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# Reminders about the work Goals: Big Picture

Improve the success of Colorado's educator effectiveness initiatives by aligning content assessments and rules with the Colorado Academic Standards and the educator quality standards.

Increase effectiveness of new educators by ensuring the highest quality content assessments are used.

Increase teacher quality for every single student in the state of Colorado in order to ensure their success throughout life.



#### Reminders: Rule Alignment Project

Rule Alignment Project • Fall 2014 – Spring 2015: Internal reviews of related regulations and statute, online survey and portal for online feedback and stakeholder focus groups across Colorado. Updates regularly communicated to the Board.

Rule Making Process  Spring 2015- Fall 2015: Informational sessions held. Draft rules presented to the board and posted online for public comment.
 Staff incorporated feedback in accordance with statute.
 Presented new draft to the Board.



• February 2016: State board voted to approve the newly aligned rules, sparking the next step in the project: aligning Colorado's content assessments.



### What are content assessments used for in Colorado?

A measure of content competency for the issuance of alternative licenses.

One way to show content competency for added endorsements

Educator Preparation entities use SBOE approved exams for national accreditation for all initial and advanced endorsements as well as for Title II compliance for all \*initially-licensed candidates.

\* Required by statute for Special Education Generalist, Administrator, Principal, and Elementary endorsements.

#### Context: How did we get here?

The two companies that the field expressed interest in:
Pearson's NES exams and ETS
Praxis exams.

Feedback from 2014 stakeholder focus groups and online survey overwhelmingly expressed the need to get rid of the PLACE exams- some not updated since early 1990's.

#### Process


- ETS: Praxis (Educational Testing Service) and Pearson: NES (National Evaluation Series) were sent an RFI.
- Each vendor provided responses & prepared for a two-day presentation/ Q&A session.

## Committee Meetings

- Committee analyzed each vendor's 2day presentation and asked questions.
- The committee met for an additional day and informally to make a formal recommendation to go to the board.

#### Portability

# Score Reports: Receive in a reasonable time

Committee Recommendation: Review cut scores annually for necessary adjustment



#### Committee's Recommendation

- The above criteria have led the Committee to recommend the Praxis series of exams for adoption in Colorado to immediately provide high-quality, aligned content exams.
- The Committee recommends that the SBE adopt the list of 44 Praxis exams and the recommended cut-scores provided to the board.

This recommendation provides a streamlined testing system with ease of understanding for candidates and allows Colorado to more easily recruit and attract teachers to Colorado.



#### Follow- Up Recommendations

- The Committee recommends that the SBE direct CDE staff to investigate impact on licensed educators coming to Colorado from other states and comparability of other exams for purposes of Colorado licensure in these cases.
- The Committee recommends that the SBE direct CDE to continue to investigate additional or alternative math endorsements options, including but not limited to elementary math and middle school math endorsements.
- In light of the expectations regarding the teaching of reading in Colorado (including and especially the Read Act), the committee recommends the SBE direct CDE to create a specific taskforce to examine whether the State Board needs to adopt possible content and pedagogy exam(s) for elementary teachers that specifically focus on measuring teachers' knowledge and skills with regards to the teaching of reading upon completion of their initial licensure preparation program.
