	ACT English	
	<ul> <li>Endorsed diploma = priority consideration for admission to selection and highly selective schools. Meeting measure on GG menu of options = admission to moderately selective and modified open schools</li> </ul>	
	- 18 in English = college ready with a 75% of C or better in college class	
	<ul> <li>22 in English (according to ACT) = higher probability of success</li> <li>However – colleges look at multiple measures of success – not just test scores = more complete picture</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Would higher school be too hard on districts? Equity issues</li> <li>Would help "undermatching" of students who self-select out of the process</li> </ul>	

#### International Baccalaureate

- Students with a 4 on IB earn college credit
- When compared to AP of 3 on PWR Endorsed Diploma; both are equal (A score of 3 on AP also earns college credit

#### Math Pathways

- ACT at 22 in math is consistent with College Readiness Benchmark

### World language

- It's a value statement for cultural strength
- If we're going to signal that world language is valuable, then one year is not enough
- One year of language: no value for businesses. Bi-lingual: highly desirable
- Language is a point of entry for 4-year, selective colleges (2 years).
- The menu calls out English and math but no other content area, why world languages? What about science, social studies, art and PE?
- Worried about equity for all schools; some do not/cannot offer languages. With this criterion some students would automatically be eliminated. This in another example of how equity impacts goals
- The PWR Endorsed Diploma with the "AND" statements is "deep" The biliteracy endorsed diploma is deep. Why include languages on the PWR endorsement? It's redundant
- If we take it off, we're missing an opportunity

## Consensus

**ACT English:** leave at 18 to ensure that students have accessibility. There are already multiple "AND" measures embedded in the criteria

**International Baccalaureate** – leave at 4 in English and math. Students can receive credit for a 4 in Colorado colleges

Math Pathways – no action necessary

**World Language** – remove this criteria. One year is not good enough; there are serious equity issues; other content areas are not singled out

The State Board of Education will add the PWR Endorsed Diploma to the agenda on October 9 or 10. The Colorado Commission on Higher Education will add it to their agenda later in the fall, TBA.
