 16 because the administration came out on one side saying we 17 were going to have less testing. And, yet, when, you know, experts kind of looked at it, it seemed as if we 18 are going to have more testing than we had before. 19 And so, it -- there isn't really cut in 20 testing. So I -- I -- I really worry about that and 21 wonder if -- I know I had some discussions over with the 22 23 legislature -- some people with legislature and they were thinking of another test instead of PARCC and they were 24 thinking of ACT Aspire, but, you know, it's still the 25



- same old testing and it's still high -- high-stakes
- 2 testing.
- 3 It's still not getting at really putting the
- 4 emphasis on kids who really need the -- really need the
- 5 emphasis of our putting more work and giving them just
- 6 all the focus that they need. And I'm talking about kids
- 7 that are just not making it. And so that's where I think
- 8 the emphasis needs to be made and not on more and
- 9 different high-stakes testing. That's what I think and I
- 10 -- I think we just need to get back to local areas doing
- 11 what they know best. And that's know best for the
- 12 children in their communities. I think that's what needs
- to be done.
- 14 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Yes. Ms. Mazanec.
- 15 MS. MAZANEC: Director Flores, I would just
- 16 like to say I completely agree on the point. I -- I,
- 17 also, second Director Durham's -- or Chair Durham, I'm
- 18 sorry.
- 19 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: That's okay.
- 20 MS. MAZANEC: Comments that we -- we need to
- 21 move aware from federal mandates.
- MS. FLORES: Yes.
- MS. MAZANEC: And get back to a more local
- 24 level. And I -- I agree it's a difficult position that
- 25 we're in, once again, but I really like the idea of a



- one-year extension and -- and hopefully we can revisit
- this again next year with the help of our legislatures.
- 3 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Yeah. I would -- would
- 4 comment, Dr. Flores, I did ask staff to evaluate the US
- 5 Department of Education and the president's call to limit
- 6 testing to the two percent standard. If we were to meet
- 7 the -- if we were to exceed the test -- the two percent
- 8 standard, we'd have to increase our testing about three-
- 9 fold. So it was probably one of the most for show and
- 10 less substantive --
- MS. MAZANEC: Exactly.
- 12 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: -- announcements made by -
- by anyone in the education community in recent memory.
- 14 So we're already well below that. And we're -- we face
- 15 significant criticism for what we already -- for what
- 16 we're already doing. So that provided really no help or
- 17 no relief.
- MS. MAZANEC: Yeah.
- 19 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: And I -- I'm sure there's
- 20 something profound to say to Ms. Goff about an optimist
- in the morning. And I -- I hope you're right.
- MS. GOFF: Yeah. So what?
- 23 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: We'll -- we'll see if
- there's any cause for optimism. It's been moved and
- 25 seconded that we approve --



25

1 MS. SCHEFFEL: I have something else. 2 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Oh, yes, Dr. Scheffel. MS. SCHEFFEL: Thank you. This -- I don't 3 know if this -- if you have this data with you, but do 4 you happen to know how many Colorado schools are Title I 5 6 and did not meet AYP for two years? I don't think we talked about that at the study session. 7 MR. ASP: With the --8 MS. SCHEFFEL: With the --9 MR. ASP: With the current targets? 10 11 MS. SCHEFFEL: Right. MR. ASP: It was -- I don't remember. 12 13 have about 660 Title I schools. MS. SCHEFFEL: Title I schools. 14 MR. ASP: The vast majority did not --15 16 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: It was like 86 percent. 17 MR. ASP: I think it was 86 percent, 88 18 percent did not make AYP. 19 MS. SCHEFFEL: AYP. All right. Yeah. just -- I -- I appreciated the study session. That was a 20 great way to get together and go through the details of 21 the document. I just continue to feel that this waiver 22 23 doesn't help us.

CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Oh, yeah.

MS. SCHEFFEL: I feel like it continues to

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1 tie us to federal policy in ways that increase regulatory 2 burden and not decrease regulatory burden, which is what 3 the waiver is supposed to be doing. It puts us -- it puts more students under this umbrella of federal policy than if we did not have the waiver. So that instead of 5 6 just applying it to Title I schools, now we've pulled a whole number of other students under the umbrella of this 7 -- this policy. 8 9 And so I appreciate all the work that went 10 in to negotiating with the feds and it, certainly, is 11 very extensive document with a lot of work that has gone into it. I just feel like we're continuing to cede our 12 13 authority as a state to the feds in aligning what we do with their polices. And I think in the end that doesn't 14 serve Colorado students well. Thank you. 15 16 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Further comments? 17 MS. FLORES: One more comment. 18 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Yes. Dr. --MS. FLORES: And that is with --19 20 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: -- Flores. MS. FLORES: -- all the schools that are in 21 22 the bottom five percent or ten percent. Don't you think 23 that if we get another bar just by the idea that you have 24 another scale and it's going to be a -- a scale? You're 25 going to again have a bottom five and ten percent that



- 1 may be different than the other five percent. I -- I
- 2 mean, if you have a bell curve and -- and you already
- 3 take this other and you impose another group of -- of all
- 4 the schools in the state, you're going to get another ten
- 5 percent.
- 6 So we've already done damage, I think, to
- 7 those ten percent down at the bottom. And now if we
- 8 impose another year and another year, we just keep --
- 9 instead of helping, we -- we just create, you know, more
- 10 chaos as opposed to really helping those -- those schools
- 11 to -- to get better. I -- I think is -- is what is
- 12 happening. And I think we've already done it to those
- 13 ten percent.
- 14 And we're looking at them and such and
- 15 surely one or two will appear, but I -- I think we -- we
- need to stop this whole thing and really help those
- 17 schools that are at the bottom, really help them, instead
- of, you know, just getting whip over them. And -- and
- 19 menacing and destroying them. We need to stop that. And
- that's what the mandates from Washington asks us to do
- 21 and we're just going along with them. So that's not a --
- 22 a very helpful activity that we are cooperating with a
- 23 federal government in doing and not really helping kids,
- 24 I think.
- 25 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Further discussion?



1 Seeing none, Ms. Burdsall, would you please call the 2 roll? 3 MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Flores? MS. FLORES: Yes. Yes. MS. BURDSALL: Okay. Board Member Goff? 5 6 MS. GOFF: Yes. 7 MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Mazanec? MS. MAZANEC: Yes. 8 9 MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Rankin? 10 MS. RANKIN: Yes. MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Scheffel? 11 MS. SCHEFFEL: No. 12 13 MS. BURDSALL: Board Member Schroeder? 14 MS. SCHROEDER: Yes. MS. BURDSALL: And Chairman Durham? 15 16 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: No. That motion is 17 adopted by a vote of five to two. We'll proceed to item 18 -- let's see, --19 MS. BURDSALL: No. 20 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: -- are we item nine --21 item nine, public comment. We're a little ahead of schedule. 22 23 UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Okay. 24 CHAIRMAN DURHAM: So we're -- why don't we

start public comment, because it could -- we may not



1	finish it before ten o'clock and then we we're a
2	little ahead of schedule so much the better.
3	UNIDENTIFIED VOICE: Let me see
4	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: So if we have a signup
5	sheet, we'll ahead and start for those that are here and
6	we might renew it then after ten o'clock.
7	MS. FLORES: Or not, you could have a little
8	break now?
9	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: You want a little break?
10	MS. FLORES: Yeah. A little break.
11	CHAIRMAN DURHAM: Why don't we take five
12	minutes and then we'll start public comment at about ten
13	till.
